

COAST MARITIME POLICY ADVISED

Ashland, May 10.—(Aboard Portland Foreign Trade Excursion Special).—Gathered in the observation car of their special train Sunday, Portland's delegates to the national foreign trade council in San Francisco agreed that:

A distinctive Pacific coast foreign trade policy must be established and Atlantic coast domination must end.

Consolidation is urged.

Pacific coast ports must do team work in building foreign trade.

Three free ports should be established on the Pacific coast, one of them Portland.

Speedy installation of American-controlled cables service to the Orient is imperative.

Marine matters, including commerce, navigation, shipping board division, shipping commissioners and customs and clearance divisions of the treasury department should be placed under one head.

A two-cent postal rate to Australia, on a par with New Zealand, should be established. The rate is now five cents.

Steps should be taken properly to chart the Pacific coast and to centralize the 13 governmental departments now engaged in independent map making.

CHINESE TRADE EXTENSION

American marine insurance should be placed on equal footing with foreign companies.

There should be an American bureau of shipping.

Relief should be granted from the import tariffs of South American countries which discriminate against our canned salmon, fruit, vegetables and milk.

Better opportunity should be afforded for incorporation of American companies for Chinese trade.

No doubt American trade with the Orient would be expedited by establishing Manila as a free distributive port for American trade.

Julean Arnold, American trade commission attaché from Peking, China, insisted that a stipulation for American trade incorporation should be that American capital be in the majority.

A Western trade federation was proposed to crystallize and get action on the above propositions. Chairman Max H. Houser of the excursion appointed the following committee:

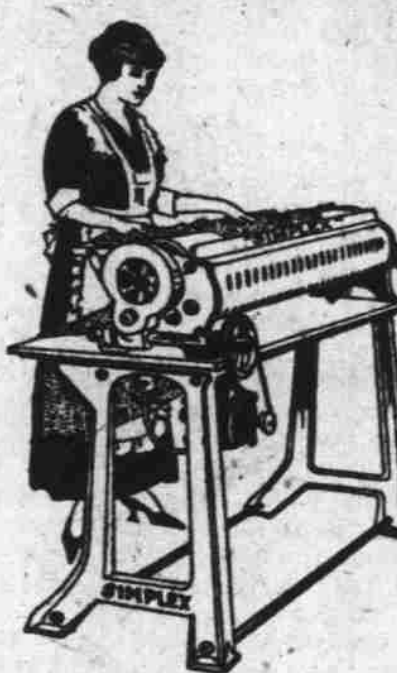

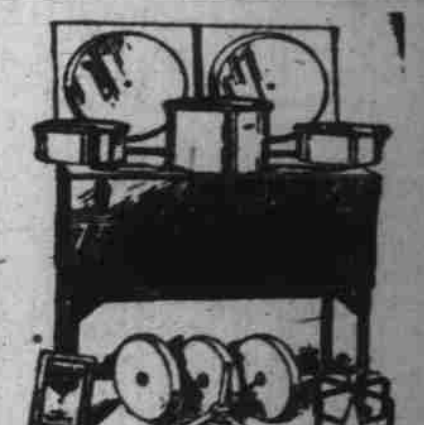
