

ENGINEER IS SUING CLAY PRODUCTS CO. FOR SUM OF \$2000

Arthur L. Haley, architect and engineer, is suing the Dalley Clay Products company, of which H. A. Dalley is president, in Circuit Judge Gatens' court today.

It first located at Molalla, Clackamas county, but lack of proper railroad facilities determined it to change location.

The company sued the port authorities, but the federal court held that the port had exceeded its authority.

Meanwhile the company refused to locate at Vancouver unless a \$12,000 bonus was raised.

Haley claims compensation for work alleged to have been done at Molalla, and also for preparing the plans and specifications for the proposed Vancouver plant.

It is said the company is now considering locating its plant at Astoria.

CENSUS WILL FALL 4 PER CENT SHORT OF 1910 GROWTH

Washington, May 5.—(I. N. S.)—Complete returns for the 1920 census will show an increase in population of the United States of from 16 to 20 per cent, according to expert estimates obtained today and based on published figures of the census bureau.

Director Rogers of the bureau and other officials were unwilling today to state that the official estimate of 106,000,000 for the population of the United States, made in July, 1919, would be broken down by the completion of the 1920 census.
