

Portland Pastors Will Preach Social Mother Day Sermons From Pulpits Sunday

MEMORIAL DAY FOR MOTHERS IS TO BE OBSERVED

Mothers' day will receive more consideration than ever before on Sunday in the churches of Portland. This memorial day was born in 1911 in a little church at Philadelphia when Miss Anna Jarvis asked her church to have a memorial service for her mother. This mother had for a number of years observed the custom of distributing white carnations to the children who attended the morning service in her church. The first Mother's day was held in memorial of Mrs. Jarvis. The children came in groups and wore white carnations in honor of their friend. Celebration of the day has grown on the nation so that mothers living, as well as those who are departed, are now honored. White flowers are worn in honor of departed mothers, while red flowers are worn by those who are fortunate enough to have their mother still with them on this earth.

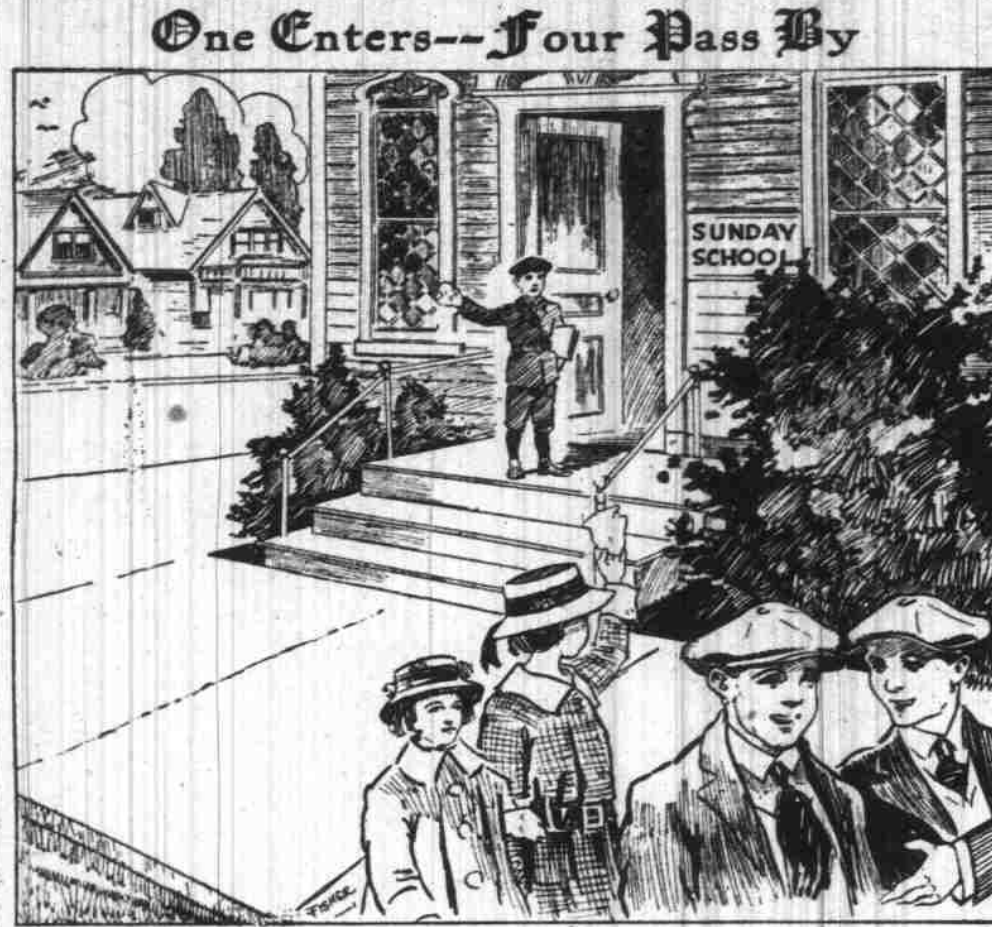
A large number of pastors notified the Journal that they would preach Mother's day sermons. A few of the special announcements follow:

BAPTIST
Mother's day at White Temple will be observed by the entertaining of the state Sunday school convention at the evening session. A meeting for women only will be held. Dr. W. A. Waldo will give the principal address on "Motherhood." Greetings will be brought by Mrs. T. H. Richmond, state adult superintendent. Luke and Paul Rader will sing. A report on the church campaign will be given in the morning.

Margaret Carney, the blind soloist, and J. F. Myers, blind, will give a brief address at the Sunday morning Mother's day service in the Third Baptist church. The Rev. R. E. Close will preach.

CHRISTIAN
Mother's day will be observed Sunday morning at the First Christian church with appropriate music and a special discourse by the Rev. H. H. Griffith. The pastor will speak on the glories, responsibilities and opportunities of motherhood. The evening preaching service will be dismissed for the state Sunday school convention.

CONGREGATIONAL

Series of Mission Lectures to Open

LUTHERAN DRIVE IN OREGON BRINGS GRATIFYING NEWS

An intensified drive among Lutheran congregations of Portland will begin Sunday and continue through the week. The campaign goal in the United States is \$1,800,000, Oregon's quota being \$705,000, to be raised among 77 congregations. Advance reports from the state have been most gratifying to local leaders. Teams are at present touring the country and holding mass meetings in all central points. In Portland's 15 congregations all is in readiness for the drive, congregational chairmen and committees having been appointed. Anton Ecken, vice president of the State bank of Portland, has been elected state treasurer.

Regarding the campaign, Herbert Hoover has written the denomination: "The relief and reconstruction program laid out by the national Lutheran council represents, in my mind, a really important battle against the forces of America and that part of Europe which is in more need. My experience fully confirms your belief that the carrying out of humanitarian work of this character will do more than to relieve today the situation in Europe."

Church Activities For Year Reviewed

The yearly report of Dr. W. B. Hinson to the congregation of the East Side Baptist church shows the following: One hundred and eighty additions to the membership, 3500 calls and religious interviews, a weekly attendance of 1000, a total budget of \$25,000, an increase of 135 in the Sunday school, total support of two missionaries in China, \$1235 given for missions, a total budget of \$25,000, and distribution of 30,000 copies of Dr. Hinson's sermons. In addition to the above the church has received pledges for \$41,000 toward the new world movement, to be paid in the next four years.
