JOHNSON VOTE INCREASED BY LATER COUNT

U. S. Senator Chamberlain Gets 15,132 in 31 Counties, Incomplete; Starkweather Has 8,151.

In G. O. P. Nomination for U. S. Senate Stanfield Is Leading Abraham With 52,236 Votes.

Johnson continues to hold all he has won and to gain a little here, and there as the vote comes in on the presidential fight from up state. Incomplete returns from 31 counties of the state, including the complete returns from 409 Multnomah county precincts, give the California candidate a lead of 2337 votes. Wood continues in second place, with Lowden third and Hoover fourth.

The total vote so far compiled is Johnson 24,312, Wood 22,915, Lowden 12,622 and Hoover 10,241.

STANFIELD FAR AHEAD
For United States senator on the Republican ticket, Stanfield has widened the gap between himself and Abraham to 24,711 votes. The vote, incomplete from 31 counties including 400 complete precincts in Multnomah, gives Stanfield 52,236 votes to 22,253 for Abraham. United States Senator Chamberlain is also outgunning Starkweather at the gate he has maintained from the beginning of the count. He is now 6891 votes ahead of the Clackamas county man. Chamberlain's total is 15,132, while Starkweather has 8,151.

The same divergence in the two contests shows in the Multnomah totals. There Stanfield has 27,525 votes to 3304 for Abraham, a lead of 17,521 for Stanfield.

Chamberlain has 5636 and Starkweather 3508, a lead of 3130 for Chamberlain.

DR. LOVEJOY VICTOR
So far as the congressional contests, both Republican and Democratic are concerned, they are all over but the completed tabulation. In all three contests, Mrs. Alexander Thompson has been decisively beaten by Dr. Esther Pohl-Lovejoy for the Democratic nomination in the third district, while C. N. McArthur, incumbent, has won the nomination from Sweeney, the second high man, with Eugene Smith third in the race on the Republican side.

W. C. Hawley, goes onto the ballot from the first district without opposition, while Nick Sinnott is running far in the lead in the second district against Jones, his opponent. Sinnott has 5366 votes to 1777 for Jones, on an incomplete count.

Up to the present complete reports have been received from 400 of the 413 precincts in Multnomah county. On the congressional district, these complete counts give Dr. Lovejoy 5282 votes to 4338 for Mrs. Thompson, a majority of 1224.

McArthur has, on the same basis, 19,168 votes, Sweeney 13,654, and Smith 6687, a plurality of 5514 for McArthur.

Plan Is Sought to Finance City Work in Unstable Market

Mayor Baker and the city commissioners Saturday discussed the prospect of evolving a feasible plan for financing municipal improvements now in danger of being indefinitely delayed because of unfavorable bond market conditions. A meeting with the Clearing House association has been arranged for Monday, when various plans for financing will be discussed, and the city council will meet Tuesday to take some definite action based on the outcome of this conference.

Commissioners expressed the opinion that, if it becomes necessary, some of the contractors on municipal work will be willing to take bonds in lieu of cash, that there may be no further delay in carrying on the improvement work.

Daughter of Indian Tribe Opens Owens' Presidential Boom

San Francisco, May 22.—(U. N. S.)—The Democratic presidential row was opened up today by a woman.

Mrs. Arta McKinley, a daughter of the famous Shoshone tribe of Indians, arrived today to open headquarters for Senator Robert L. Owens, who is the descendant of a Cherokee Indian chief.

Mrs. McKinley will act as the personal representative of Senator Owens, who is reported to have support from William Jennings Bryan for the Democratic nomination.
