

NEW INSTITUTION IS PART OF HOME SERVICE PROGRAM

Salvation Army School at Yamhill
Is to Give Practical Courses in
Agriculture and Industry.

A boys' and girls' industrial and agricultural school will come into being on the site of the Bishop Scott academy in Yamhill county during the present year, following the purchase of the property and buildings by the Salvation Army.

The conduct of the school, formerly the property of the Episcopal diocese of Oregon, will be one of the big phases of the Salvation Army's home service program for the year and the present financial campaign of the organization will provide finances for the institution.

\$40,000 ADDED TO FUND

The advisory board in convention in Portland decided to add \$40,000 to the budget for the 1920 program, to buy and equip the Bishop Scott school and farm of 100 acres, four miles from Yamhill station. This deal has been put through so that as a result of the present financial campaign title to the property will be transferred to the Episcopal diocese of Oregon to the Salvation Army. Fred German represented the diocese in the transfer. It is with thorough appreciation of the value to the state of trained agriculturists, versed in modern methods and with a knowledge of applied mechanics necessary to modern farming that the Salvation Army plans to make useful farm hands, if not farm experts, of many neglected and dependent youngsters.

At the Yamhill school, to be patterned after the famous Lytton school conducted by the Salvation Army in California, both boys and girls will find all the essentials of preparation for life. The girls will be taught sewing, household duties, cooking, etc. The boys will be trained in several trades and in farming, horticultural and animal husbandry pursuits and modern farm mechanics.

Through the efforts of the Salvation Army in Portland several boys have been taken from up state Oregon towns and placed at the California farm school temporarily until the funds made available by the financial campaign May 1 to May 10, provide for the opening of the Yamhill school. County advisory boards in every county in Oregon are helping the Salvation Army in this work with children.

MAIN SCHOOL BUILDING
The main school building is a two story structure covering 80x120 feet. A basement underlies the whole building. The exterior is finished in rough cement. The interior is of mill construction, natural grain and varnish. The first floor contains the school offices, school rooms, a parlor with big natural rock fireplace, dining rooms, study halls and chapel.

The second floor has sleeping room accommodations for 60 boys, four rooms for instructors, shower baths and other dormitory equipment.

The basement is concrete with several big store rooms, an engine room with live steam heating system, laundry with modern equipment, a spacious kitchen and quarters for the kitchen detail.

A large gymnasium is also located in the basement and in connection with it are shower baths and lockers. It is partially equipped with apparatus. There are eight tennis courts on the place, the school building, the faculty house of 14 rooms, a caretaker's cottage of four rooms, a general utility barn, a large cow barn capable of handling 60 head of dairy stock, a granary, a smaller barn and bunk house. Chicken runs and equipment for a large flock are provided. Considerable farm machinery is transferred in the deal.

CAREER OF VETERAN FIREMAN RECALLED



Captain Fred B. May

Captain Fred B. May, who died in the service of the Portland fire department April 22, was one of the oldest veterans of the bureau. He was first made a volunteer fireman in 1881, and a few years later became a houseman with engine 3, when it was formed. Afterwards he was made captain of engine 3 when it was organized, and held that position until his death.

12,648 Automobiles Counted Going and Coming Over Sandy

More than 12,000 vehicles, going and coming, were crowded over the Sandy road last Sunday between 5 a. m. and 8 p. m. C. M. LaFollett and S. A. Douglas, who live a quarter of a mile north of Fairview, spent the day counting the machines that passed their place. The result showed 6234 automobiles one way; 12,648 going and coming; motorcycles, 362; bicycles, 325; horse-drawn vehicles, 19.

The heaviest hour was from 2 to 3 p. m., when 1852 cars passed going and coming. In five minutes 235 cars passed. LaFollett and Douglas, estimating three-fourths of the cars caught some smelt with an average of 40 pounds each, decided 93½ tons of fish must have been carried past their house. While some of the cars had only a few pounds of smelt, others had from 200 to 300 pounds, they say, and most of them ran from 50 to 60 pounds per car.

The car count was reduced through many cars having to turn back between 2 and 4 p. m. because of congestion. No estimate was made of the amount of fish which traveled in other directions than over the Sandy road.

Worker Falls Into Cesspool Pit and Is Seriously Hurt

Milo Chandler, 60, of East Eighty-ninth and Morrison streets, is in a serious condition at the Portland sanitarium following a fall Saturday afternoon when he lost his hold on a rope. He dropped into a cesspool which he was digging at the home of W. H. Goss, 68 East Ninety-first street.

Chandler fell 25 feet and suffered a wrenched back and a lacerated head. Before the police patrol arrived, neighbors had pulled the workman from the pit.

KEHOE COMPLETES THIRTY YEARS ON COURTHOUSE JOB

Veteran Superintendent of Building
Receives Many Congratulations
for His Long Service.

Almost a third of a century of continuous service for Multnomah county is the proud record of venerable Ned Kehoe, superintendent of the Multnomah county courthouse. Tomorrow morning Kehoe will begin his thirty-first year of county service. He has been receiving many congratulations on his long record of faithful service.

Back in the days of the old courthouse, standing in the center of the square now occupied by the modern structure, began the service of Ned Kehoe for this county.

EARLY DAYS RECALLED

It was at the time when Judge Catlin was county judge and chairman of the county commissioners. His associate judges were Shattuck and Stearns. Other members of the county commission were David Dunn and J. E. Smith. Kehoe's first duties at the courthouse were those of window washer; then he advanced to janitor, and then to head janitor. When the new courthouse was completed in 1912 he was made superintendent of the building. Kehoe has been a resident of Portland since 1876, and has seen a constant procession of county officials come and go. But he is not like many old men who claim that "the old times were the best times." He believes that Multnomah county is fortunate in its pick of official material.

GETS MEASURE PASSED

Kehoe has the unique distinction of having had a special bill passed by the state legislature in his behalf. Two years ago the legislature provided that he should be retired on pension with payment of a certain proportion of the regular salary of his position, to be paid during the remainder of his lifetime by Multnomah county, in recognition of his long and faithful service to the public. He is now 73 years of age.

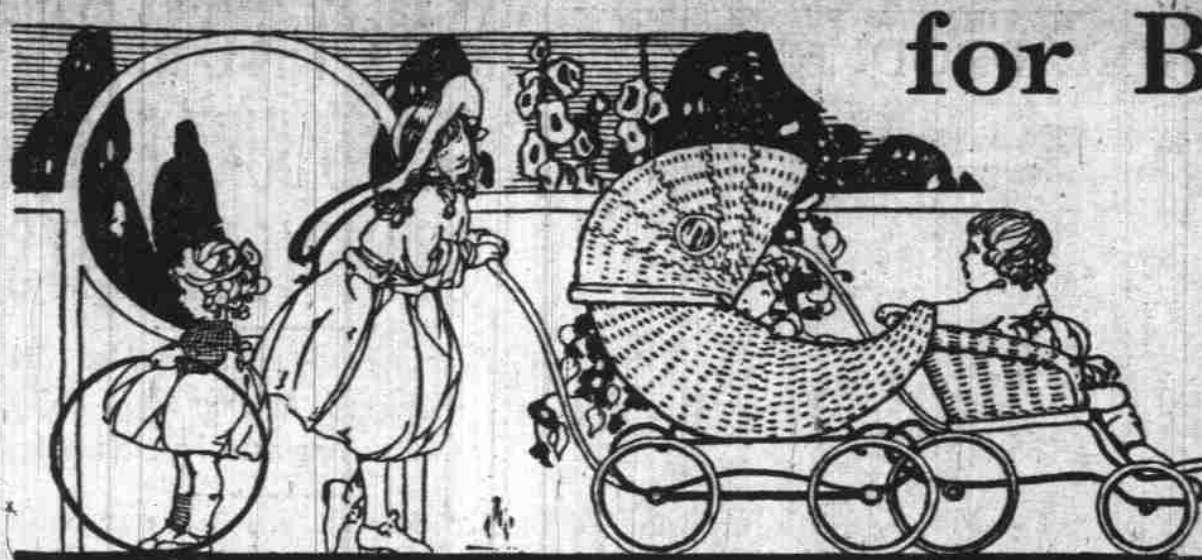
And while Ned Kehoe leads the van in the number of years of continuous service to the county, there are almost enough other long-time employees at the courthouse to form an organization of "Courthouse Pioneers," such as exists at some county seats.

OLD TIMERS NAMED

There is Penumbra Kelly, former sheriff, and now a bailiff in Circuit Judge Morrow's court, whose time reaches back almost a score of years; Lew A. Harlow, chief clerk of the circuit courts, with 20 years in the county service; Aloysius Harlow, of the assessor's office, who comes to the Kehoe record; Henry Reed, now county assessor, but for years a clerk of the circuit court; T. S. Wells and J. H. Bush, deputies in the county clerk's office, with service since July of 1902; and numerous others with records of county service reaching back to the regime of the old courthouse.
