

MONTANA VOTE IS PYLING UP FOR HIRAM JOHNSON

Factional Fight Among Republicans
Makes Vote on Delegates
Doubtful; Returns Delayed.

Helena, Mont., April 24.—(U. P.)—Exceeding in early returns the total vote cast for all other Republican presidential candidates, the sweeping victory of Senator Hiram Johnson in Friday's Montana primaries became apparent tonight although only a small percentage of the ballots were reported as yet. Indications are that he carried the state by at least 5000 plurality.

Totals from 240 precincts out of the 1500 in the state showed: Johnson, 7688; Wood, 2212; Hoover, 1578; Lowden, 1408; Harding, 243.

DEMOCRATS WRITE IN VOTES

No Democratic candidate having filed, many voters expressed their preference by writing in the names of leading Democratic possibilities, including President Wilson, Champ Clark, Attorney General Palmer, William G. Adoo and Governor Edwards of New Jersey. The makeup of the Montana delegation of eight to the national Republican convention probably will not be known for several days, two states being in the field as a result of a split in Montana Republican ranks. The delegation is expected, however, to be controlled by Johnson. The Democratic delegates will go to San Francisco uninstructed. The Montana "direct" primaries select the national delegates as well as affording the voters an opportunity to express their presidential preferences. Johnson carried Billings, Great Falls, Butte and Lewiston by a narrow margin and Anaconda by 12 to 1.

JOHNSON'S MANAGER AMAZED

Hugh Carter, son of former Senator Carter of Montana, who managed Johnson's campaign, characterized Johnson's victory as "stunning." Carter is the youngest leading politician in the state, having just been mustered out of the army, where he bore a commission. Democrats opposed to the League of Nations voted for Johnson, according to Carter. There was little concealment during the campaign preceding the primary election that opposition in the league in both parties would concentrate on Johnson.

RACE FOR SECOND PLACE CLOSE

Governor Frank O. Lowden and Major General Leonard Wood are running a close race for second place, although Herbert Hoover is expected to carry the strength in late returns and may land within hailing distance of the others. Senator Harding of Ohio has been least than 400 votes in returns from 10 of the 31 counties.

For delegates to the national convention, the result is in doubt, with the eight designated delegates showing rather more strength as a body than any other group.

HAYS WOULD AVOID FIGHT

FOR CONVENTION CHAIRMAN

Washington, April 24.—Organization of the Republican convention at Chicago without a fight is the aim of the national chairman, Will Hays, which brought him to Washington today for conferences with party leaders. Hays came down to try to smooth out differences between the league and anti-league elements in the party, each of which desires to name the chairman of the convention and thereby control the tone of the "keynote" speech. The standpaters want Senator Lodge as chairman in order that he may outline a policy for ratification of the treaty with reservations, while the progressive have put forward Senator Borah, leader of the senate irreconcilables.

Hays would like to have Senator Lodge preside over the convention. He doesn't want to have a fight over it, however, and if the contest between the two factions in the party becomes really serious, Hays will urge a compromise. Former Senator Albert J. Beveridge, of Hays' own state of Indiana, already has been proposed as a compromise candidate. Standpaters object to him, however, for the reason that he takes the same position on the treaty as does Senator Borah.

Chairman Hays always has his political weather gauge in working order. He can sniff a fight from afar. And when the signs of ruction appear he is always ready to get on the job and try to fix things up. That is why he came here to see senators in the opposing camps and tender his offices as pacificator.

BRYAN ALREADY EN ROUTE TO SAN FRANCISCO CONVENTION

St. Paul, Minn., April 24.—(U. P.)—William Jennings Bryan is getting an early start to the San Francisco Democratic national convention. He was here today en route to the Coast. "The peace treaty, unless it is ratified by the senate beforehand," he said, "probably will be made the paramount issue of the campaign." "I believe I know as much about politics as any other man," Bryan said. "I am going to the San Francisco convention to do what I can on a great occasion."

DEMOCRATS WILL 'FIND' CANDIDATE, DECLARES DUBOIS

Former Idaho Senator on Way to
Help Japanese Couple Out of
Immigration "Hock Shop."

Uninstructed delegates to the national Democratic convention at San Francisco will "find" a Democratic candidate for the presidency without the aid of the unit rule.

Such is the opinion of Senator Fred T. Dubois of Blackfoot, Idaho, who is in Portland en route to Seattle with his mind centered upon the serious business of getting a Japanese and the wife he has just brought from the blossom kingdom out of the immigration service "hock shop," as the senator puts it.

WOULD FREE COUPLE

Armed with a message from Mrs. Dubois advising him of the detention of the Japanese, who recently returned to his native land to accompany his wife to the new world, the senator will put the immigration inspectors on the back and post all of Idaho as a bond to assure the faith of the Japanese couple—but he must get that pair free. What is national legislation as compared with the terrors of having one's very best farm hand confined by immigration authorities because he has attended to his wife's immigration?

The senator can see some difference, sure enough, but Mrs. Dubois can't and she wants that Jap and she wants his wife. If the senator can turn the trick she shall have them.

But as to politics, which the senator forsook a month ago to make a brief trip into the home state!

FAVORITE SONS NOW

"Presidential possibilities are chiefly favorite sons as yet," the senator declared Saturday evening. "As far as the Democrats are concerned, the candidate will be 'found' at the San Francisco convention."

"I believe, really, that not more than one seventh of the delegates will go to the convention with instructions. They will be told to do their best and that will be good enough for the party. I rather expect Oregon's delegates will be instructed, but in some other states with preferential primaries no candidates for delegates filed."

Pendleton, April 24.—Five Democrats and 14 Republicans are on the primary ballot for Umatilla county offices. The Democratic candidates include J. B. Saylor of Freewater for county judge; B. E. Anderson of Pendleton and Lane Egan of Freewater for county commis-

sioner; W. W. Green of Pendleton for county school superintendent; and Tillman D. Taylor of Pendleton for sheriff. Anderson, Green and Taylor are incumbents.

Keater for district attorney, all of Pendleton; Mrs. Clara Farbridge Stone of Athena for county school superintendent; S. D. ONLY CONTEST IN UNION CO.

IS OVER OFFICE OF SHERIFF
