Precipitation has been scattering and mostly light, but rainfall amounting to 2.58 inches is reported from Abilene, Texas, and good rains have occurred in Eastern Oregon. The temperature is below normal in the Pacific States, along the Mexican boundary, and from Tennessee to the Gulf of Mexico, and is above normal over the remainder of the country.

Relative humidity at Portland: Noon yesterday, 70 per cent; 5 p. m. yesterday, 64 per cent; 5 a. m. today, 92 per cent.

Precipitation since January 1: Total, 15.67 inches; normal, 21.32 inches; deficiency, 5.65 inches.

Salesman Kills Himself—Harvey C. Huffman, 38, traveling salesman, committed suicide in his room at the Ramapo hotel by drinking carbolic acid. His

body was found Sunday morning by a friend, F. W. Kenyon, who occupied another room in the hotel. Huffman left a note addressed to his brother Frank of New Paris, Ohio, saying he had lost \$500 and didn't "have the nerve to face the music." Another brother, William, lives in Eaton, Ohio. Huffman had been in Portland for about three weeks. He was traveling for William Walke & Co., soap manufacturers and chemists of St. Louis. The coroner took charge of the body. No inquest will be conducted.

Williamette U. Features—Williamette university was featured in practically every Methodist Episcopal church in Portland yesterday when Dr. Carl Gregg Doney, its president, the quartet and students from Salem made speeches or sang songs in the interests of the campaign to raise \$100,000 for new buildings and other betterments for the old school. Tonight at 6 o'clock Williamette alumni and friends will meet in the First Methodist Episcopal church for their annual good fellowship session. Dinner will be served at 7 o'clock. The campaign is under auspices of the Laymen's association of the Oregon conference. Edward J. Wells, president, A. F. Fliegel is chairman of a special committee of laymen.

Masamasa to Hike—Instead of the scheduled trip for Sunday, May 16, the Masamasa will go to Tanner creek near Bonnevillie on the Columbia river highway, and spend the day in construction of the new trail up the creek to the falls. "Rise" falls are among the beautiful along the highway, but are inaccessible because of the absence of trail. All male members of the club have been invited to assist in this work. The women members will serve the lunch at noon, and coffee will be furnished by the club. The United States forest service has agreed to supply the tools and forest service officials are doing the engineering work.

Masons Aid Armenians—Local Scottish Rite Masons have aided in making arrangements with Turkish high Masons for the safe passage from Sivas of two families of Armenians who are relatives of the Cartosian Brothers of Portland. Eleven members of these families escaped massacre largely because of their membership in the Masonic order. In the party are the father and mother of Meger Kirishian of Spokane, nephew of H. O. Cartosian. He will leave for New York within a few days to meet his parents, who will arrive in about three weeks.

To Acquire School Ground—Attention of the city commissioners has been called to the fact that the Franklin high school building is but 15 feet from the western boundary of the school grounds. The city commissioners have been taken to assist the Parent-Teacher and Community clubs in an attempt to secure adjacent land. S. C. Pier, city commissioner, has proposed that the city contribute half of the purchase price of \$23,000 if the school board will pay the other half.

Janitor Is Injured—Henry Nelkait, janitor at the Bellevue hotel, 348 Yamhill street, was seriously injured Sunday morning when he fell down the hotel elevator shaft from the first floor to the basement. Nelkait is said to have opened the door and walked down the shaft. The elevator was at the third floor. At St. Vincent's hospital he is reported to be suffering from cuts, bruises and possibly fractured ribs. Nelkait is 60 years old and lived at 86 Stanton street.

Apartment House Sold—The Ormonde apartment house, located at 656-8 Flannery street, between Twentieth and Twenty-first, was purchased Friday by Mrs. Myrtle Hunt from O. J. Sherman for \$35,000. The building is a three-story modern frame structure and contains two four-room and 10 five-room apartments. It will be operated by the purchaser. The Ormonde was built about 10 years ago.

Bates expects to address several gatherings of automobile dealers while here. He will make his headquarters with the William L. Hutchison company.
