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Measure Increases Bonding Debt Limit

Nine propositions, five proposed amendments to the state constitution and four proposed statutes, have been submitted by the special session of the legislature, for approval or rejection by the voters of Oregon at the special election to be held May 31. For the information of the voters The Journal will present a brief and concise statement of the purpose and intent of these various proposals, one at a time until the entire list has been covered, taking them in the order in which they will appear upon the official ballot.

The fourth proposed amendment to be on the ballot at the special election bears the title of "Crock and Curry Counties Bonding Amendment." It provides, in brief, that these two counties or either of them may issue bonds up to 2 per cent of their assessed valuation for the payment of general indebtedness.

The constitution at the beginning, "section 10 of article 11, provides that no county shall incur any debt or liabilities, singly or in aggregate, with previous debts or liabilities, except the sum of \$5000, except to suppress insurrection or repel invasion." That provision was amended, however, by the addition of the 8 per cent bond bonding provision, so that the constitution now says, in effect, that no county can constitutionally create a debt against itself in excess of \$5000 for general purposes, but can run into debt up to 8 per cent of its assessed valuation for the purpose of road construction.

GENERAL FORM REJECTED—The proposed amendment was first presented to the legislature in general form, that is, it applied to all of the counties of the state, and in that form, would have permitted any or all counties to issue bonds up to 8 per cent of the assessed valuation to cover general claims.
