

MRS. EARL SENEY SAYS HUSBY PAID FOR HER DIVORCE

In the opinion of Mrs. Earl F. Seney, only a few weeks ago his wife, Lorence Maycher is a "dud." When he tells Vancouver officials that Seney stole his wife while he was away to war, he distorts the truth, she says.

Complications of the eternal triangle again came to light the other day when Maycher asked the clerk in the Vancouver courthouse whether a license to wed had been issued to Miss Gladys C. Fraser and Earl Seney, 386 Division street.

"That's what happens when a fellow goes away to war—some other guy steals his wife," Maycher is alleged to have said when shown the marriage license record. Miss Fraser, formerly Mrs. Maycher, only a few days before had been granted a new license.

"Why, he gave me the money to get a divorce himself," retorted the now Mrs. Seney, when she heard about the Vancouver incident. "He tried to get a divorce from me first, but he didn't have any evidence of my wrongdoing, as he alleged.

"Then he came to me, gave me \$75, and told me to get a divorce. I got it only a few weeks ago in Oregon City. He didn't appear."

Maycher told the Vancouver officials that he could not defend the suit because he was ill in bed from effects of war service.

"I married him nearly three years ago, while he was in the army. He was at Vancouver barracks then, but two weeks later went to Camp Lewis. He was in the Forty-fourth infantry.

"When he heard he was going overseas," charges his former wife, "he represented that I was ill and thus secured his assignment to the spruce division.

"When he got out of the army he wouldn't support me, but wanted me to work for him. Then we arranged for the divorce.

"When he says Seney broke up his home, he is wrong. I've known my present husband only two months."

"But about this Vancouver marriage?" "Oh, I guess the most they can do is to annul it," Seney and Mrs. Seney said.
