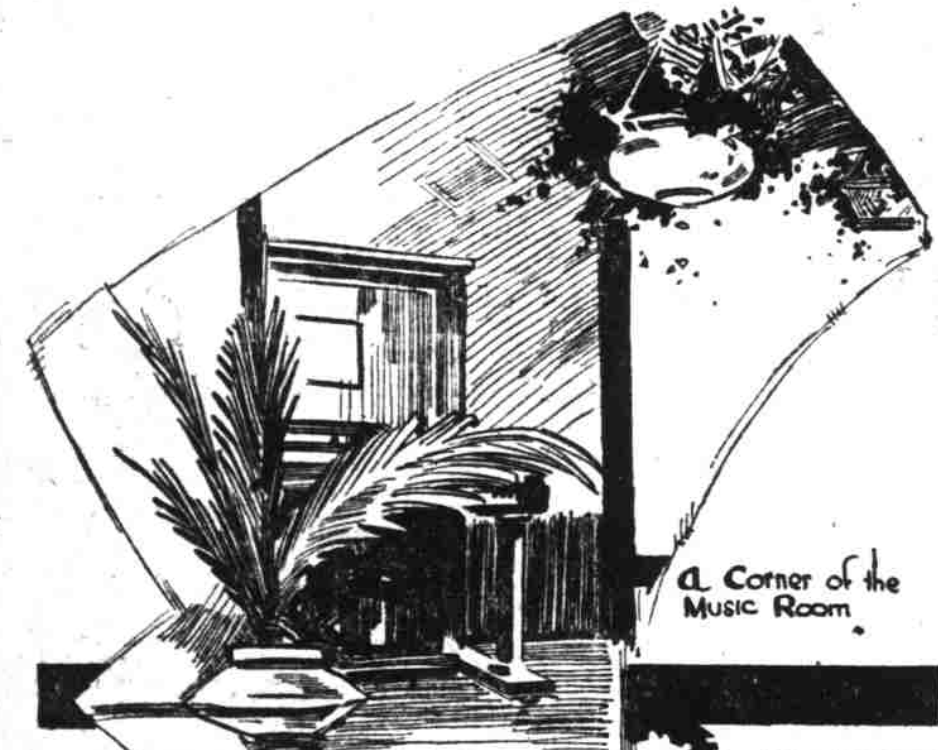
TODAY'S FORECASTS

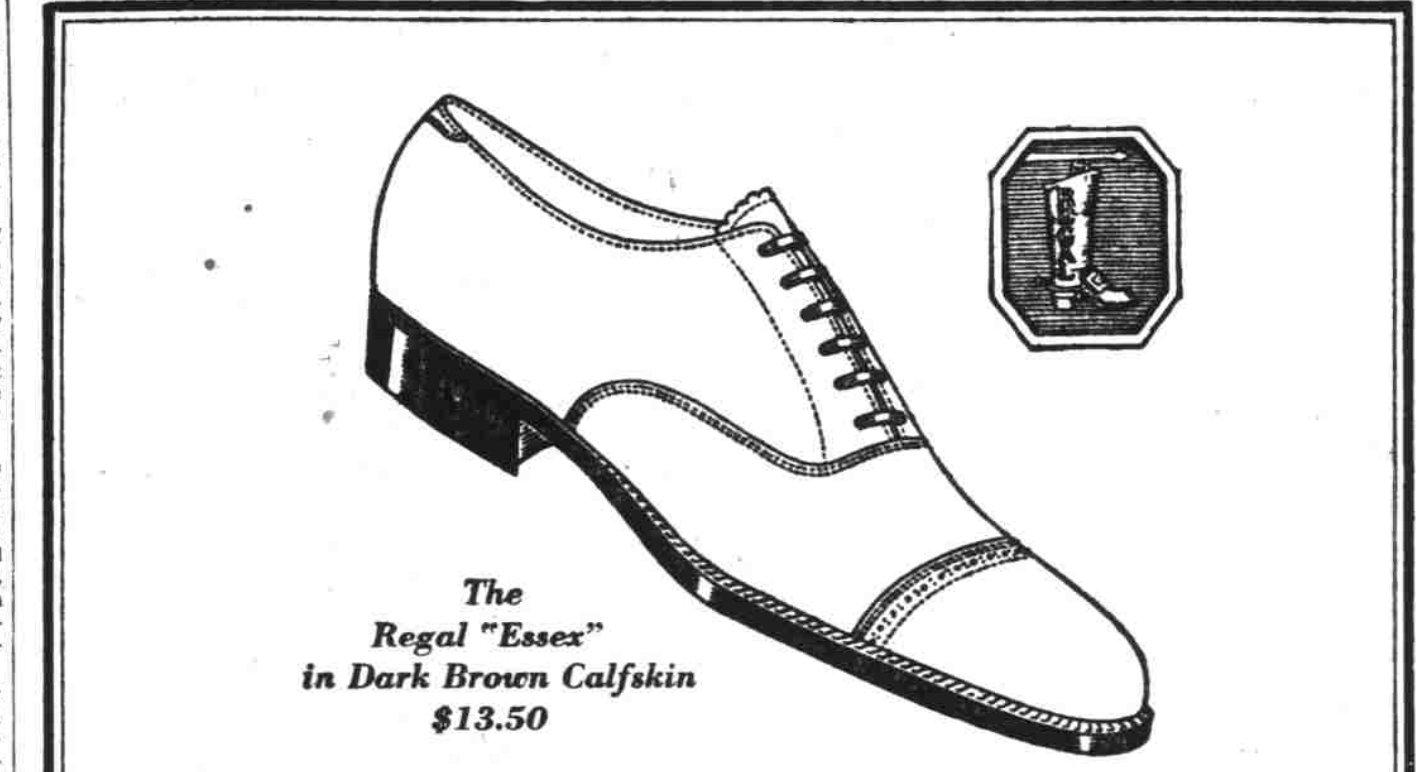
