Road Bill Declared Altered Charge Basis of Senate Fight

Fac simile of two sections of Barrett-Hurd road bonding bill of 1913 session, which George Joseph alleges was changed in committee by I. N. Day, without authority, after the committee had finally determined its terms. The portion of the first section, reproduced above, following the parenthesis, was the original section as adopted by the full committee. The section, including the parenthesis, was the one reported to the senate and attacked by Joseph. The second section, reproduced below, is the one finally written into the bill by the senate and enacted into law.

Section 24. (Previous to advertising for bids, and the opening thereof, and determination of the lowest and best bid, no county court shall adopt plans or specifications for any road which requires the exclusive use of any patented article or process or any article or process protected by any trademark or any article or process wholly controlled by any person, firm or corporation or combination thereof.

Section 25. All acts and parts of acts in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

Section 24. The county court shall prepare plans and specifications of said road and shall invite bids in conformity to such plans and specifications, and may also receive and consider any and all bids in conformity to any plans and specifications furnished by any individual, firm or corporation offering to bid on such road. The county court shall have power to reject any and all bids.

The brother had left him sitting on the porch of the home and started to work in the garden when he heard the report of a gun.

Former Portland Hotel Man Passes At the Age of 86

Medford, May 20.—Ellis William Wall, former Portland hotel man and later engaged in placer mining in Southern Oregon, died here Tuesday at the age of 86 years. He was one of the first members of the legislature of the Dakotas and helped frame the laws admitting them to statehood. He served as Hon. Homme county, South Dakota, legislator three terms and as sheriff of that territory for two terms. Following this he held important government contracts at the Pine Ridge Indian agency, where he was on friendly terms with famous Indian warriors and chiefs. Both he and his wife spoke the Sioux language. He is survived by his wife, six children and 11 grandchildren.

Leach, a graduate of the college in mechanical engineering in 1918, has been given a fellowship in the Sibley Engineering college of Cornell university. Since returning from service he has been engaged in work for the state at Ione, Or. Leach is a son of Dr. H. Leach, former Corvallis pastor, now located in Eugene.
