

BRITISHER DOUBTS U. S. WAR BENEFITS ARE TO CONTINUE

London, May 12.—America did a great deal for the war. The war did even more for America. It changed her from a debtor to a creditor nation. It poured prosperity upon her and through a large merchant marine enabled her to play a part in foreign commerce such as she hardly dreamed of playing before. It made her a power in international finance.

And Americans seem to have no doubt that these war-benefits are not only going to last, but will increase.

I am more skeptic. I do not believe America a few years hence will be anything like so prominent in international trade or finance or on the ocean routes as she imagines.

Her activities in these directions may easily fade out, just as her desire to be a leader in world politics faded out.

HOME MAY BE BEST PLACE

In one case, as in the other, experience may show that she is better off by staying at home.

Nations only excel in enterprises for which nature or necessity has fitted them. A small island like England can only maintain its relatively large population by bringing raw materials from the ends of the earth, working them into finished goods, and selling them wherever buyers can be found all over the world.

England lives by her foreign trade, and to the development of that foreign trade two things are necessary—first, a merchant marine to carry the goods she manufactures and to bring back the foodstuffs and raw materials, and, secondly, a constant outflow of capital to stimulate the markets abroad.

ENGLAND STAGES COMEBACK

One of the most wonderful things the world has ever seen is England's recovery from the economic strain of the war. Since the armistice she has been regaining and recapturing one by one the markets which in wartime she was forced to yield to her American and Japanese competitors.

England is rebuilding her merchant fleet with the indomitable resolution to remain as much as ever the center and clearing house of international commerce and finance.

The impulse behind the achievements—the one thing that made them possible—had been her conception that otherwise she would be put out of business altogether.

U. S. POSITION DIFFERENT

But America is in a very different position. America is a continent that is still amazingly underpopulated and underdeveloped. She has a domestic market for more than 100,000,000 of the greatest consumers and spenders in the world.

America has not at present—she will later—to bring either food or materials from abroad. She raises nearly everything she wants on her own bountiful soil.

These things may be desirable, but in America's case they are not vital. They are not, as with England, the foundation stone of her entire industrial fabric.

What is a crutch and necessity to Britain is to America a walking-stick, a convenience, almost a luxury. That is the bedrock reason why I do not fear American competition, either on the seas or in finance or in foreign trade.

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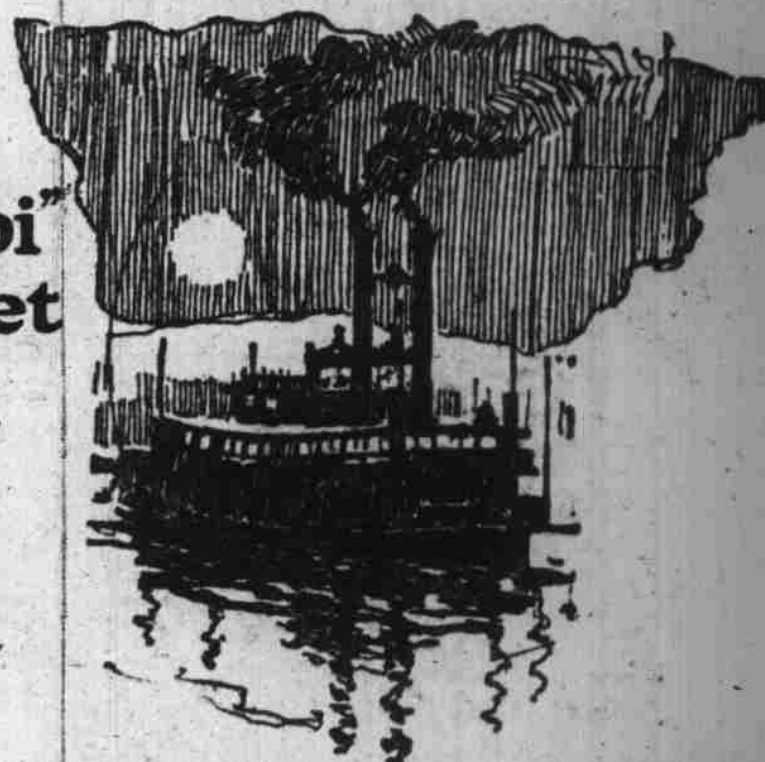
