

Portland Card for Next Friday Announced :: Star Cue Artists to Show Wares at Rialto

Honors for Initial Home Victory Go to Pitcher Rudy Kallio

Enough Hits Scored to Make Game Interesting, and When It Is Over Angels Are on Short End to Tune of 3 to 2; One Game to Be Played Sunday.

Rudy Kallio goes the honor of pitching the Portland Beavers to their first victory of the 1920 season on the home lot. Wallowing Wade Killefer and his Los Angeles Angels were the humbled ones. Kallio and Claude Thomas had a regular battle for honors Friday, with the Oregonian being favored by a 3 to 2 score.

There were just enough hits to make the game well worth watching and Wes Kingdon, the 18-year-old Beaver shortstop, came through with a stop that put the fans in mind of his work of the final clash in 1919. George Maisei also came in for a big round of applause for a shoe string catch, and taking it all-in-all everyone was well pleased with the outcome.

The Southerners threatened to stow the game away in three innings, but only in the eighth did they become dangerous enough to score runs. In that canto, both Thomas and Killefer registered.

Portland started the scoring in the sixth when Dick Cox opened up with a single, was sacrificed along by Baker, and after Kingdon had failed to advance him, he scored on.

In the next frame the game was won. With two men down, "Duke" Schaller came through with a single, followed by Dick Cox double to the left center field fence, Killefer dropped Haney's perfect throw, saving the Duke's life. 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What Is Best Combination In Baseball?

Some Say Pitchers and Others Prefer Hitters; 1920 Race Proves Little So Far.

NEW YORK, April 24.—(U. P.)—Wise heads of baseball differ on the respective value of batting and pitching. Pat Moran, one of the brainiest men in baseball, prefers a big stable of pitchers; John McGraw rates the pitching staff at close to 75 per cent of the club's strength; Kid Gleason feels a little bit to hitting as the most valuable asset.

Other managers differ. Results so far this season give some interesting evidence.

Take the Detroit Tigers, one of the heaviest hitting teams in the American league, a club with the greatest slugging outfield in baseball, with the champion of the league and a quintet of regular every-day .300 sluggers.

The Tigers are in last place. They haven't won a game this season. Cobb, Flanagan, Veach, Heilmann and Bush can knock the cover off the ball, to no avail. Detroit isn't getting the pitching, and while those sluggers are pounding out hits by flocks, the weaker hitting opposition is having a similar carnival off poor pitching, or walking around by the gift of wild hurlers.

Miserable pitching is keeping Jennings in the cellar. He hasn't had a topnotch staff for years. Detroit annually has been picked as a runner-up when the dopesters ran over the "murderers' row" in the lineup, but the Tigers have consistently fallen a victim to the pitching maddy.

John McGraw has one of the best pitching staffs in baseball. Yet the Giants are in the last hole. The team isn't hitting. It's in a batting slump, and some good pitching has been wasted. Toney and Benton have pitched two games that would have turned in a victory with minor league support at the bat, but the Giants couldn't deliver and the New Yorkers have only one victory to their credit.

New York, April 24.—(U. P.)—Colonel L. T. Huston, ball owner of the Yankees, believes the present race for the American League pennant will be the best in the history of the organization.

"I look for a pennant race that will be talked about in future years," said Colonel Huston today. "From the looks of things now there are no hopelessly weak clubs in the league and the various teams after they've met in at least one series.

"Colonel Rupert and myself are pleased with the Yankees. The fact that our club has gotten away to a slow start is not discouraging. The boys simply are not hitting. I think we've got the talent necessary to a winner but as yet it has not been knit firmly together.

"Yes, Babe Ruth is going to help us a lot. It was unfortunate that he had to be kept out of the opening game here but he'll not be out of the lineup for long—three days to a week. I look for Ruth to shatter his home run record. He ought to hit around 50 homers this season for the Polo grounds are made to order for him.

Colonel Huston said that he has so far failed to notice any change in the pitching as a result of the new rules.

Forty rounds of boxing—three 10 round affairs, one six round and one four—are scheduled by Matchmaker Bobby Evans for the Portland boxing commission's smelter at the Armory next Friday night.

The stellar event will bring together Frank Farmer, Dan Salt's heavyweight king, and Tiny Herman (Oscar Koch), Chet McIntyre's speedy battler. Joe Gorman, the Portland featherweight, who has made such a sensational record of late, will meet Sam Langford in the semi-windup of 10 rounds. A special 10 round event will feature Stanley Willis, Hills' heavy welterweight, and Frankie Murphy, Denver crack. Sammy Gordon and Earl Zimmerman are down for a six round argument, and George Burns, the knockout novice, will meet Alex Trambatis in the four round curtain-raiser.

The full card was completed this morning, and all the boys at once went to work conditioning themselves.

In the Farmer-Herman fight it will be almost a case of Chet McIntyre, Herman's manager, fighting himself. Farmer, who whipped McIntyre and won from him the heavyweight title of the coast, then McIntyre took charge of Farmer and guided him for a long while. Later Farmer joined Dan Salt's stable and McIntyre hooked up with Herman. Does McIntyre know enough about Farmer's strength and weakness to make him have a defeat him? That is what is being asked. McIntyre is a fox and knows the game thoroughly. Besides, he has in Herman a fast youth, a strong boy and terrific power. No matter how strong the fight, it looks as if Farmer will have his hands full.

Gorman will have to extend himself against Sam Langford, the ebony-hued featherweight. Langford has not been seen here in some time, but when he was fighting in Peter Mitchell and others can testify. One night he and Mitchell stood toe to toe and slugged each other in a fierce draw.

Willis will have to use all his cunning and ring generalship against Frankie Murphy. It is said by those who have seen Murphy in action, that he has defeated such boys as Bryan Downey, Stanley Yankum, Joe Rivers, Ad Wolgast and a host of others of more or less caliber.

Earl Zimmerman once defeated Sammy Gordon; that was many months ago. Sammy has greatly improved since then, and he is out to avenge himself on Earl.

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
