Deacon Jones' 4-Hit Pitching Nails 'Em For Fourth Victory

Beavers Annex Friday's Game From Seattle, Score 4 to 1; Toman's Poor Judgment in Calling Them on Siglin and Cox Aids in Defeat of Seattle.

SEATTLE, May 8.—Deacon Jones' four-hit pitching was responsible for the 4-to-1 victory of the Beavers yesterday, making their fourth straight win of the series.

Toman's poor judgment in calling them on Siglin and Cox in the first frame put Geary in the hole at the start. Bob caused Blue to fly to Cunningham to start the game, then Wistler drove one safely to center. Geary had Siglin fanned on a third strike that cut the corner, but Toman called it a ball and on the next pitch Siglin walked.

Schaller singled to right where Kopeke Kenworthy was holding forth and Keny out Wistler off at the plate on a beautiful throw to Baldwin. Siglin going to third and Schaller to second.

Cox also was given a gift base by the umpire, filling the sacks. Art Koehler, the rangy catcher, always a dangerous hitter, cleaned up with a long single to center. Siglin and Schaller coming in. Wares retired Spranger at first.

Seattle scored a run in the fourth inning off Jones by the clever base running of Murphy. Two were down when Murphy walked. Red stole second. Then Kenworthy sent a groundball to short. Murphy hesitated in the line of the ball's flight and dashed on to third where it was about to strike him. Kingdon's eye and the ball, suffering an eclipse by Murphy's interposed bulk, the former was unable to handle the object and it went for a hit for Kenworthy. Murphy scored before Kingdon could recover the ball.

BEAVERS SCORE TWO IN FIFTH

The Beavers scored two more in the fifth with two gone. Blue got away with a walk and stole. Wistler singled to right and Blue beat Kenworthy's throw home after a pretty race. Siglin hit a short fly to center, which attracted Cunningham, Kopp and Wares. The ball dropped safe and as Cunningham and Wares scrambled for it, the latter jammed his right hand into the ground and came up with a broken wrist. Wistler reached third and Siglin second. Schaller was walked to get him out of the way and Cox rolled a ball to Hartford, who fumbled, and Wistler tallied. Bruce gathered up the ball and threw. Siglin out as he, too, was trying to tally.

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Jinx Always Has Followed Middle Class

Famous Jack Dempsey First Held Crown, and Since Then Many Things Have Happened.

NEW YORK, May 8.—The middleweight title again is in hock. This time a chap named Johnny Wilson, "way down East" holds the belt.

Now whoever heard of Johnny Wilson, except perhaps his mother, the ward alderman and his barber? But he defeated Mike O'Dowd and got a decision, so he, therefore, is the champion.

And, for that matter, who was excited over Mike O'Dowd before he flattened Al McCoy?

Johnny Wilson, the New Englander, is merely continuing an old tradition in winning the title. Trace the program of champions from the start of things right down to the present and witness the jumbled state of the succession of title holders.

The argument can be carried only back to the days of Jack Dempsey, for fighters before his time are rather out of the reckoning of present day fans, and their methods were totally different from those in vogue today.

Dempsey drew the title when he laid claim to it in 1884, after Mike Donovan allowed it to lapse in 1882. He defended it successfully until one day George La Blanche, the marine, bounced a pivot ball off his chin and won by a knock-out.

FLUKES ARE MANY
This was the first of the flukes that were to continue the course of the class. La Blanche was a short-time king, for he was knocked out shortly afterward by another second-rater, Young Mitchell.

Dempsey claimed the title and was knocked out in 13 rounds January 24, 1891, by Bob Fitzsimmons, who was truly a good fighter and entitled to the victory.

Fitzsimmons graduated from the middleweight class in order to go out and whip the heavies. Kid McCoy and Jack O'Brien were recognized as entitled to consideration, but the title really lapsed until Stanley Ketchell laid claim. He was recognized after defeating Jack "Twin" Sullivan. Then on September 7, 1908, another fluke came along. Billy Papke knocked out the great Ketchell.

On November 25 of the same year Papke and Ketchell again met and the trick antics of the title again cropped out. Ketchell won by a knockout in 11 rounds. Just to show how versatile it could be, the jinx laid hold of Ketchell in the shape of a bullet. He was shot and killed October 15, 1910.

"Billy Papke, of course, claimed the title, and was recognized. He knocked out Willie Lewis in France, but was himself defeated by Cyclone Johnny Thompson in Australia. Both boys later outgrew the weight limit and there was a scramble for the title, most critics giving recognition to Frank Klaus.

McCoy NOT MUCH
In 1913 Klaus made the mistake of entering the ring with George Chip and was knocked out. He didn't believe it could be done, so Chip repeated for him. Chip was the recognized claimant of walked into the ring with a setup named the title until a year later, when he also at McCoy and was knocked out in a round.

Of all these alleged and real champions, McCoy was the worst, but he managed to hold his claim to the title until November, 1917. He engaged in the last fight under the Fravel law in New York with Mike O'Dowd as his opponent and was rocked to sleep.

Mike, of course, has met the jinx. He walked into Johnny Wilson. It certainly will be worth the price of admission to see what happens to him.

Well Known Trap Shooter Is Dead
Seattle, May 8.—(I. N. S.)—Frank K. Kaynor, one of the leading trappers of the Northwest, died at his home here today at the age of 82. He won the national medal at the Portland trap shoot last year and the state medal at Yakima.

NEW YORK, May 8.—(I. N. S.)—George Papin, the French light-heavyweight champion, will add about \$15,000 to his earnings in two more battles for which he has been booked. He will get \$10,000 for a 10-round fight with Patzy Wallace in Philadelphia, May 24, and on May 13 he will get \$5,000 for eight rounds against an unselected opponent.

San Francisco, May 8.—(U. P.)—Joe Steele, New York light-heavyweight, was knocked out in the third round by Frankie Farren here last night at the Dreamland rink show. Steele had stopped many body punches and a right to the jaw finished him. The main event was a rough affair. Bevo Krusky hammering Tim Killy, the fighting Irishman. George Shade won from Steve Dalton.

Oregon Streams—Western Oregon
Eagle Creek—Fair catches of rainbows made between 4 and 6-mile posts. Reached over Columbia river highway via Bonville and Cascade Locks. Cany ground open.

GASCADE FOREST
Willamette River—Along upper Willamette to Oakridge, good catches of dollys, cut-throats and rainbows being made. Auto from Eugene, McKenzie River—Good catches of dollys, cut-throats and rainbows along lower river up to Niered hotel. Auto from Eugene via Springfield.

SISKIYOU FOREST
Rogue River—No catches between Grants Pass and Almaden lately. Bear Grants Pass. Trout biting salmon eggs in streams tributary to Rogue. Salmon reported caught near mouth of Rogue.

UMPUQUA FOREST
North, East and South Umpqua. Water too high. Row River and Shasta Creek—Roar too high. Cold and cloudy for fishing.

OREGON FOREST
Deschutes, near Mouth of Crooked River—Fair catches of rainbows at mouth and northward on Deschutes. By auto from Silver, Redmond and Prineville.
