

MARY PICKFORD'S CASE MAY ERASE DIVORCE COLONY

Community Mad Clean Through; What, It Asks, Is to Become of Us if Industry Is Spoiled?

Reno, Nev., April 17.—Having carried his first objective by bringing suit in the name of the state of Nevada to cause annulment of Mary Pickford's divorce from Owen Moore, Attorney General Fowler is busy at Carson strengthening his position.

He is digging himself in by means of numerous citations, and is bringing up the legal artillery with which he hopes to repel the expected counter attack by Gavin McNab, former Supreme Court Justice (Pat) McCarren and the attached staff of eminent counsel who have been employed by Mary Pickford to preserve the validity of her separation from Owen Moore and her subsequent marriage to Douglas Fairbanks.

By those who claim to know the law on the subject, and Nevada's divorce code is admittedly as broad as her jack-rabbit sweeps of sagebrush that stretch into the great beyond—it is conceded that the big fight on the part of the state will be centered in attempting to shield Fowler out of court.

The attorney general has based his action on the theory that the state of Nevada, guardian of public well being and sound public morality, has the right to intervene and bring suit in cases involving these tenets. Such right to intervene is not specifically collected in Nevada's code, however, as it is in certain other states of the Union. Speculation today is rife as to whether the supreme court, to which the coming demurrer undoubtedly will be carried, will rule on outside precedent or will prefer to leave to the legislature the task of establishing a new law.

While the lawyers argue, and guess, and predict, the divorce colony is mad clean through, and the business community of Reno is in a state of commotion. What, they ask, is to become of them if the divorce industry be wiped out as a result of Mary Pickford's alleged infidelity?

ORGANIZED LABOR IS OPPOSED TO ENTRY OF MEXICAN PEONS

Secretary of Labor Wilson Asked to Rescind His Order Admitting Foreigners.

Washington, April 17.—(I. N. S.)—A demand was made on congress today by the American Federation of Labor that it should request Secretary of Labor Wilson to cancel his order of April 12 permitting the entry of Mexican laborers into the border states.

Frank Morrison, secretary of the federation, presented to the house immigration committee hundreds of telegrams from labor leaders in Texas, Arizona, New Mexico, California and other states denying there existed in those states any shortage of domestic common labor and any need for Mexican labor to help harvest the sugar or other agricultural crops.

"These Mexican laborers are taking the place of American laborers and are throwing them out of employment," said Morrison. "We urge this committee to have reports showing that demands are being made on the city authorities to feed the American workmen who have been crowded out of work by the Mexicans."

"In other cities there are hundreds of Mexicans with their families who are thrown on public charities. We urge this committee to present the exact condition to Secretary Wilson and ask him to cancel his orders."

think the secretary was given wrong information as to labor conditions," Morrison said. "The invasion of this country by Mexican laborers should cease."

Moscow, Idaho, April 17.—A storm of protest from organized labor in Idaho has been aroused by the announcement that Secretary of Labor Wilson has admitted Canadian and Mexican laborers for the exclusive purpose of cultivating and harvesting the beet crop in Colorado, Wyoming, Utah, Idaho and Nebraska.

BOOST PRICES TO CONSERVE SPUDS

Caterers' Association Adds 5 Cents for Potatoes in North End Houses as Lesson.

To conserve spuds, raise the price. This neat maxim, born of the Portland Caterers' association, today governs in several north end restaurants. Frank W. Beach, secretary of the association, says so.

Although the few less than 100 restaurateurs in the association now hold something like 1000 sacks of spuds, using a total of about 60 sacks a week, the caterers to protect the supply had printed a neat card telling the north end customers that hereafter potatoes as a free side dish would be extinct. Potatoes today, accordingly, cost 5 cents when ordered with other food.

But, he says, if the hotelmen decide to boycott potatoes until prices drop, the caterers probably will do likewise. Whether the sugar bowl will rest on a table, open to public regard, or be locked up with the other valuables, has not yet been decided by the restaurateurs, says Beach. Sentiment is divided on this question.

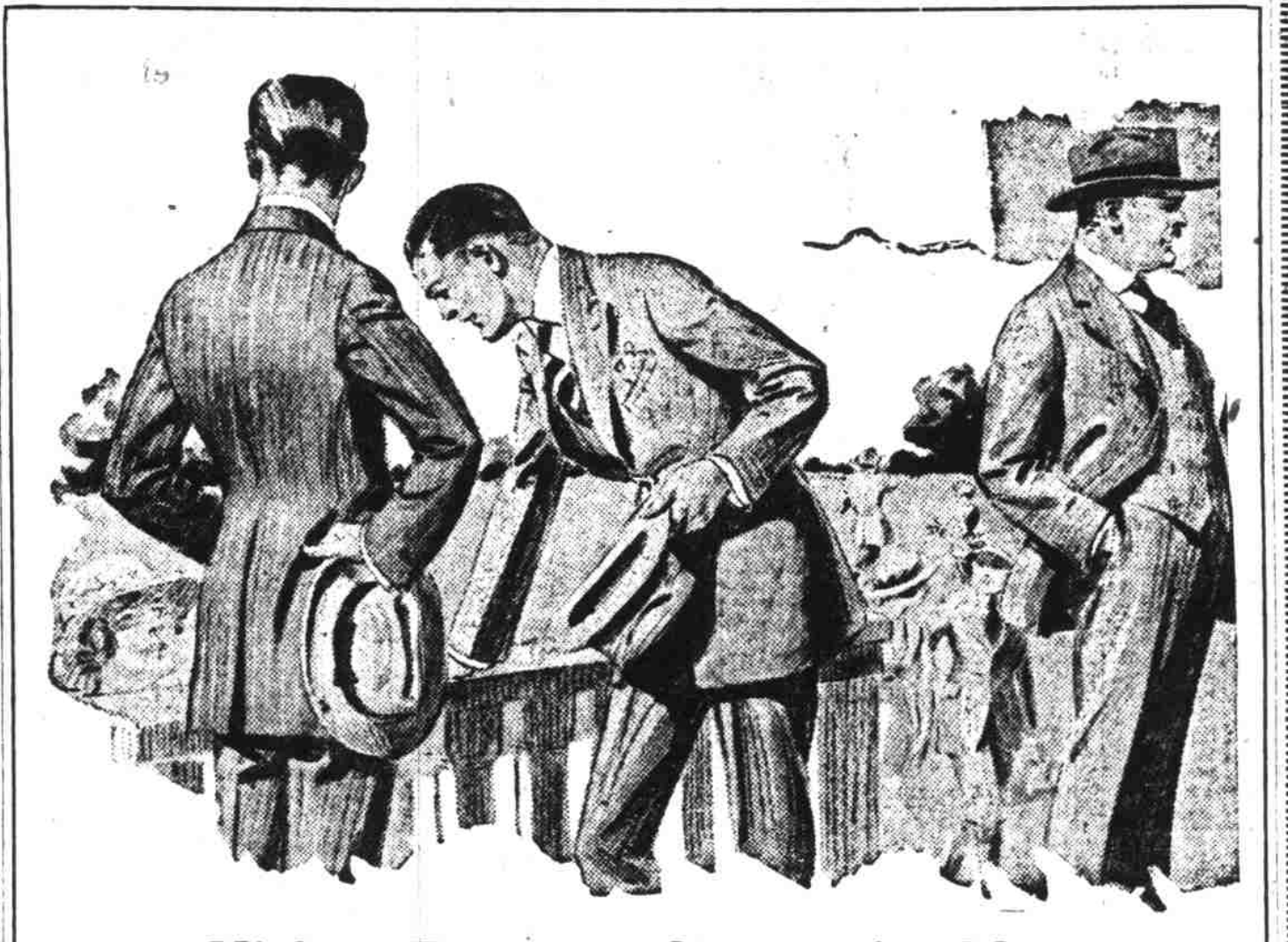
