First Quarantine Board to Meet—The Western Plant Quarantine board has set its second annual meeting to be held in Salt Lake May 11 to 13. G. H. Hecke, director of agriculture of California, who is chairman of the board, has announced. The board was organized in May, 1919, with a membership composed of the quarantine officers of the 11 western states, Hawaii, British Columbia, and the northern district of Lower California. The purpose of the organization is to protect the West against plant pests and diseases not established west of the Rocky mountains, by promoting uniformity of quarantine regulations.

Admits Brewing Beer—Denying all knowledge of the 430 quarts of moonshine whiskey found in his home, but admitting the brewing of 94 quarts of beer that was also confiscated, George Clark, 4309 East Seventy-third street southeast, was bound over to the grand jury by United States Commissioner Drake Wednesday on a charge of violating the prohibition law. For sending an army pistol and cartridges by parcel-post and labeling the latter bullets, J. T. Nick, Oregon Agricultural college student, was indicted by the federal grand jury and arrested Wednesday by Deputy United States Marshal Tichenor. Nick, who is said to be one of the most popular students of the school, was released on \$500 bail furnished by the college authorities. In registering the parcel, which was alleged to be a brother and sent through Corvallis postoffice, Nick was required to name the contents. Post-office inspectors investigated, found the parcel, and a charge of sending explosives through the mail was preferred.
