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plant will make room for added equipment. Increasing demand for the output of the concern necessitated the acquisition of greater floor space, according to its officials.

Lindley to Address Reed Students—President E. H. President Lindley was formerly an extension lecturer for Reed and his addresses on psychology were heard by thousands of Portland people. In the evening, President Lindley will speak before the Portland Academy of Medicine.

New Traffic Officers Assigned—Two new traffic officers have been placed in the congested district by Captain Lewis. They are standing at Broadway and Alder and at Fifth and Alder. The men will direct traffic without the aid of a semaphore, in accordance with a scheme used by several eastern cities. The position in which the officer stands will designate the way in which traffic shall move. If the system does not prove successful a semaphore will be installed.

Martin F. Nelson Bought—Mrs. H. W. Nelson of Oakland, Cal., has requested the Portland police to look for her 21-year-old son, Martin F. Nelson. The young man left Berkeley on April 4 to take his annual vacation in Oregon and Washington and British Columbia. The mother said he wrote her a letter from Portland April 6, but that she had not heard from him since. Inspector Craddock is investigating.

Men Face Serious Charges—Louis W. Reinhardt, 62, and James Weaver, 54, were remanded to the county jail on charges of contributing to the delinquency of a minor. Reinhardt was released on \$500 bond. Weaver failed to furnish bond. Complaints against Reinhardt is made by Mrs. A. Rhymer.

Governor Will Try His Luck Hooking In Chinook Salmon

Faced by a grave danger every large salmon below the falls at Oregon City is engaged in a mad scramble to get through the fish ladder and over the falls today, the reason being that Governor Ben Olcott and officials of

the state fish and game commission have gone a-trotting. Olcott has been figuratively bound to his official desk for many months, but after reading the accounts of big Chinook being caught below the fall at Oregon City he cast aside his bonds for a day of sport.

With Olcott are A. E. Burghdoff, state game warden; Carl D. Shoemaker, secretary of the state commercial fish commission, and R. E. Clanton, superintendent of hatcheries in Oregon. Following his decision to fish, Olcott contributed his \$150 to the public funds for his fishing license, preferring not to be caught like a previous state official who went to Oregon City last year and was forced to sit in the boat and enjoy seeing officials of the fish and game commission catch all the big ones, because he did not have a license.

Findings in Houser Grain Inquiry Will Be Given on Friday

All evidence in the official investigation of Max Houser's work as federal grain administrator for this district was submitted to Attorney General Palmer Tuesday by United States Attorney L. W. Humphreys and the findings will be announced Friday, according to the promise of the attorney general's office. When charges were leveled at Houser by the federal grand jury at Spokane he demanded a complete airing and Humphreys was assigned to the task of investigating. Assisted by William Bryon of the department of justice and George R. Mayo, special bank account-

ant of the department, Humphreys made an exhaustive survey of Houser's activity in the Northwestern grain market.

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
