

SENTIMENT STRONG FOR SPLIT SESSION, DECLARES PIERCE

That sentiment in Southern Oregon is almost unanimous in favor of the proposed bill to have divided sessions of the state legislature was the statement made today by Senator Walter M. Pierce of La Grande, who returned Sunday from an extended trip down state, where he spoke in behalf of the measure at all the larger cities.

"I find that the farmers especially are enthusiastic about this amendment," said Pierce, "and the only opposition amounting to anything comes from the old-line machine politicians. These men refuse to admit there is anything radically wrong with the present method of conducting the legislature. For the simple reason that they have always gotten what they wanted."

FEAR LIGHT ON BILLS

"They refuse to see that their attitude is not expressive of the will of the people. They are against allowing the light of day to be thrown on bills before their adoption, which will happen if the amendment for a divided session goes through. It is such men as these that are causing the very dissatisfaction that exists concerning the present methods of conducting the legislature in this state."

"Circuit Judge John S. Coke of Marshfield told me that by having the attorney general examine bills and pass on their constitutionality or validity in accord with existing statutes, during the 60-day interval between sessions and before their final ratification at the second session, litigation would be materially reduced. This alone would be of inestimable saving to the taxpayers."

"Under the present system bills are jammed through, adopted as laws, and then, upon examination by the attorney general, are found to be full of holes. As a result, they are attacked in the courts. That does everything up. It costs money, and meanwhile the purpose for which the measure was intended fails."

TIME TO FIND FLAWS

"Under the divided sessions, all bills adopted tentatively at the initial session will be scrutinized by the attorney general and his staff between sessions. If there are any technical flaws, if the bills conflict with existing statutes, or if they are plainly unconstitutional, these flaws can all be pointed out in a report on each which will be submitted to the legislators in the last session at which the bills will be finally adopted."

"This is only one of the advantages of the divided sessions," stated Pierce. "Others are that by allowing 60 days to elapse from the time the bills are introduced, during which period the legislators will be at home, they can determine whether such acts express the will of the people, which should be the ultimate test of every law."

Parcel Post Mail Filed Up in Grant County, Is Charged

Baker, April 27. — In answer to the charge that the Canyon City-Monument mail stage service is inadequately equipped and that nearly 115 tons of

parcel post mail lies undelivered at various points between Canyon City and Long Creek, Postal Inspector Means has promised the people of Grant county that the service will be improved and that the parcels will be delivered immediately, according to word received in Baker. It is reported that pressure is being brought to bear upon Frank Holiday, mail contractor, both by his bondsmen and Inspector Means, to remedy the situation. The bondsmen have said that they will see that the promises are carried out.

Upon the request of both parties to a condemnation suit, the circuit court here has issued an order whereby the city is giving clear title to a tract of land 250 feet wide and 300 feet long adjacent to the present city park, to be used as an automobile tourist camp and natatorium site at a price of \$1980.

Baker is in the midst of a general clean-up and paint-up campaign in which the Chamber of Commerce, Alpha club, women's organization and city officials are cooperating. Grade schools are adding with \$50 in prizes at stake. Against those who neglect to join in the campaign the city officials have promised to invoke municipal ordinances.

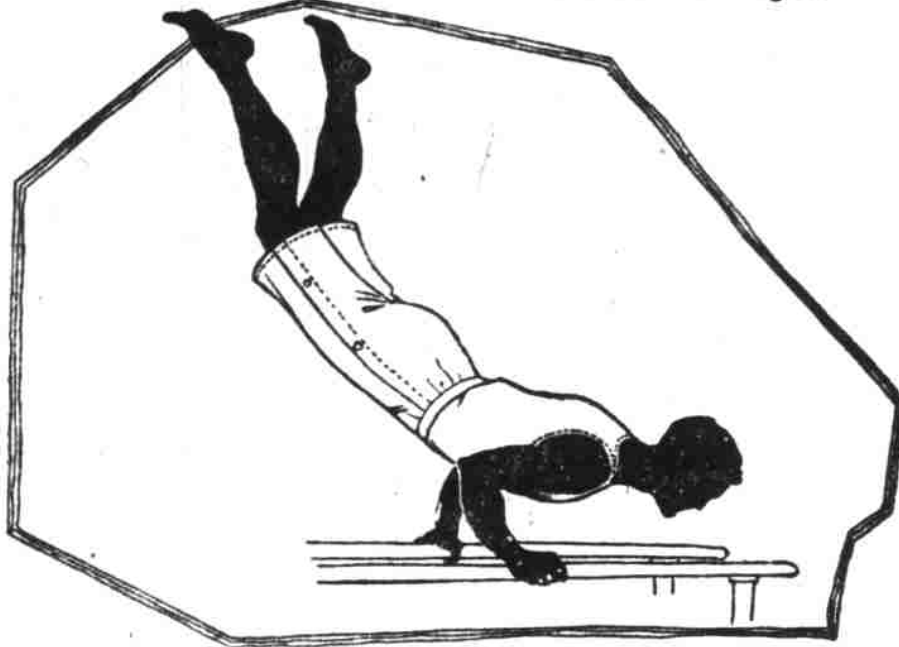
Overalls Adopted By 100 Employees of Marshall-Wells Co.

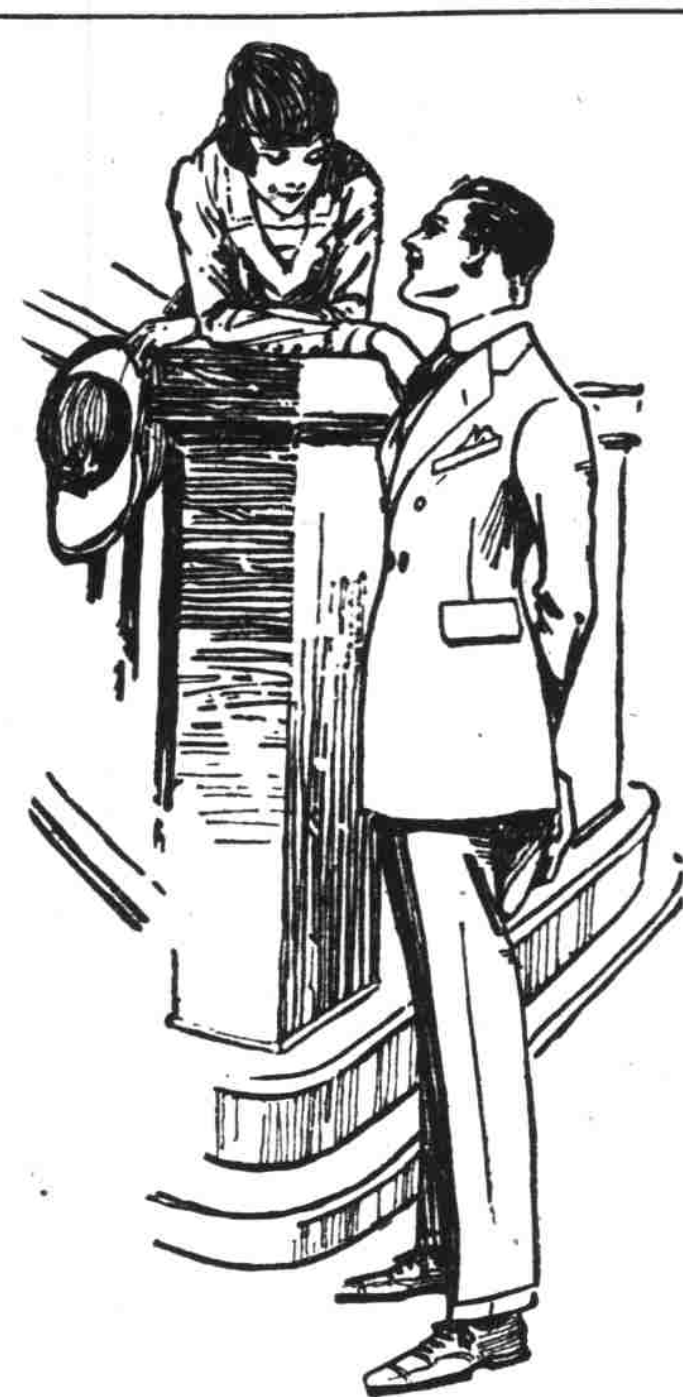
