Troeh Out In Lead in Trap Shoot

A TROUBLESOME wind played havoc with the shooters in Sunday's events of the Oregon State Traphooting championship tournament at the Everding Park traps of the Portland Gun club.

As a result, there are about a dozen Oregon shooters who have a chance to annex the state honors. J. Blaine Troeh of Portland leads the field with a score of 193, having a two bird margin over Henry Veatch of Cottage Grove and Mark Rickard of Corvallis.

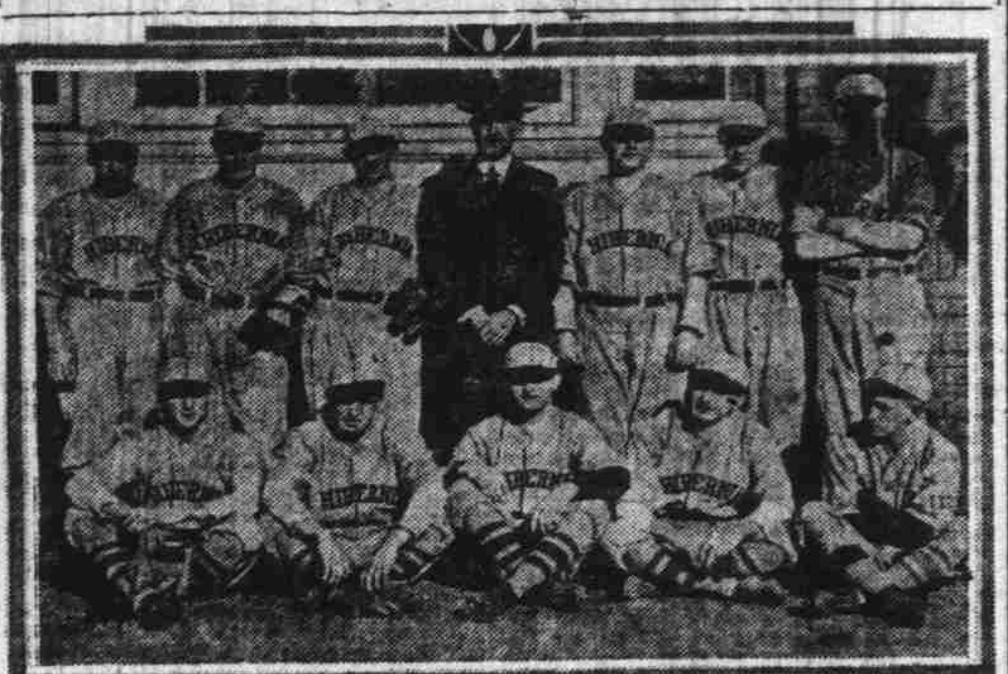

Levincky To Battle Georges

By Jack Velock NEW YORK, May 24.—(L. N. S.)—The signing of Georges Carpentier and Batt Levincky for a bout for the world's heavyweight championship was hailed with approval by boxing fans throughout the country today.

Despite repeated assurance that he came here to fight—to meet Jack Dempsey if possible—many American boxing fans had begun to believe that Carpentier would eventually return to France without drawing on the gloves in a professional contest on this side of the pond.

Such a matching with Levincky was welcome news. Levincky, recognized as America's light heavyweight champion, should prove a worthy opponent for the Frenchman. Levincky combines speed and cleverness with quite a little punching ability and though he has been in the ring for a number of years and has always ranked as one of this country's busiest boxers, he is a good trial horse for Georges.

As Carpentier is holder of both the heavy and lightweight titles in Europe his match with Levincky will be a title affair and if he hopes to meet Jack Dempsey he must defeat the battler—task that none of the American heavyweights aside from Jack Dempsey has been able to perform decisively.

The Levincky-Carpentier battle will be staged by Jack Curley on or before July 26. It will be either for 12 or 15 rounds, with or without a decision, depending on where it is held. Curley will name a site four weeks in advance of the bout and it is probable that New York will land the plum, for favorable action on the Walker boxing bill by Governor Smith is expected within a few days.
