Swedish Missionary Meeting Opposed to Interchurch Move

Resolutions opposing the interchurch world movement were adopted at the closing session of the North Pacific Swedish missionary conference Sunday. Criticism was directed mainly at the following points:

The conference also resolved to call upon the legislature to repeal the Norblad foreign publication law. It also demanded that the Bible be put back into the public schools and that Bible reading be required in all classes.
