Aurora, Or., May 8.—Mrs. Teresa Klar, a pioneer of the Macksburg section, died at her home there and burial took place at New Era.

Mrs. Klar was born in Breslau, Germany, February 10, 1835. She came to America in 1875, and to Oregon six years later. She is survived by a son, Ernest Klar, prominent attorney of Macksburg, and a daughter, Mrs. P. J. Gibson. Mrs. Klar's four grandsons took part in the great war against Germany and all returned safely.

Finish Piling Work On Large Bulkhead At Robinson Bend

Kelso, Wash., May 8.—Burcham Brothers have completed piling work on the bulkhead at Robinson Bend on the Lewis river, where the county and road district are erecting the Lewis river road and the Pacific highway from encroachment by the river. About 1800 feet of piling bulkhead was driven and the county has crews busy rip-rapping the frontage and putting in other protective work.

To establish a more equitable basis for assessing the timber lands of the county, Jewell county has arranged for re-evaluation of the timber lands in the county. Thomas & Meserve of Portland have been awarded the contract at 25 cents an acre. Checks of the 1908 cruise, on which the present assessments are based, show it is incorrect in nearly all instances. To finance the cruising work the county is arranging for the sale of \$20,000 worth of bonds.

Home Missionaries Given Salary Rise

Medford, May 8.—Because of the increased cost of living, the Southern Oregon presbytery, in session here, has decided to raise the salary of each of its home missionaries to \$1500 and to provide each with a manse. They had been receiving \$1200 annually.

Shingle Plant Burned
Astoria, May 8.—Word reached here that the Grays Harbor Shingle company's plant at Grays River, Wash., was practically destroyed by fire, which began from an unknown cause. The plant was owned by Swanson Brothers and the loss is estimated at \$20,000. It is understood it will be rebuilt.

Proposes Degree of Doctor of Philosophy To Oregon U Faculty

University of Oregon, Eugene, May 8.—The possibility of the offering of a degree of doctor of philosophy, with the development of courses in philosophy, is proposed in a report made to the faculty by Professor F. G. Young, dean of the graduate school. Action on this matter is expected at the June meeting of the faculty.

At least two full years devoted to

graduate study beyond the master's degree in an institution of recognized graduate standing shall be required and at least one full academic year, usually the last year, must have been spent in resident graduate work at the University of Oregon.

What are the facts in connection with this matter?

Selective Service Regulations prescribed by the President under authority vested in him by an Act of Congress, provides under Section 193:

"The duty of members of district and local boards and other persons appointed to perform duties in the execution of the Selective Service Law, is patriotic service of so high and important a character that a great majority of those acting in this capacity have felt that they should render it gratuitously. The Government desires to accept such gratuitous service wherever it can be rendered without great hardship to the individual. . . . Whenever members of local or district boards feel that they can, with justice to their families and themselves, decline compensation for services, the Government will gratefully accept their patriotic tender."

Disregarding the Government's appeal in its hour of stress, Mr. Beveridge, without warrant, without sacrifice, dipped into Uncle Sam's pocket and took several hundred dollars.

The arduous work of the draft board was performed by clerks on Government pay. Mr. Beveridge's alleged services consisted in the main of attaching his signature to the records. All the while he was drawing \$4500 a year salary from Multnomah county. Suffered no hardship—sustained no loss.

Mr. Beveridge is a bold man—in the face of all this he would ask a third term.

Mr. Beveridge cannot dismiss this matter by going about making a personal explanation that he gave the money so taken to some charitable or patriotic institution. Every good citizen did that much in war-time and most of them without the advantage of a fat salary of \$4500 a year.

To give approval to such an unpatriotic act would be unfair.

Unfair to the boys who went overseas.

Unfair to the Mothers who with grief and anguish in their hearts remained at home to pray.

Unfair to the Fathers who struggled and skimped to buy a Liberty Bond to support a just cause.

The truth shall be known and on Primary Day the voters will send Mr. Beveridge into retirement.
