

ACTIVE BUSINESS MEN ARE PUT IN CONTROL OF ALBANY CHAMBER

Albany, Or., May 2.—Steps toward focusing influence on the development of the Albany Chamber of Commerce were taken at a meeting Friday night. In the election of officers for the next year a group of active business men was placed at the helm of the organization, with W. R. Scott as president. The chamber will employ a paid secretary and established its own headquarters, it was announced.

A "finetooth comb" membership canvass will be opened soon in an effort to raise a fund for initial projects. Besides the president, officers elected are: J. M. Hawkins, vice-president; C. E. Williamson, secretary; E. B. Chubb, treasurer. Department of bureau chiefs are: W. V. Merrill, finance; F. J. Miller, legislation and taxation; B. R. Westbrook, social; S. T. Swartz, agricultural; Dr. J. H. Robnett, civic improvements; A. C. Schmitt, industry; W. L. Jackson, education.

Ralph R. Cronise, C. E. Murphy, E. M. Reagan, F. J. Miller and George Sanders were appointed as a committee on arrangements for a dinner to be given in honor of the Ad club when its caravan arrives in Albany on the way to the Stockton convention of advertising clubs.

Inquiry Into Rent Situation Is to Be Asked in Astoria

Astoria, May 2.—At the meeting of the city council this evening the board of directors of the Astoria Chamber of Commerce will ask Mayor Bremner and the city council to make an investigation of the rent situation to the end that all lawful means be employed to prevent landlords from exacting exorbitant rentals from their tenants.

The action of the board results from the multiplicity of complaints which have been coming in relative to continual and excessive advances in rents. Reports have been received of rentals which have been doubled within a few months and the board takes the position that such a practice is not only driving away residents from Astoria, but is imposing an unjust tax upon those whose interests keep them here.

Dining Room Leased

Dayton, Wash., May 2.—L. N. Lee, recently of the Grand hotel of Walla Walla, has leased the dining room of Mrs. Blanche Beckett, who lately assumed the management of the Hotel Dayton. This dining room has been closed for the past seven months.

Martin Clark Free From Eugene Jail; Friends Raise Bail

Eugene, May 2.—After nine months of almost continuous confinement in the county jail, Martin Clark, under sentence to four years in the penitentiary, is temporarily a free man. Personal friends who had money behind them rallied to his aid in raising the amount of his bail bond—\$4000—and Sunday was released.

Records in the office of the county court show that the high cost of living or some other factor has made the record for marriages lower than usual for the month of April. There were but 18 licenses issued in that period, and in the same time there were eight applications for divorce before the circuit court.

Figures in the office of the city recorder show that during April there were either let or pending street improvement contracts aggregating \$47,011.20, and covering 22 blocks of paving and macadamizing. At the same time the city is paying interest on bonds for past improvements to the amount of \$1,066,000. Its monthly current expense bill runs from \$7000 to \$10,000.

Orchards, Decked in Blossoms, Visited

Salem, May 2.—Several hundred shut-ins, old folks of Salem who do not own automobiles of their own, were taken on rides through the prune and cherry districts of Marion and Polk counties Sunday for a view of the blossoms which are now at the height of their beauty. The tours were arranged through the Commercial club.

Slide Stops Trains To Astoria Sunday

Astoria, May 2.—No trains arrived here from Portland Sunday, owing to a slide near Clatskanie. One of the cranes owned by the Port of Astoria is being used to remove the rock and dirt.

Pioneer Dies at Baker
Baker, May 2.—Washington Chenault, aged 77, pioneer of Union county, died at the hospital Saturday as the result of injuries sustained in a runaway accident here three weeks ago, when he suffered a broken hip and a severe scalp wound. Chenault came to Oregon in 1880 and settled near Cove. Two sons and three daughters survive.

Glendale Woman Dies
Glendale, Or., May 2.—Mrs. Fred Schrodtt died at the family home at Lystul Siding, 2½ miles from this city, from an acute attack of appendicitis. The funeral was held at Glendale.

Two Airplanes to Visit O. A. C. Campus Junior Week-End

Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, May 2.—Two airplanes will be brought to Corvallis for the college's junior week-end, May 21 and 22, according to Victor Vernon of the Oregon, Washington, Idaho Airplane company. J. D. Hill and Walter Lees will be the pilots.

A movement is on foot on the campus to organize an aviation club to affiliate with the Aero club of America. Vernon has promised that his company would cooperate with this movement by sending down parts to be inspected and arranged for a series of lectures.

W. K. Taylor's ranch just north of town has been selected as the landing place. Immediately after arriving Saturday afternoon one of the planes will circle the athletic field and drop a ball for the opening game with the University of Oregon.

A party of 14 college students and faculty members spent the week-end at Mary's Peak studying the flora and fungi of the region. This is the first of a series of botanical field trips to be held this year. Dr. H. M. Gilkey and J. W. Severy of the botany and plant pathology department were in charge.

Bridge Contract Let
Glendale, Or., May 2.—J. Elmer Nelson, local contractor, has been awarded the contract for the construction of the wooden bridge over Drive creek, on the Pacific highway. The structure will have concrete foundations. Nelson expects to start building at once.

W. C. T. U. of Jackson County Has Mid-Year Meeting at Ashland

Ashland, May 2.—The mid-year meeting of the Jackson county Women's Christian Temperance Union was held in Ashland on Thursday. The jubilee drive was presented by means of large charts. Resolutions were adopted advocating state legislation for Sabbath observance; local censorship boards for moving picture shows in small towns as well as in cities; open fight against tobacco in any form to eliminate advertising of it on billboards; county court to consider the support of matron to look after the moral delinquents of the county.

J. B. Rogers Dies
Baker, May 2.—J. B. Rogers, 66, widely known hotel proprietor of Baker, died suddenly after an illness of 12 hours, from uronic poisoning. He was a native of Ireland and came to the United States when he was 12 years old. He has been a resident of Baker more than

20 years. In 1907 he built the Rogers, one of Baker's three largest hotels. He is survived by his widow and two sons.

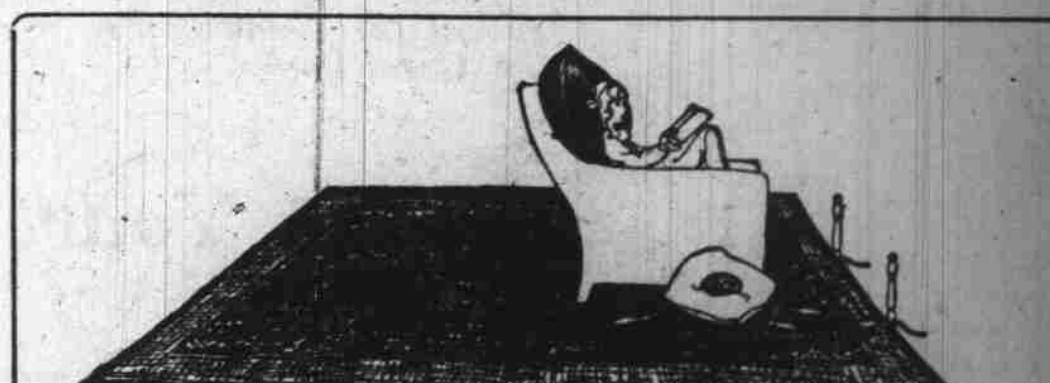
