WEATHER CONDITIONS

A storm of considerable energy over the western Canadian provinces and the pressure is relatively low over Arizona; elsewhere generally high pressure prevails, the highest readings being off the southern Oregon coast, in Oklahoma and on the north Atlantic coast. General rains have fallen over the greater portion of the Northwest and heavy precipitation has occurred in the middle Mississippi valley and central Gulf states. The greatest rainfall reported during the last 24 hours was 4.0 inches at St. Louis, Mo.; 2.14 inches at Memphis, Tenn., and 2.22 inches at New Orleans, La. The weather is somewhat warmer in portions of the Northwest where the temperature is now above the seasonal average. In the Gulf and Atlantic states the temperature is slightly below normal. Relative humidity at Portland, noon, yesterday, 54 per cent; 5 p. m. yesterday, 24 per cent; 3 a. m. today, 92 per cent. Precipitation since January 1: Total, 14.29 inches; normal, 21.92 inches; deficiency, 7.63 inches.
