

BONUS FIGHT IS HINGING ON EXCESS PROFITS DEMANDS

Washington, April 29.—If the house members adhering to the excess profits tax method of raising the soldier bonus money stick to their guns on Monday, when the Republican ways and means committee measure providing for a sales tax is reported in, they will not only prevent a vote on the proposition but will delay indefinitely consideration of soldier aid legislation this session.

To suspend the rules and pass their bill the Republicans on the ways and means committee must have with them a two thirds vote. But with 95 per cent of the Democrats (some 180 members) plus 75 "insurgent" Republicans against them, as now claimed, the sponsors of the committee measure will not only have fewer than the required two thirds, but at the outside will have some 38 less than a clear majority.

That both parties in the house fear the sales tax provision of the committee bill, even in its amended form, which applies only to final retail sales, is evident. The Republicans want to force us to vote either for a tax that will hit all the people who didn't go to war, or go on record as voting against legislation designed to help the soldiers," was the way one Democratic member put it today.

But be that as it may," added one of the insurgent Republicans, "we will keep voting down the committee bill until we compel them to bring in an excess profits measure of some sort—which they'll have to do if they are going to have any kind of a bonus bill to go before the soldiers with this fall."

JOINTS ON EXCESS PROFITS
Owing to the absence of Chairman Fordrey of the ways and means committee that body has been more or less marking time this week. Thursday a delegation of wounded soldiers from Walter Reed hospital, Washington, has asked to be heard before it in opposition to the bonus, and it is probable the request will be granted.

Friday morning, with its chairman back, the committee will have a final "ironing out" session to perfect its bill. And Friday night the bill will be presented to the Republican caucus, when an attempt to bring Johnson's insurgents into line before the Monday vote will be made.

OFFICERS WOULD SHARE
Defending the excess profits tax bills introduced by himself and Johnson, Representative Henry T. Rainey, Illinois, Democrat, said today:

"Our bill applies only to the taxable year 1920. The method of arriving at the amount to be taxed takes into consideration the profits of other years, but takes into consideration 20 per cent of the 1920 profits. The committee proposed, even if spread over two years, would take only about 10 per cent of the profits we propose to reach."

Captains and first and second lieutenants in the army and navy share in the bonus, according to the ways and means bill as at present drawn.

Seattle Chief of Police Has Fight With Insane Man

Henderson is said to have gone insane over a girl. While barricaded in a room, Henderson shouted threats to the police outside his room.

Guards on Erie Line Are Routed in Fight With Striking Reds

As the engineer of the freight pulled his train to a stop the men rushed from ambush and before the guards had an opportunity to use their weapons, had beaten four of them seriously and put several others to flight. The engineer uncoupled the engine and sped to Weehawken for reinforcements. When he returned, the attackers had disappeared.
