

PARSON SHOCKED AT COLLEGE GIRLS' STAGE RAIMENT

Chicago, April 29.—(U. N.)—"The naked woman on the American stage is just one short step into the future."

The Rev. Melbourne P. Boynton, pastor of the Woodlawn Baptist church and one of the most prominent ministers in Chicago, said this tonight—and more, much more.

The particular occasion for the arousing of Rev. Boynton's indignation was a vaudeville show given by co-eds of the University of Chicago. The young women appeared in costumes of interesting brevity, smoked cigarettes, and the lines of the show, in the judgment of the pastor, were "indecent and degrading."

PROTEST IS UNHEEDED
"Dr. Boynton left the entertainment during a 'classical dance,' and protested to university professors. They declined to interfere. It was then that Dr. Boynton decided to give them something upon which to ponder."

"When college women, supposed to represent the highest type of our womanhood, appear on a stage showing their bodies, smoking cigarettes and talking like abandoned hussies and their professors sit in the front row and slap each other on the back in applause of their display, I believe it is time to call a halt, if that is possible," he said.

FACULTIES ARE BLAMED
"If college faculties approve of such things, what can we expect to accomplish in elevating the low morals to be found in practically every theatre in America."

"Dramatic art is being smothered by the fleshly appeal. Our colleges, at least, should be one place where the better things might be expected. I have abandoned every theatrical offering in Chicago during the past year."

"From them, I have decided that the naked woman on the American stage is just one short step into the future. A dimpled knee, a voluptuous form, the bed room scene and filthy conversation are all that the theatrical managers of today offer us. Now our colleges and universities are aping them."

"Nothing is left to the imagination. I believe that the only reason some lewd minded manager has not attempted to show a naked woman on the stage is because they feel that complete nudity is not as attractive as a little decoration."

BALDED HEAD ROW FILLED
"They are holding off because they know that complete discussion will leave nothing for the future to offer. The bald-headed row goes to every show to see if the time has come."

"Now they vie with each other on coming as close to it as they can. A little dab of chiffon here, a puff of transparent silk there, and you have the musical comedy costume. The nudity and filth on the musical plays and farces sneer at virtue, laugh at fidelity and make a joke of every sacred principle upon which our social laws are founded."

"Girls stand before you quivering and doing their best to excite everything that is low and vile in their beholders. The kisses and embraces are of a nature that would not be displayed outside of a Barbary Coast dive."

"Now, I see that a manager is bringing a notorious Frenchwoman to America to appear in 'Afghanistan,' with the bald announcement that her performance will make 'Cleopatra' and 'Salome' seem like the timorous actions of lovesick school girls."

"I am simply sick."

Faculty members of the University of Chicago said they saw nothing immodest in the show given by the co-eds.

MISSED BIG SHOW
"Perhaps our morals are pretty low out here," said Professor James Weber Linn. "But that is all a matter of taste. My friends liked it."

"Some people feel it their duty to set themselves up as safeguards over the

morals of others," said Professor Robert Morris Lovett. "Dr. Boynton is that type. I wasn't at the university vaudeville. I wish to thunder I had been."
