

JOHNSON TO LOSE OWN STATE, SAYS SECRETARY JORDAN

Official Declares California Aspirant Will Not Get More Than Handful of Republican Votes.

Senator Hiram Johnson will "fan out on the plate," when it comes to the primary election in his native state, according to Frank C. Jordan, secretary of state of California. Jordan is touring the Northwest in the interests of Hoover or anyone else who is opposed to Johnson, and incidentally looking after the sale of state rights in a punctureless automobile tube. He has been secretary of state of California for 12 years, and prior to that was clerk of the California supreme court for four years and clerk of Alameda county for eight years, so it stands to reason that he knows something about political straws and political winds, as well as punctured tubes.

MANY OPPOSED TO HIM

According to Jordan's declaration, Senator Johnson isn't a Republican and won't get more than a handful of Republican votes; the Progressives of Southern California, who were formerly staunch adherents of Johnson, have turned him down because of his opposition to the League of Nations; 25,000 members of the four railroad brotherhoods will oppose his nomination on account of his record on labor legislation; the "wets" are solid in opposition because Johnson favored the national prohibition movement and for similar reasons he lost the friendship of the viticulturists of his home state; all the women in California are strong for Hoover, and just to rub it in a bit, Jordan predicts that at least 180,000 Democrats will go into the Republican primaries and vote for Hoover.

JOHNSON'S HISTORY

Johnson's political history, as outlined by Jordan, is as follows: In 1890 he registered as a Republican and was elected on that ticket as governor of California; he joined the Progressive party in 1912 and threw his influence against Taft in the presidential election; in 1914 Johnson was still a Progressive and as such defeated a Republican nominee for governor; in 1915 he introduced in the state legislature a nonpartisan bill which would have destroyed all party organization and made it necessary for the people twice to kill the measure by referendum vote; in 1915 he also secured the passage of amendments to the California primary law so that voters may express their preference for candidates regardless of party registration; Johnson registered as a Progressive in 1916, according to Jordan, and after inducing thousands of members of that party to register as Republicans, "fished the nomination for the United States senate on the Republican ticket"; he failed to throw his strength to Hughes that year and con-

tributed materially to the election of a Democratic president.

This is Hiram Johnson's record up to 1920, according to Jordan, who adds that "this year he is registered as a Republican to get a job as president of the United States."

CAR RIDERS TO LOSE OR GAIN; NOT COMPANY

pany, it appears, is to get more money, and it is to be either by reduction of expense or increase in fares.

It is the car rider that is affected solely and entirely. Either his burden is partially relieved through removal of fixed charges, or is added to by increased fares on top of the charges.

Furthermore, argue the experts, the money now paid to the company in the fixed charges is of no value whatever to the corporation.

TAX ON CAR RIDER

It does not pay wages, pay for equipment, pay for tracks or pay for operating expenses. It is turned by the company over to the city to be used in defraying municipal expenses. It is a tax on the car rider through the company, and for all the good it does the corporation it had as well not be collected.

However, if the company were not required to meet the expenses of municipal government through the charges, just that much less revenue would car riders be compelled to pay, say authorities. And they emphasize that the fixed charges does not redound to the benefit of the company, but to the benefit of the company backers, the car riders.

Regents Confirm Dr. Dillehunt Dean Until Term Closes

University of Oregon, Eugene, April 24.—The appointment of Dr. Richard B. Dillehunt of Portland as dean of the university medical school in Portland was confirmed until June today by the regents of the university in special meeting. Dr. Dillehunt was named to succeed the late Dr. K. A. J. Mackenzie. No intimation was given as to what appointment would be taken in regard to the appointment for next year.

The regents also confirmed the appointment of Professor Walter C. Barnes as head of the history department, succeeding Dr. Joseph Schafer, who left to take up work at the University of Wisconsin. Dr. Warren D. Smith was granted a year's leave of absence for research in the Philippines and his place is to be taken by Dr. E. T. Hodge of the University of British Columbia.

Will Represent Oregon

At the forty-third annual convention of the National Electric Light association in Pasadena, Cal., May 18-21, tentative program for which has just been issued, Oregon will be represented by Franklin T. Griffith, president of the Portland Railway, Light & Power company, reporting on the year's development. Griffith is chairman of the N. E. L. A. committee on water power development.

A company of state cavalry, consisting of 80 men, has been organized and sworn in at Pocatello.

VILLA TO ASSIST OBREGON'S REVOLT

Rebel Chief Has Definitely Decided to Join Forces Opposed to Carranza.

Washington, April 24.—(U. P.)—Francisco Villa, rebel chief, has definitely joined the Obregon revolt to overthrow President Carranza, despite the fact that General Obregon is known as the "only man who ever defeated Villa," according to an announcement tonight at the headquarters of General Alvarado, representative here of the revolution.

The news of the Mexican revolution available in Washington today was one-sided, practically all favoring the rebelling. Dispatches were received today from Chihuahua City that Villa had sent assurances to Governor De la Huerta of Sonora that he would cooperate with the revolution against the Mexican federal troops in Chihuahua.

Villa declared that the federal would not be allowed to leave Chihuahua to invade Sonora.

Alvarado said Villa is fully prepared for his campaign in Chihuahua in support of the Obregon revolt. In his foray several months ago in Coahuila, the home state of President Carranza, Villa confiscated a large amount of ammunition that Carranza had secretly stored at Musquiz, according to Alvarado.

naturally that Senator Johnson will win the Republican nomination.

"BROTHER" JOHNSON RADICAL

But Brother Johnson is not altogether satisfactory to the conservatives in the Republican party. They accuse him of radicalism. His friends respond that Hiram is a liberal and a safe one at that, and if the Republicans don't take Johnson, they are likely to get a Democratic radical, which is supposed to be a worse fate than would be in store for the country than if the California senator were elected.

The Republican leaders, however, know very well that the extreme views of Johnson on the peace treaty would be embarrassing, for if he were the nominee it would remove the cry for the Lodge reservations. Senator Johnson voted against them all. So as Johnson develops the Republicans must find some man who "stands right" on the treaty issue. Governor Lowden, Leonard Wood, Senator Harding—all wanted the Lodge reservations to accompany America's entrance into the league. But to offset Johnson, somebody must be brought forth who can carry the West, someone who is also a progressive and someone who isn't too closely affiliated with Eastern Republicanism.

HOPE FOR HOOVER

That is what is giving the Hoover sup-

porters encouragement. They point to Herbert Hoover, as a progressive Republican and a Westerner. The California primaries will show that he has strength in both parties. The more Johnson appears as the "menace," to conservative Republicanism, the more necessary will it be to pick someone who can prevent Johnson from forming a third party. Hoover is popular outside the political organizations. He is moreover liked by business men who believe his judgment would be more in sympathy with large business enterprises and would encourage individual initiative more than would that of the radical senator from California.

JOHNSON IS FEARED

So as the situation appears today, the Republican conservatives of the East are apprehensive of Senator Johnson. They fear a third party if he is turned down at Chicago. And if that doesn't happen they realize what the effect can be of Johnsonian "support." There was no third party in 1916 and Hiram Johnson "supported" Governor Hughes, but the people of California knew that the senator was merely keeping party pledges and that he was affronted by the intimacy of the Republican presidential nominee with the reactionary wing of the Republican party in California.

The Republican leaders must consider three things—how not to offend Johnson if they don't nominate him and how to keep his followers in line for the Republican nominee and how to retain the independent vote which has shown a dislike for the organizations in both political parties in the formation of Hoover clubs throughout the country.

STRENGTH HELPS HOOVER

Just now it looks as if Johnson's strength helps the cause of Herbert Hoover—the only Republican prominent in the public eye with the exception of William Howard Taft, who could do serious damage to the Democratic plans to use the treaty as an issue or vehicle whereby control of the government would be retained for the next four years. Hoover has stood from the beginning for the League of Nations and the peace treaty with changes or revisions such as sentiment in the allied world is demanding.

Accused Bound Over

Phillip Nusser waived a hearing in the municipal court Saturday on a charge of larceny and was bound over to the grand jury under \$1000 bond. Nusser was unable to furnish it. He is charged with robbing the room of J. C. Knuth, 54 King street, of about \$200 worth of valuables and personal effects.

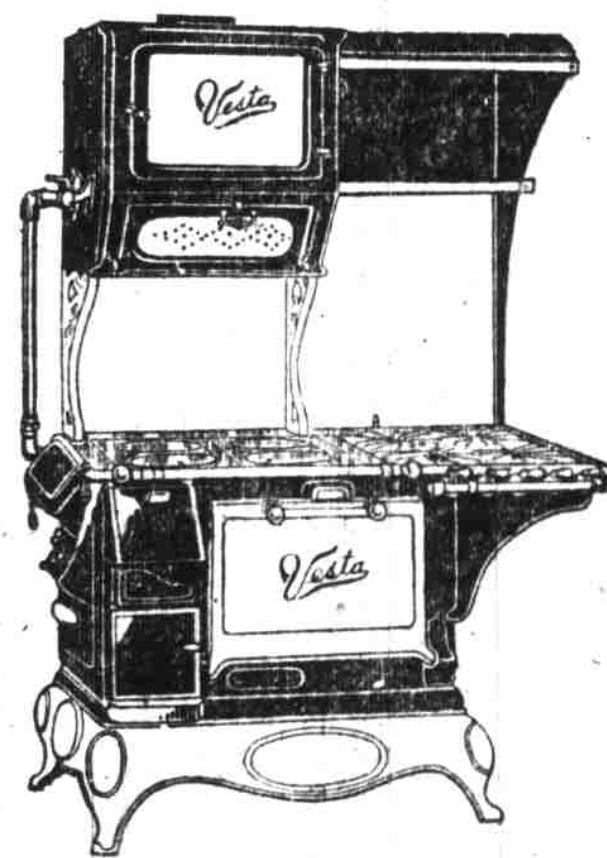

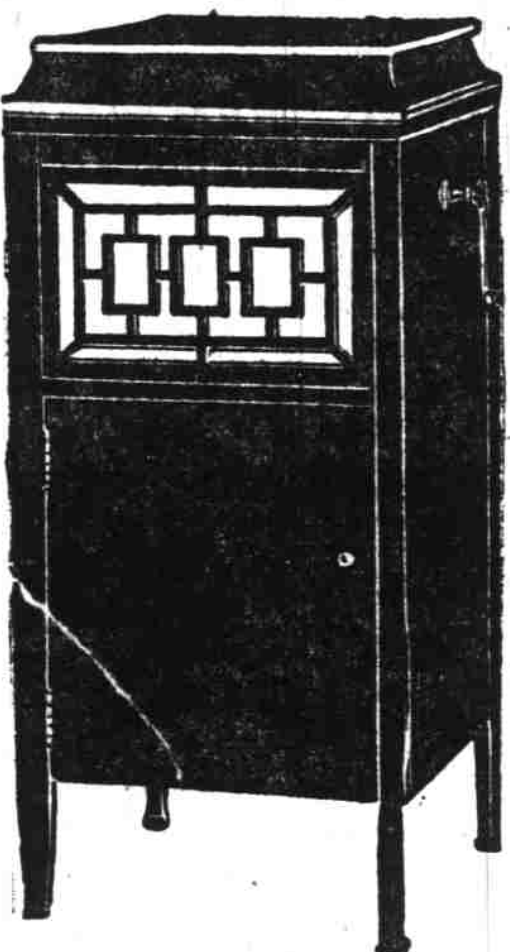

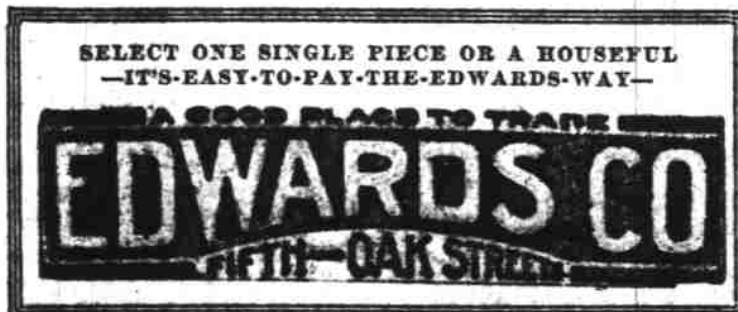
