

RHODES SCHOLAR FINDS SEA LEGS AND BIG APPETITE

Read college recently received its first news of the adventures of Frank Flint, Oregon's Rhodes scholar for 1920, who sailed for England January 3. QUANTITY OF MILK USED IN CITY OF PORTLAND IS DECLARED HIGHEST

Belief that Portland obtains the purest milk and dairy products possible is contained in the annual report of Dr. D. W. Mack, chief of the dairy and milk division, which was submitted this morning to Dr. George Parrish, city health officer.

"There is reason for congratulation when more than half of the milk supply of a city analyses less bacterially than is required by ordinance for certified milk," said Dr. Parrish, in commenting on Dr. Mack's report.

The report shows that 406 animals, from 782 dairy herds, were inspected by the division for tuberculosis. Of this number 152 animals were slaughtered. The laboratories tested 4790 samples of milk in application.

Principal trouble of keeping Portland's milk supply pure comes from shippers who bring in milk by boat, train or automobile, according to Dr. Mack. The standard of purity would be higher if outside shippers would produce milk equal to local producer-distributors, says the report. Accomplishment of this can be made by the central plants buying on a quality basis.

BIGGEST CARGO OF GUNNY SACKS FOR SEASON JUST IN

Of the 200 tons of general merchandise cargo brought by the steamer Abercrombie from the Orient Friday, close to 100 tons were baled gunny sacks for wheat, the largest consignment so far of the season's movement in gunnies.

The Abercrombie is at municipal terminal No. 4, where 500 tons of soy bean oil are being pumped into the new storage tanks. Preceding steamers of this line brought in small lots of gunnies, but neither ship had as many as the Abercrombie carried. But the lot on the Abercrombie is comparatively small to what is expected in this port of origin between now and July 1.

The gunnies are taken from Calcutta to Hongkong on the smaller intercoastal lines for transshipment. The new schedule of the Portland-Canton line was prepared, showing Hongkong as a port of call only during the months of February to May, inclusive, and about the only reason the steamers will call then will be for the gunnies.

Roseburg, April 24.—Anticipating the drive of the Salvation Army, ex-soldier members of the Knights of Pythias of this city have set the pace for donations in Douglas county. The allotment for Douglas county is \$6000. Based on former drives an amount like this would call for \$5 from the fraternal orders per 100 members. The lodge, after hearing the boys explain how they were so taken care of by the Salvation Army service overseas, donated \$32.

Advance in Phone Rates Are Granted Union County Line

Salem, Or., April 24.—An increase in the rates of the Union County Telephone company to a point comparable with the lowest rates charged by the Home Telephone company, operating in the same territory, is granted in an order issued by the public service commission Friday and effective May 1.

The new order affects all patrons of the Union Telephone company.

The order also abolishes free inter-exchange of service between the various exchanges of the company, which practice is characterized as "unjust, unreasonable and unjustly discriminatory," and fixes a schedule of tolls.

Since the application for increased rates was filed with the commission the Union County Telephone company has disposed of its interest in the Union, Cove and La Grande exchange, and the Home Telephone company of La Grande and its Summerville-Imbler exchanges of the Union Telephone company.

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Load Drops Span; Iron Dumped, Man And Truck Escape

Astoria, April 24.—The draw of the Wallis river bridge broke down Friday morning and will be closed to traffic for several days while temporary repairs are being made.

The bridge, which was being repaired, was caused by a truck driven by Jenner Parker, and laden with four tons of railroad iron from the Western Cooperative company's camp, running onto the south end of the draw when it lacked about 18 inches of being closed.

The result was that the draw was broken in two, the south half dropping into the water. The truck hung by its front end on the draw rest and its load of railroad iron went overboard.

The driver escaped without injury.
