

PITTOCK TOLD OF PLANS TO PREPARE HIS LAST WILL

(Continued From Page One)

"I never presumed to act in any important matter without his direction," said Morden, in reply to a query as to the extent of his influence with Pittock. MORDEN MADE SECRETARY

Morden said he was made secretary and director of the corporation following the death of Harvey W. Scott, editor, in 1910.

"What was Pittock's practice in keeping around him men with whom he had been long associated in the past?" asked Judge Carey.

"That policy in respect to Mr. Piper you expect to carry out?" asked Cotton. "Yes, sir," Morden answered. "And with regard to yourself?"

"Yes, sir," Morden answered. "Vigorous objection was made to Cotton's question if minority stockholders of the Oregonian were ever consulted in future plans for the Oregonian. The court ruled with the contestants, however, and Morden replied, 'Not definitely—no.'"

Leslie M. Scott, son of Harvey W. Scott, represented the minority stockholders on the board, Morden indicated. Scott called at the Oregonian about once a week for the reports and brief discussion, said the witness. William Goldman, general agent for the National Life Insurance company, a witness during the day, said Pittock had granted him a two years' lease in the Oregonian building over Morden's head after he had been told that it was impossible, it being against the Oregonian's policy to grant leases in the upper stories of the building.

ATTORNEYS IN CLASH
The severity that had marked proceedings during the direct examination of O. L. Price, confidential secretary to Henry L. Pittock, and the questioning of previous witnesses, was slightly ruffled for the first time Wednesday afternoon, when J. P. Cotton, representing Mrs. Caroline P. Leadbetter, contestant, began his cross-examination.

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Price admitted that no such suggestion was made, but qualified his reply with the statement that he was not in the habit of making suggestions to the aged publisher of the Oregonian.

DEVICES GIVEN ADVICE
"Was Mrs. Pittock's condition suggested to Mr. Pittock in the event her husband died?" asked Cotton, referring to Mrs. Fred Pittock.

Price again answered in the negative, with the same qualification. "Did you suggest to him that the provisions for his children or their issue were illegal?" Cotton then asked, and again the secretary answered that no advice had been given Pittock.

In his examination Cotton planned the witness to yes and no replies, advising him that he could enlarge on these answers afterwards.

John F. Logan, representing the proponents of the will, ushered the first tilt between counsel when he protested sharply to Cotton that the latter, in his questioning was placing constructions on the will that were untrue.

At the time of Pittock's death, Price said on cross-examination, there was more than half a million indebtedness against the estate, including a balance of \$455,000 on the Washington street mortgage, \$150,000 owing to the Oregonian, \$11,000 in street assessments and \$120,000 income tax for 1919.

Among the indebtedness was Pittock's \$35,000 half of a \$70,000 mortgage against the Commonwealth building, Price said.

BELIEVES WILL LEGAL
Although replying that he had made no suggestion that the will provisions relating to the children and their issue were illegal, Price said he did not want it inferred that he thought the will provisions in those respects were illegal.

In no instance, the witness added, did the publisher ever give him any instructions as to the management of the Oregonian after his death.

Speaking of the financial condition of the Pittock children, Price said that the oldest daughter, residing in Millboro, Pa., was understood to be independent. Mrs. Leadbetter was also independent.

he said. Two married daughters residing at the Pittock home on Imperial Heights were described as being "not well off."

Fred F. Pittock, the son, apparently had little else than his salary, from Price's description, which, at the time of Pittock's death, amounted to \$150 a month from Pittock & Leadbetter Co. and \$50 from the Northwestern Fidelity Co.

Since Pittock's death, Price said, the salary of Morden, manager of the Oregonian, had been increased by \$150 a month to conform to the salary received by Pittock.

In rather humorous vein, and illustrating the iron will of Pittock, Colonel George H. Kelly told of unsuccessful efforts made by himself and Herbert Fleischacker to induce him in 1915 to reduce the lease terms on the Pittock block.

Emory Olmstead, president of the Northwestern National bank, told at length of the financing operations that brought about the founding of that institution. Within a few months, he said, he made four trips to New York, borrowing each time from \$100,000 to \$500,000 on Pittock's credit.

Father of Attorney Crumpacker Dies in Valparaiso, Indiana

Valparaiso, Ind., May 27.—Funeral services were held here for the late Edgar Dean Crumpacker, who died at the age of 59 years. Crumpacker long was a prominent figure in Indiana politics, having represented the tenth Indiana district in congress from 1897 until 1913. He was a Republican. Prior to his long service in politics he had been prosecuting attorney of the 31st Indiana judicial district and judge of the appellate court of Indiana. He is survived by a widow and three sons.

Attorney Maurice E. Crumpacker of Portland was called east last week by the serious illness of his father, whose death occurred before his arrival at Valparaiso.

and after a long ride by train and automobile, were married at Elkton, the Maryland Greens. The marriage was the culmination of a boy and girl romance that made rapid progress during the season just passed.

The bridegroom is a member of a family, which, while not so wealthy nor so well known as that of his bride, has been part of the most exclusive life of New York for several generations. His father is Stuyvesant Wainwright, a distinguished physician. He is a grandson of the late Bishop Wainwright of the Episcopal church. The young Wainwright has frequently been a guest at Georgian court, the Lakewood estate of the Goulds, and his attentions to Miss Gould have been a matter of comment in society for months.

Mrs. Wainwright is 18 years old and is the sixth of seven children of Mr. and Mrs. Gould. Wainwright is 22, the son of Stuyvesant Wainwright and a descendant of Peter Stuyvesant. The elopement is the third that has occurred in the family.
