

EXTENSION PLAN FOR TERWILLIGER GETS APPROVAL

Districts Concerned Form Organization and Plan to Seek Improvement for Sections.

Extension of Terwilliger boulevard according to the original plan outlined by the park department of the city of Portland, received the endorsement of 150 residents of Carson Heights, Kilpatrick, Collins View, Northrop Acres and Capitol Hill at a meeting in the Carson Heights community hall Friday night.

Ben Reiland was the principal speaker. Steps were taken for the organization of a club to be known as the South-west Portland Improvement League. Presidents were also elected for branch clubs to be established in the districts represented at the meeting.

DISTRICT NEEDS STATE
Reiland declared that the extension of Terwilliger boulevard is a right which belongs to the people of the district. The original plan of the park commission, he said, included this extension and it was on this condition that a large tract was deeded to the city for park purposes by property owners in Burlington and the districts. This tract lies among the hills just south of the present terminus of Terwilliger boulevard, and its development awaits the extension of that thoroughfare.

"The southwest section of the city has received little attention from the city council during all the years of Portland's growth," said Reiland. "There are no parks, boulevards or public improvements except those which are paid for by district assessment. The extension of Terwilliger boulevard would prove beneficial not only to this section of the city, but to the whole community."

MORE CONNECTIONS DESIRED
At present only the Slaven road connects with the boulevard. If it were extended as originally planned it would intersect Taylor's Ferry road, Boon's Ferry road and Palestine Hill road, making a perfect connected link with all the arterial highways running to Portland from the southwest."

Home at Cedars Is In Need of Money

Immediate financial aid is necessary for continued operation of the women's detention home at The Cedars. Figures at the city hall show that over \$12,000 has already been expended, although only \$11,110 was appropriated in the budget. The city auditor last November, Commissioner Mann will ask the council Wednesday for authority to appropriate \$7500 from the general fund. He expects to be able to return the borrowed funds through collection of a bill of \$11,106 due from the state health bureau since August, 1919.

Recent additions to the dining room, laying of hardwood floors, painting of a garage and various outbuildings have meant an expenditure of \$1400. Blooded stock, including cows and pedigreed chickens, recently purchased, cost close to \$1050. Produce from the stock is insufficient to care for the needs of the inmates, however, and requisitions for butter, milk and eggs are still handled through the city auditor's office.

Rustad Home Robbed
Harry Rustad, 423 Magnolia street, complained that early morning burglars visited his home Friday night while the family was asleep and stole \$8 in cash, a small amount of jewelry and two theatre tickets. Rustad expects to gain through a kitchen window.

Harold E. Boyle, accountant for W. R. Mackenzie, died Thursday at his home at 425 Halsey street. Boyle was born at Omaha, Neb., 21 years ago. He had lived 25 years in Portland. He is survived by his wife, Mary A. Boyle; daughter, Mary Jayne Boyle; parents, Mr. and Mrs. Edward Boyle of Portland, and brothers, Earl A. Boyle of Albany and Fred G. Boyle of San Francisco. Funeral services were held Saturday at Finley's chapel. Interment was in Mount Scott cemetery.

Dan Johns Dies

Dan Johns, a teamster in Portland for more than 30 years, was found dead in bed at his home, 329 North Ninth street, Wednesday morning. He had complained of being ill the day before. The body was removed to the Finley undertaking establishment. Funeral arrangements have not yet been made.

Johns was widely known in Portland. He was a teamster and went from place to place to the encroachment of gasoline driven vehicles eliminated horses. At the time of his death he was employed at the Southern Pacific freight house.

He was a member of a pioneer family of Oregon. Born 55 years ago in Putnam county, Mo., he was brought across the plains by his parents when 2 years old. His father was Judge Johns, for years prominent in Linn county, which he helped to settle.

For years Johns was in the employ of the Pacific Coast Bleaching and Dyeing company as a stableman. A son, Samuel Mettler of Seattle, survives.

Mrs. Emma Sophia Crawford
Mrs. Emma Sophia Crawford, 765 East Flanders street, died at the Portland Convalescent hospital Wednesday. Mrs. Crawford had been a resident of Portland since 1906. She was born in Sweden in 1862 and came to America in 1888. She is survived by her husband, L. A. Crawford; a daughter, Mrs. M. O. Norman, and son, Arthur Crawford. She was a member of the Women's Research club and the Yeomen's lodge. Funeral services were held Saturday afternoon at Finley's chapel. The body was cremated.

Captain A. M. McMullen
The body of Captain A. M. McMullen of the quartermaster department, U. S. A., who died of pneumonia April 17 at Honolulu, arrived in Portland Saturday for burial in Vancouver, Wash. Monday, at 2 p. m. Captain McMullen is survived by his brother, R. G. McMullen, chief of the city bureau of maintenance.

Four armored Bolshevik ships have been sunk in the Dnieper river, the Polish statement claimed, and more than 2000 prisoners taken in recent fighting.

Senate Bill Would Put National Guard In Federal Control

Washington, May 15.—Federalization of the national guard is to be accomplished according to information today from the conferees on the army reorganization bill.

The question of whether the national guard should remain under direct control of the states or should be administered by the regular army has been a point of contention between representatives from the house and senate have been deadlocked since April 22. The senate conferees, led by Senator Wadsworth of New York, have insisted upon making the national guard a part of the regular army with officers appointed by the war department under approval of the governor.

The house members have stood for the present system, under which the states through the adjutant general, administer national guard affairs under general regulations of the war department, which has no authority in appointing national guard officers.

Senators have offered to agree to all house provisions, providing the house submit to the change in the national guard system. A majority of the conferees have tentatively decided to agree to the senate proposition, it was learned.

Cannibals Attack Exploring Party in Wilds of Brazil

New York, May 17.—A skirmish in the interior of Brazil between a party of three white men and Indian guides and a band of 200 mountain savages described as cannibals, was related here today by Professor Alexander H. Rice on his return with his wife and party from an exploring expedition of nearly 1000 miles in the interior of the Amazon region.

"I recognized them as members of the Guaribos tribe from their huge size and light complexion. So far as I know they have only been seen by white men once before in their history, in 1873. We tried to talk to them with our Indian dialect, but to no avail. They came at us with their bows and arrows, spears and blow guns, and started across the river after us."

"We only had a revolver, a rifle and a shotgun in the whole party. We used these to good advantage, killing several and stopping their attack."

"The savages, because they were a mountain tribe, had no canoes, followed us down the river, running down the banks. They threw our spears, food and things before they finally gave up the chase. None of our party was injured."

President Getting Into His Old Stride, States Dr. Grayson

Washington, May 15.—(U. S. N.)—President Wilson is rapidly getting back into his old-time form. According to Dr. Grayson the president is today in a better condition than he has been at any time since his illness. The improvement of the president during the past few weeks has been steady, although not marked by any rapid strides.

The increasing good health of the president is evidenced by the fact that he is daily doing more and more work, by the permission of Dr. Grayson.

The fact that the president is again attending to detailed matters personally is evidenced by his veto of the executive bill because of his objection to a small section of that bill which he felt interfered with the administrative powers.

Dr. Grayson said that although he was indisposed recently the president had gone ahead with more work than he had permitted, but that it had done no harm, and that the president will be permitted to do more work each day from now on.

Sandy Lumber Co. to Buy 160 Acres of Choice Yellow Fir

The Sandy Lumber company, operating a mill near Brightwood, closed a deal Monday afternoon for the purchase of a tract of 160 acres of choice yellow fir located on the old McIntyre place at the junction of the Salmon and Sandy rivers. The tract, which cruises between 5,000,000 and 6,000,000 feet, is about 1 1/2 miles east of the company's mill. It is proposed to haul the logs by auto truck.

The purchase was made from E. H. King, owner of the McIntyre place. The price paid was \$19,000. King still owns a tract of 145 acres adjoining. This tract lies along the old Barlow road, a portion of the McIntyre place. King plans to build a camp for the accommodation of automobile tourists.

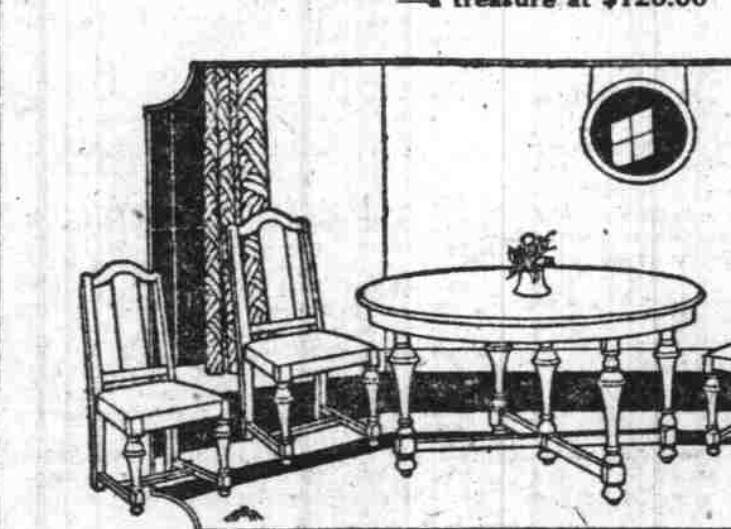
