

BACKERS OF WOOD AND JOHNSON IN ORATORICAL CLASH

Charles A. A. McGee, champion of Hiram Johnson, and Eugene E. Smith, champion of Leonard Wood, fought a verbal duel for three hours at The Auditorium Monday night for and against the question "Which is the better qualified for president of the United States, Hiram W. Johnson or Leonard Wood?" It was the first formally staged political debate of the campaign and it drew an audience of Johnson and Wood sympathizers numbering a thousand or more.

Judge W. N. Gatens, Democrat, presided and, in opening the evening's entertainment said he felt like the Irishman who requested that when he died he be buried in a Jewish cemetery because the devil would never think of looking for an Irishman in such a place.

JOHNSON'S RECORD REVIEWED

Judge McGee, an eloquent speaker, told of the public record of Senator Johnson. Never since the days when the shot hurtled against Fort Sumter had aroused the nation has the country needed men of the type of Lincoln and Johnson so sorely, he contended.

"Then," Judge McGee said, "the question was the preservation of the union and the emancipation of the blacks; now it is the preservation of the union and the emancipation of the whites." He contended that he had the highest regard for General Wood, as a soldier, a regard so high that he wanted to keep him on the job in the army for which he had been trained. "But," he said, "I will not vote for a man for president who has been trained to think in terms of companies, of regiments, of cannon and of bayonets."

He traced the record of Senator Johnson, first as a prosecuting officer of California, then as governor and finally as United States senator, marked the numerous progressive laws enacted under his administration, and contended that he had every qualification for the position which he is now seeking.

Smith, who is both a candidate for congress and a supporter of General

Wood, contended that the people should not be ruled by hysteria or the glamour of political oratory but by calm reason in their selection of a president to lead the American nation through the difficult days which now confront it. He quoted Senator Johnson as having once said that whenever he found himself aligned in political combat with Mike De Young and William Crocker he would know he was wrong. "They are for him now," Smith said.

McBride, aged 17, on a warrant charging him with theft of this automobile and also issuing a worthless check on the Astoria bank.

EAST SIDE HOME USED AS QUARTERS FOR DOPE FIENDS

That a large and completely furnished east side home at 95 East Twenty-first street north, was used solely as a rendezvous for peddlers of morphine, opium and cocaine, developed today in the preliminary hearing of Chuey Sing, a Chinese, who has a store at 107 North Fourth street, on a charge of violating the Harrison narcotics act.

Chuey Sing was arrested by Police Inspectors Morris and Morelock and at the hearing testimony was given that five cans of opium were found in the house. Some evidence was also given that the Chinese had been seen taking white women, supposedly drug addicts, to the house.

Witnesses said that Chuey Sing had been in the habit of carrying quantities of morphine, opium and cocaine in a little package under his clothes and that he had transported drugs from Seattle in this manner.

Chuey Sing, according to Deputy United States Attorney Austin F. Flegel, was a drug wholesaler, receiving large quantities and reselling to the peddlers, in turn retailing it to the addicts.

The Chinese, who was represented by Attorney Morris Goldstein, was bound over to the grand jury under \$500 bond.

Arm Is Fractured In Auto Collision

Failure to give the right of way to a horse-drawn vehicle resulted in a collision between the team and an automobile at Broadway and East Everett street Monday, in which Mrs. I. M. Cooper of 317 Northwick street suffered a fractured arm. The driver of the team, who had stopped to allow the auto to proceed past the intersection, started before the machine had cleared, and the wagon tongue rammed the tonneau of the car in which Mrs. Cooper was seated. The team was in charge of P. Kennedy, driver for Driscoll & Collier.

Clear Highway for Shriners Prospect

Salem, May 18.—A clear right of way for the Shriners' caravan on its visit to Salem next month is practically assured by the state highway commission. It is hoped that construction work now under way will have been completed by the date of the Shriners' visit so that detours now necessary may be eliminated.

LOGGING CAMP ISSUES ADJUSTED BY LOCAL REGION

Adjustment of minor grievances in a few mills and logging camps in Oregon and Washington occupied the attention of the directors of the Loyal Legion of Loggers and Lumbermen at the forenoon session in Portland Hotel today. No increase in wages to employees in the lumber industry is proposed at this time, according to statements of officials of the league following the Monday conference.

The board opened its semi-annual meeting Monday afternoon and will continue in session over Wednesday. The board consists of 24 members, 12 employers and 12 employees. Over 600 mills and camps are represented at the meeting.

Pastor Matthews Denounced by Vets As Pro-Japanese

Seattle, May 18.—(U. P.)—Dr. Mark A. Matthews, pastor of the First Presbyterian church and personal friend of President Wilson, is denounced as pro-Japanese in resolutions passed by Theodore Roosevelt post of the Veterans of Foreign Wars last night at one of the most exciting meetings held in this city since the world war closed.

Dr. Matthews is speeding to the national capital on an unknown mission, following the appearance of an article signed by him in one of the Sunday papers here, in which he flayed opponents of the Japanese as mere prejudiced agitators and un-American in sentiment.

Fearing, by reason of the clergyman's intimate and confidential relationship with the president, that he will attempt to influence the policies of the administration in behalf of the Japanese, Roosevelt post last night dispatched its resolutions to the president and congress arguing that Dr. Matthews' views be ignored, should he attempt to advance them while in Washington.

Escaped Prisoner Is Taken in Rolla, N. D.

Salem, May 18.—Jack Price, who escaped from the state prison here March 27, has been arrested in Rolla, N. D., according to information received by prison officials this morning. Price was received at the prison on September 11, 1919, for obtaining money under false pretenses in Umatilla county. Together with Robert Grant, another trusty, he escaped in an automobile belonging to P. M. Varney, state parole officer. No trace has been found of Grant, in for larceny in Umatilla county.

Thrown Against Roof Of Taxi and Injured

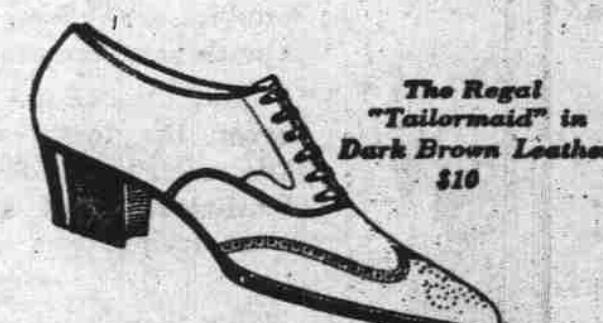
