

ANGLO-JAPANESE TREATY IS TO BE GIVEN AMENDMENT

London, May 12.—The Anglo-Japanese treaty will prevent any possibility of Great Britain being drawn into war with the United States in event of trouble between Japan and America, according to statements from an authoritative source today.

The Japanese and British foreign offices are now preparing amendments for inclusion in the treaty which is being drawn.

The amendment with which Britain is greatest concerned is one covering article four. This article provides that England and Japan declare to go to war, in defense of the other, against nations with which they have arbitration treaties. The British foreign office proposes to make it clear that this covers the Anglo-American treaty, signed in 1914, which became effective subsequent to the signing of the original treaty with Japan. England has always insisted that this article covered the United States, but will make this more explicit.

Pulp Mills Will Be Built in Canada to Provide More Paper

London, England, May 12.—Plans are under consideration for opening up forests and erecting pulp mills in Canada to relieve the severe and increasing shortage of news print in the United Kingdom. More energy will also be devoted to making paper manufacturing machines, none of which were made in England during the war. Newspapers and periodicals all over the country are raising their prices and hundreds have already done so.

The Manchester Guardian is one of the latest to increase its price. From next Monday it will be sold for 2 pence (4 cents) instead of 1 penny halfpenny (3 cents) as heretofore. The Guardian explains that newsprint costs 500 per cent more than before the war and that each copy of the paper costs 1 penny (2 cents) more than it fetches. All imports of raw material for paper from Canada and the United States have ceased. Americans are even doing their utmost to buy paper in England and England's only remaining sources of supply are Scandinavia and Finland.

The present price of newsprint manufactured in British mills is 58 pounds 6 shillings 8 pence (\$291.60) a ton. More-over for every ton of paper made in this country a ton of coal is used and the average cost of conversion in British mills is more than 12 pounds (\$60) a ton. Hence the soaring price of coal will further inflate the price of paper. Before the war the cost of paper was 10 pounds (\$50) a ton.

New List of "War Criminals" Is Sent Germany by Allies

As it will be necessary to send witnesses from the allied countries to appear against the accused, Germany has been asked to guarantee their safety and also guarantee that they will be permitted to be in the court room during the trial.

DANES INTEND TO KEEP SHIPS GOING

Copenhagen, Denmark, May 12.—Niels Neerbaard, the new prime minister with whom I had an interview the night of the peaceful settlement of labor troubles, says that it is necessary to continue the most important functions of the state, and that if the negotiations with the striking seamen, stokers and longshoremen are without result the government will take a strong hand in the matter and employ large numbers of volunteer workmen and give them protection.

"Exports and imports are vital for the country," he said "and especially now when Danish values are in bad condition. This was discussed at the first meeting of the new cabinet today for the matter is one which permits no delay. The government will try to restore normal conditions as quickly as possible and repeal some of the extraordinary laws made by the former government."

Since February the adherents of the new government have been demanding the repeal of the law giving insurance against unemployment. The Zahls government had moved in the same direction but not as quickly as desired. Certain price regulations are also to be discarded. With regard to the Schleswig question the new cabinet proposes to safeguard the interest of the Danish minority in the second zone. It wants the zone internationalized, but will leave the

decision to the supreme council in Paris. Premier Neerbaard said that the financial situation of the country was difficult. It was necessary to curtail expenses and while the taxes were already so high that any further increase was impossible the state needed money badly. The government intended to place a new constitutional bill before the rigdag as soon as possible so that the complete reunion of Schleswig with the mother country could take place immediately after the supreme council turns over the sovereignty of the province to Denmark. The government takes this course, as it wishes to avoid a conflict on the question. It proposes that all persons of 5 years or more shall be given the right to vote, the limit now being 25 years, but it will not agree to the demand of the Social Democrats to reduce the voting age to 21.

British Intend to Give Out All Facts Concerning Ireland

INQUIRY MADE OF INVASION OF RUHR

Berlin, Germany, May 12.—The German League of Nations union has been making a minute investigation of the sending of German troops into the Ruhr district as well as the French occupation of Frankfurt-on-the-Main and will soon issue a report on the subject.

"The German government ought to have asked the League of Nations to intervene when the French raised objections to sending troops to the Ruhr district in order to prevent the Bolsheviks from coming into control there," said Dr. E. J. Jach, president of the German League of Nations union, in the course of a talk I had with him today. "All these revolutions and plots have had a bad effect on the work of the union because of their disturbing influence on the people. The French occupation of Frankfurt destroyed there the hope which was beginning to be felt that German affairs were slowly but surely swinging into healthy channels. It is discouraging to us because we had made good progress."

"The membership of the various organizations included in the union amounts to more than 9,000,000. Among them are the most important leaders of all the parties except the German National party and the German Volk-

(people's) party. The presidents are Mathias Erzberger, Dr. Walter Schueckang and myself. The council includes Count von Bernstorff, Bernhard Dernburg, Eduard Bernstein and Paulin Dr. Rothen. We believe that our best hope lies in a proper revision of the treaty of peace and the inclusion of Germany in the League of Nations. Therefore our business now is to educate the people regarding the aims and procedure of the league."

Dr. Jach insists that Germany should be admitted to the league with exactly the same rights as the other members. He declares that this would do more toward restoring the peace of the world and reconstructing the central powers than any other one move that could be made.

Soviet Cooperative Societies Seeking Connections Abroad

Copenhagen, Denmark, May 12.—M. Marusoff, president of the Russian Cooperative Supply association in Siberia, who during the war was in charge of the association's London office, has arrived in Copenhagen to negotiate with M. Krassin with regard to the future relations between the Cooperative societies in Soviet Russia and the associations abroad. He will also discuss a plan for foreign countries resuming trade connections with Russia. When he returns to London a few days hence he will probably be accompanied by several members of the Krassin delegation.

YANK CAPITALIST QUITS BRITAIN TO AVOID WAR TAXES

London, May 12.—Mortimer Singer, the American capitalist, is abandoning residence in England as a result of the decision of the lords of appeal today, confirming the judgment of a lower court which ordered him to pay tax on the average of his income for three years previous to his assessment, instead of only the actual income during the assessment year.

Singer is thus forced to pay on an income of \$38,435 instead of \$325,400, all derived from dividends of the Singer Manufacturing Company of New Jersey.

The decision is a hard blow to all Americans residing in London and who draw incomes from America, because the assessment schedules aim particularly at exceptionally high war dividends.

Other Americans are expected to follow Singer's example and transfer their domicile to France, where direct taxation is comparatively insignificant.

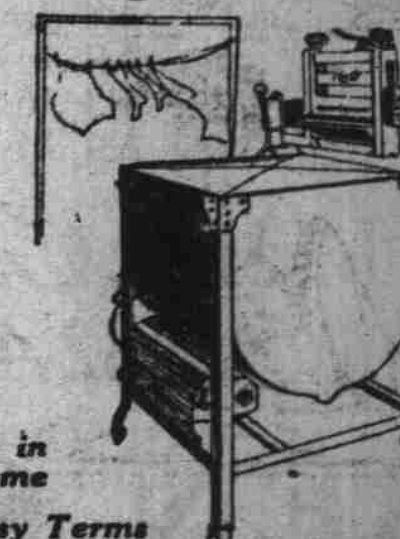
