

BILL LEGALIZING BEER IS APPROVED BY N. Y. GOVERNOR

(By United News.) Albany, N. Y., May 25.—The manufacture and sale of 2.75 per cent beer is legal in New York state, Governor Smith signed Monday the Walker bill declaring beverages containing that quantity of alcohol non-intoxicating.

But the manufacture and sale of such beer is not legal in the United States and unless it is so declared by the supreme court it is doubtful whether this state will become an oasis, as supporters of the Walker measure have hoped.

HELD NON-INTOXICATING
By the terms of the measure, to which the governor affixed his signature, with the declaration that he felt inclined to accept the decision of the legislature that 2.75 per cent beer is non-intoxicating, such liquid refreshment may be sold in cities of the first and second class, in restaurants and hotels meeting certain specifications. Where it is sold in stores it may not be drunk on the premises.

The bill absolutely does away with the saloon.

In his approval of the measure, Governor Smith said:
"In the opinion of experts laid before me, there is a sharp division of opinion, those declaring 2.75 per cent beer to be intoxicating being about equal in number with those declaring it to be non-intoxicating, and I feel that I am placed in the position of having before me the legislative declaration that such beer is non-intoxicating."

ABIDES BY MAJORITY
"If representative democratic government means anything, it surely means that when a substantial majority of both houses makes its declaration upon a matter of this sort, it is representative of the majority sentiment of the state."

"In the absence of anything concrete and definite upon which I could predicate reasons for disagreement with the legislative declaration, I feel that this bill should be approved."

New York state is now lined up with New Jersey on the issue of legalizing the sale of beverages containing an amount of alcohol larger than that laid down by the Volstead act, which federal authorities are seeking to enforce.

The issue is between the federal government and the state, the latter having assumed that "concurrent power to enforce the prohibition amendment" gives it the right to determine what shall be construed as intoxicating liquor.

AWAIT COURT RULING

This is one of the questions which will be settled by the supreme court of the United States, on cases which have already been submitted and argued before it. A decision has been expected for several weeks, but there is likelihood that it will not be made known until the fall term of the court.

In the event of an attempt to sell 2.75 per cent beer it is a foregone conclusion that federal enforcement agents will attempt to obtain indictments, and there is some question as to whether manufacturers in this state stand assuming "rights" afforded under the new law to manufacture beer of a larger alcoholic content than that provided by the volstead law limiting it to one-half of one per cent.

Additional Railroad Rates Are Urged on Interstate Board

Washington, May 25.—(U. P.)—President Samuel Rea of the Pennsylvania lines went on the stand here today before the Interstate Commerce commission to urge increased freight rates which will give the road additional revenue of \$1,017,000,000 year.

G. M. Schriver, vice president of the Baltimore & Ohio, was to testify after Rea. Heads of all the principal roads are listed as witnesses. Heads of the shippers' organizations will follow the executives. Shippers are protesting increased rates.

Without higher rates, the roads cannot pay 6 per cent on their securities, the executives contend.

Prominent Pioneer Of Dayton Is Dead

Dayton, Wash., May 25.—C. J. Broughton, Dayton's foremost pioneer, died Sunday, aged 64 years. The funeral was held at his home this afternoon under the auspices of the Masonic lodge. He was born in Somerset county, Maryland, and came west 48 years ago. He engaged in the mercantile business, acquired land and banking interests, and amassed one of the largest fortunes in Eastern Washington. Broughton is survived by his wife and nine children.

NUNN WOULD BAR HEAVY TRUCKS ON OREGON HIGHWAYS

Salem, May 25.—Limitation of the capacity and speed of trucks as the solution of one of the problems now

being faced in the construction of hard surfaced highways, is the prediction made by Herbert S. Nunn, state highway engineer, speaking at the Salem Commercial club luncheon Monday.

According to Nunn, it is not practical to build a highway that will stand up under heavy truck traffic, which would necessitate the expenditure of some \$40,000 to \$50,000 per mile of highway. In order, therefore, to protect the highway for the use of the other class of motor vehicles, the trucks must be curbed, according to Nunn.

Under a policy recently adopted by the state highway commission, no new grades will be paved hereafter, Nunn

stated. It has been found that pavement laid on new grades was faulty and unsatisfactory because of the settling of the grade. Under the new policy the commission will not pave until at least two years, and probably three years, after a grade has been completed.

The press of Oregon is credited with the victory of the elementary school measure in a statement issued by F. E. Carleton, assistant superintendent of public instruction. The plan involved in the tax measure was advocated by Superintendent J. A. Churchill and Carleton as long ago as 1913, but was regarded as too much of a radical change to receive favorable action at that time.

Fred G. Williams, member of the public service commission, left Monday for Washington, where he will join with other commissioners in protesting the freight rate increase asked by the railroads of the county in an application

filled with the interstate commerce commission.

Charles Elgin, traveling auditor for the state industrial accident commission, has resigned, effective June 1. Elgin will devote his time hereafter to his prairie ranch near Salem.

in front of a range. If she recovers, she will owe her life to Floyd Davis, court, 11-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Emil Davis. Miss Landers tried vainly to extinguish the flames by beating her clothes with a towel. Hearing her screams, Davis rushed into the house and wrapped the girl in a blanket.
