

BRITISH SOLUTION OF TURKISH STATUS MOMENTOUS EVENT

Paris, May 10.—The British settlement of the Turkish question is the most prodigious maneuver since the conquest of India.

It is not difficult to see why Premier Lloyd George suggested to invite Chancellor Mueller to participate in the conference at the very moment the Turkish question was on the program.

The attention of the French statesmen is cleverly steered in the direction of the Moslem world. Theoretically, Turkey retains all her possessions except the Arabian territories, Thrace and Armenia.

A camouflage Turkish government is even maintained at Smyrna, where the Greeks have five years' time to organize a plebiscite.

All this is theoretical. Practically, Turkey is unable to live without knuckling under a British protectorate. Britain holds Turkey leashed in on every side. She has installed herself at Batum under the fiction of internationalization and she reigns in the Black sea.

"International" control of Constantinople means only an indefinite extension of the conditions we have witnessed ever since March 16, involving British rule and deportation of all persons friendly to France.

Britain, holding the supremacy of the seas, owns the key to the Dardanelles. The British still occupy Caiffa and Basra. They have supreme command in Palestine, Arabia, and Mesopotamia and are now attempting to achieve control of Armenia, while leaving it to America to foot the bill for this maneuver.

Ownership of the Bagdad railway completes the list of Britain's new possessions. They own everything except Anatolia, where the Turkish nationalists refuse the British yoke.

Sane Folk in Japan Score Militarists For Siberian Coup

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Tokio, Japan, May 10.—The sane elements of the press, publicists and people disapprove of the action of the Japanese military in Vladivostok and criticize the arrogant out-of-date methods used, which, they say, alienate the general sympathy of the world. They affirm that the whole trouble was due to the fact that Japan's diplomacy is under the domination of the army. They also assert that militarism is responsible for the deadlock with China and, indeed, is responsible for the evils in their own country.

One newspaper declares that militarism, which tries to usurp diplomatic and political control is the common foe of humanity. Another paper strongly urges the immediate destruction of what it calls the abnormal and cumbrous institution.

Terrible Suffering Reported by Dutch Refugees in Russia

The Hague, Holland, May 10.—All the Russians in Holland, including those interned as well as those living in freedom, who may wish to return to their own country, are about to be repatriated. They are to be sent by ship to Reval, and Hollanders still in Russia are to be brought home on the return trip. The sufferings of the Hollanders there have been terrible, according to letters and reports brought over by one of their number who escaped. Many have died, others are on the verge of starvation, and some have gone insane.

Here in Holland a law is being framed against stirring up the people by means of revolutionary agitation and against selling or having in one's possession arms or other objects with which to carry on propaganda. The last clause is aimed at the sending of money and jewels to Holland by the Bolsheviks. Anything done for the purpose of fostering discontent against the Dutch government is punishable under the new law.

RUSSIANS BOMB JAPANESE FORCE

Peking, China, May 10.—Japan's action in seizing control of the railway near Harbin and imprisoning a number of Russian workmen resulted in a conflict in the course of which several Russians, Japanese, Czechs and Chinese were killed. Japanese workmen were installed on April 11 at different points on the railway between Harbin and Kwantung while Japanese soldiers guarded all the stations. A Japanese battalion also entered Harbin.

These actions caused Russian workmen to hold a mass meeting at which the Japanese proceedings were denounced. The Japanese immediately arrested seven of the leaders. Protests by leading Russian community organizations were sent to the Chinese general, Pac Kwei-ching, and the president of the Chinese Eastern railway that the arrest of Russians and Chinese in Russian territory constituted a breach of Russian and Chinese sovereign rights. The Czechs also protested against the arrests, stating that the action would cause a general strike, thus delaying their departure.

On April 12, while the Japanese were putting the arrested Russians on a train for the purpose of taking them to the Japanese headquarters, Russian workmen threw three bombs among the Japanese soldiers. The Japanese replied with rifle fire. The Czechs then opened a machine gun fire from their armored car on the Japanese. The fight lasted four hours. The Chinese, while attempting to stop the fighting between the Japanese, Czechs and Russians, became embroiled themselves. The Japanese finally withdrew. The casualties were: Czechs, one killed, 12

wounded; Chinese, one killed, seven wounded; Russian prisoners, one killed, one wounded. Several Russian civilians were also wounded. The Japanese casualties are thought to have been numerous. Reinforcements are being sent by the Chinese and the situation is regarded as critical. Japan's position in Siberia is one of extreme danger and difficulty. The Russians are determined to reject

Japanese control and in all parts of Siberia meetings are being held to decide what warlike measures shall be taken to drive out the Japanese. It is feared that bomb throwing, sniping and assassination will be the weapons used. The Japanese are making no effort to conciliate the Russians but are trying to bully them just as they have bullied the Chinese. Japan must now either evacuate Siberia or send large reinforcements.

Yankee Money Kings And Queens Lionized By Greedy Parisians

predictions of an invasion by American money kings and queens is coming true. It is conservatively estimated that American wealth arriving in Paris daily amounts to \$20,000,000. The Mauretanian alone, just in, had a list of millionaires aggregating \$50,000,000. "And they are no pikers, these Americans," said one prominent Rue de la Paix store proprietor gleefully.

Allies to Cut Down Germany's Indemnity

This is 10,000,000 marks (\$2,500,000,000) less than count von Brockdorff-Rantzau offered in his counter propositions on May 29, 1919.

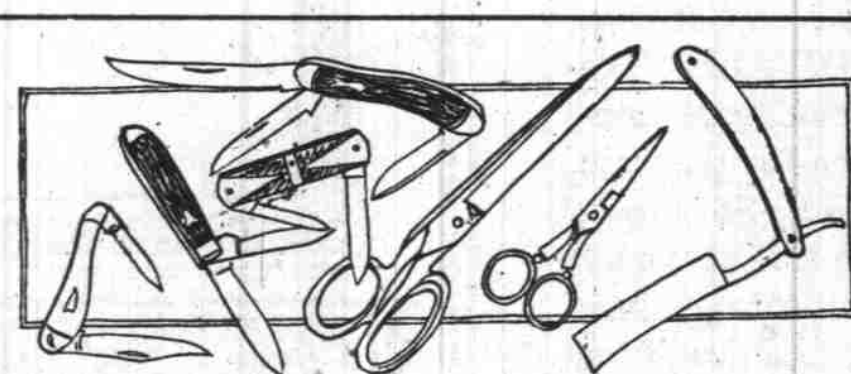
