Noted Chautauqua Lecturer Is Dead

Cottage Grove, May 25.—Dr. Robert Sutcliffe, noted minister and Chautauqua lecturer, died Monday at his home here.

He was born in Esholt, Yorkshire, England, on September 21, 1868, and was an evangelist in the city of London for several years before moving to Prince Edward's Island, Canada, in 1890. In 1893 he was admitted into the Methodist Episcopal conference of the state of Maine and in 1909 he came to Oregon, settling in Cottage Grove nine years ago. He was pastor of the Methodist church here for three years, at Lebanon three years, and at Great Falls, Idaho, for several years before taking up Chautauqua work.

He was stricken about seven months ago and returned to his home here. Dr. Sutcliffe had been a Mason many years and the Masons will have charge of his funeral services Wednesday. Rev. Simpson Hamrick of the Cottage Grove Methodist church, also a Mason, will officiate. Dr. Sutcliffe was also an Elk and a Woodman of the World. His aged mother, his wife and two children, Mrs. Armorel Monson of Toledo, Wash., and Robert Sutcliffe, in the Chautauqua work, survive.

PROVIDE FOR WAR'S WOUNDED FIRST, IS COMMITTEE'S PLAN

Extension to Oregon of the campaign to provide fair treatment for American soldiers wounded and incapacitated in the European war before congress votes a bonus of several billions to all who were in the service is marked by the acceptance of A. R. Watzek of the state chairmanship of the Committee for Aid to Disabled Veterans and Referendum on the Bonus.

From Watzek's office in the Northwestern Bank building requests are being sent to ex-service men who favor adequate provision for the war's disabled to wire Oregon's senators and congressmen that relief for the wounded should take precedence over a general bonus to all ex-servicemen.

Colonel Henry L. Stimson, who was secretary of war under President Taft, is chairman of the general committee and ex-President Taft himself is one of the strong backers of the move which has received the support of many Eastern posts of the American Legion. Writing Colonel Stimson, Taft said:

"If congress and the executive departments were properly to busy themselves in making provision for the wounded and injured soldiers, and disclose in such effort, and provide the amount needed for this purpose, it would properly postpone or defeat the bonus scheme."

Telegrams had been received today from Senator McNary announcing his interest in the proposition, especially in caring for the wounded soldiers.

"There are 642,000 disabled American soldiers as a legacy from the European war," said Watzek, who was a major of artillery with the American expeditionary forces, "and thousands of these are not being properly cared for now owing to lack of funds. The committee believes the duty of the government towards these men does not end with patching them up but should include physical after-care and in many cases, reeducation. Not only should the government provide the vocational training which it is attempting but it should care for the men who need it during their training period. This will mean from one third to half a billion dollars a year to discharge the nation's debt honorably."

"In the face of this need to saddle a bonus on the country for men who were not wounded, which will mean an additional \$20 debt for every man, woman and child in America, seems inconceivable. The actual increase in the cost of living which this additional debt would entail alone would wipe out any benefit the ex-service men might receive from it."
