

WOMAN'S VOTING CHANCE HANGING ON THIN THREAD

Washington, April 30.—(I. N. S.)—The last remaining chance of women voting in the national elections next November is hanging by a thread thinner than gossamer. In the opinion of National Woman's Party leaders here today, there remains just a shred of hope that the suffrage amendment to the constitution will be ratified in time to give women a voice in naming the next president of the United States.

TOO LATE TO QUALIFY
So it is that while suffrage leaders here are wearing brave faces and publicly hoping for the best, they privately admit there is considerable bitterness against both Democrats and Republicans because of the delayed ratification.

Charges may soon be leveled against both parties for blocking national votes for women.

UNDER SUSPICION

Both are now under suspicion because of a growing belief among women that neither is over-anxious to have a heavy feminine vote cast in this election which it is impossible to reckon with beforehand.

Admittedly an unknown quantity, such a scrap-heap of expert calculations of the professional politicians and for this reason many feminists here believe neither Republicans nor Democrats are especially anxious to hasten ratification.

Miss Alice Paul of New Jersey, chairman, with other members of the national executive committee of the Woman's party, however, refuse to give in and are now engaged in leading a forlorn hope charge against the amendment's enemies.

FIVE STATES POSSIBILITIES

Five states continue to be regarded as possibilities and every atom of the party's strength is being brought to bear in an attempt to induce at least one of them to ratify. Two states are really needed to make suffrage sure, for while one will make up the necessary 36 states ratifying, Ohio may have to drop out of line of ratifying states on a legal technicality.

The five states offering more or less ground for optimism are Delaware, Louisiana, North Carolina, Connecticut and Vermont. Delaware is described as doubtful with the rest more so. Feminists here admit that Vermont and Connecticut might as well be counted out, so slim is the chance of action in time to be of service this year.

Veteran Pickpocket, Freed From Prison, Will Live Straight

New York Eddy, 82, probably one of the oldest pickpockets alive today, walked into the Portland police department this morning to report to the captain of detectives.

"I just got out of the penitentiary, where I spent 17 months," he said. "I'm going to live straight now."

Captain Circle said he couldn't imagine a man 82 years of age, who has been a pickpocket for 50 or 60 years, and who has spent the greater part of his life behind the bars, reforming, so he turned him over to Inspector Tom Coleman, "the yegg detective," and told Coleman to see Eddy out of the city. Circle didn't want Eddy to stay here for the Shrine convention.

Eddy begged newspaper men not to write anything about him. "It always gets me into trouble," he said, "because the police are looking for me."

Irish Volunteers Recover Big Sum Of Stolen Money

Cork, April 30.—(I. N. S.)—The "Irish Volunteers" have succeeded in recovering more than half of the \$18,000 pounds (\$30,000) which was stolen from two bank messengers last November.

Some of the money was found hidden in kitchen ovens and tea-pots. Some was found secreted in boxes and hay stacks, while a quantity of paper money was found nailed to the floor under furniture.

Reprieve Snatches 4 Condemned Men From Executioner

Ossining, N. Y., April 30.—After their friends had abandoned all hope for them, the four men who were to have gone to the electric chair in Sing Sing prison here Thursday night in the first quadruple execution since the killing of the Rosenthal murderers in 1914, were reprieved at 7 o'clock last night.

Just four hours on earth remained to the men when Warden Louis Lawes finished a telephone conversation with Governor Smith and announced the news to the men and their agitated relatives. The executions were ordered to be postponed for two weeks, presumably on the strength of Milano's statement to the warden.
