

BROKERS INVOLVED IN HUGE ROBBERY

New York, May 4.—(U. P.)—Wall street brokers, other than David W. Sullivan and his immediate associates will be connected with the disposal of the \$2,500,000 in stolen securities charged against the missing "Nicky" Arnstein and Nicholas Cohen, according to Sam S. Myers, attorney for the National Surety company.

Myers declared Cohen is the real master mind of the \$5,000,000 bond theft plot and not Arnstein.

William Eastday, a partner of Sullivan, made a complete confession, telling the parts each individual member of "the gang" played, which was filed today with the United States district court.

Propagandists to Battle at Cost Of U. S. Public

Washington, May 4.—(U. P.)—A vigorous diplomatic counter offensive apparently has been launched to meet the campaign of anti-British propagandists in the United States, whose activities were causing worry to statesmen on both sides of the Atlantic.

There were many evidences here today that such a counter-stroke is being essayed and Sir Auckland Geddes, the new British ambassador, has been entrusted with the task of leading the fight.

Sir Auckland has been in Washington two weeks. He has made two speeches, issued one long statement, attended several public dinners, visited the capitol and shaken hands with a great number of congressmen, breaking all records for ambassadorial affability. The precincts of the British embassy no longer are forbidden territory to newspapermen and the footmen now bow them in and Geddes comes forward with a hearty handshake. The oldest diplomatic attaches in Washington cannot remember such an atmosphere of cordiality and freedom at any embassy.

Some 300 Jersey owners made the trip down the Columbia to Scappoose Monday to see the largest herd of island type Jerseys on the coast—that of Harry West. This is about twice the number making the same trip last year, and, like the last jubilee, is only a small part of the number who will make the trip up the valley, many joining after the first day.

The banquet hall at the Hotel Portland was filled with the jubilee crowd Monday night. O. M. Plummer, acting as toastmaster, introduced W. K. Taylor, president of the Oregon Jersey cattle club.

M. D. Munn, president of the American Jersey Cattle club, a brilliant speaker, gave his impressions of Oregon and the upper Columbia highway. Munn declared he never dreamed there could be such a highway and could only marvel at the wonderful falls. In the course of his address he said:

"The dairy cow has followed civilization wherever it has gone; there never has been a home built in this country but what has had the sustenance and felt the influence of the dairy cow."
