

GENERAL DENEKINE SAYS NATIONALISTS WILL NOT GIVE UP

London, April 22.—General Denekine, last leader of the Russian Nationalists' forlorn cause, today gave the first detailed statement since he has come out of Russia, a fugitive, his army almost wiped out.

The interview was obtained through Eugene Sabline, Russian charge d'affaires in London, since General Denekine speaks only Russian. The famous general arrived in London direct from the Crimea Saturday, with his wife and children, and took up his residence in a quiet family hotel. Physically as well as mentally he is utterly weary from his arduous journey and his previous misfortunes. He saw his army dwindle from half a million to a rabble of 50,000. He plans to make his home on the southeast coast of England.

TO MAKE NEW PLANS
"The cause of nationalist Russia is not yet lost," he said. "As soon as possible I expect to meet Sazonoff (former Russian foreign minister), Yudenitch (another ill-fated nationalist general), M. Sabline and other Russian nationalist leaders, either here or in Paris, when we will make comprehensive plans. "Russia must live, but we cannot accept Bolshevism. We do not want the return of the old regime, but we are dedicated to some form of democracy, whether it be a constitutional monarchy or a republic."

"The collapse of my armies is due fundamentally to the lack of effective transport. In my rear was nothing but devastated territory."

LACKED ROLLING STOCK
"I had no rolling stock, no wagons, no motor transport. No effective fighting force can exist without a transport system."

"I have turned over my command to General Baron Wrangel. I came to England to accept the British government's hospitality. I intend to live here until such time as Russia is reborn. "I wish to extend my hearty thanks to the American government and people for the support and encouragement they have given our cause, support which was the most magnificent of our allies."

Swedish Financial Circles Speculate Upon German Coup

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Stockholm, April 22.—Financial circles are speculating over the possibilities of the next German coup, which everyone confidently expects will materialize within the next 10 days. Upon reports of impending trouble the German mark again slumped, causing a sympathetic reaction in other markets. Scandinavian papers all carry sensational reports of the nature and extent of Germany's difficulty. They agree in saying that the peasants and landowners are solidly opposed to the policy of the new government, especially regarding the removal of state troops from districts showing signs of Bolshevism.

It is asserted that Dr. Wolfgang Kaup arrived in Stockholm last week, traveling incognito, but this is denied by government officials, who declare that they would know if the fugitive were in the country.

In view of the fresh outbursts predicted for Germany, Scandinavian business men are insistent in their demands that a real effort should be made to give financial and economic aid to central Europe. All expect that the Paris conference will take forceful steps to that end.

LONDON FLOCKS TO SEE DAUGHTER OF CANADA'S GOVERNOR-GEN. WEDDED

London, April 22.—Society and public flocked to St. Margaret's church, Westminster, Wednesday, for the most fashionable wedding of the season, when Lady Dorothy Cavendish, daughter of the Duke of Devonshire, governor general of Canada, was married to Harold Macmillan, late of the Grenadier Guards and aide de camp to the duke in Canada. Queen Alexandra, Prince Albert, the Duke of Connaught and other royalties, with practically everybody who is anybody in British society, were present and an enthusiastic gathering numbering many thousands of the public gave a hearty greeting to the bride and her popular father. The aisle was lined by sturdy troopers of the bridegroom's old regiment, who made an arch of swords under which the bridal party passed. The Bishop of Derby officiated and the bride, who was given away by her father, was attended by four bridesmaids, Lady Anne Cavendish (sister), Miss Diana Cavendish, Lady Katherine Fitzmaurice (cousins), and Miss Jean Macmillan, cousin of the bridegroom. There were three small pages, Honorable Peter Cecil, Honorable Charles Fitzmaurice and Master Peter Macmillan.

GREEKS SUFFER SLIGHT LOSSES IN BOMBARDMENT

Constantinople, April 21.—(Delayed.)—News of a battle between Turkish nationalists and Greeks at Ort Keri was received today. The fighting started when the nationalists began a bombardment of the town. The Greek population dug trenches and returned the fire.

Pive of the defenders attempted to break through the Turkish lines to reach Iamidi, but two were killed. The survivors were successful.

Mustapha Kemal Pasha, leader of the nationalists in Anatolia, has summoned the national parliament to meet at Angora on April 27. He has issued a proclamation forbidding his followers to molest Christians.

Although a French column has relieved the beleaguered Americans and Armenians at Aintab, the situation there is still reported critical. Strong bands of Turks are still in the neighborhood.

A delegation from Azerbaijan is reported to have left Baku for Moscow to negotiate peace with the Russian soviet government. The delegates are said to be ready to offer the Russians large stores of petrol and naphtha from the Caucasus oil fields.

The new state of Azerbaijan embraces part of Persia, Armenia and Russia, according to the boundaries proclaimed by its government.

Scandinavians Are Aroused at Peace Progress in Balkans

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Stockholm, April 22.—Reports from the Finnish frontier indicate that the negotiations with the soviet commissioners are proceeding more rapidly than was expected. The soviet government agreed that Finland should keep Karelia and showed a complete willingness to meet all proposals half way in the effort to secure peace and a renewal of commercial activities. They want a certain amount of help from Finland in getting the railroads into working order, but they offer little else in the way of commercial relations.

The progress of peace negotiations in the Baltic countries and Poland and also the prospect of the allied countries starting trade relations with the soviet republic have aroused the Scandinavian countries. They want to protect their interests in Russia and work with England, France and the United States toward a just settlement of all claims.

Premier Branting asked the American legation here what the United States intended doing with regard to Russian trade. He received a reply from Washington immediately that the American government was not ready to take any definite steps.
