

TAFT CHAMPIONS TREATY OF PEACE AND LEAGUE PLAN

For Europe, for America and for the coming generations, crown the supreme efforts of the American army in France by establishment of the League of Nations. Clinch the benefits of the war in behalf of humanity and the world. Make the League of Nations more than an offensive and defensive alliance between European nations.

That was the appeal of William Howard Taft to the people of Portland, made in behalf of the league in his address at the Auditorium Thursday evening. He insisted that ratification of the league and treaty is being blocked by quibbling over inconsequential details, that the difference between contending factions is nominal, and that the salient points of principle are smothered by debate over unimportant terms.

"There is nothing more than a verbal, a nominal difference," said Taft, "existing between the opposing parties in the United States congress in their attitude toward the League of Nations. While I don't agree with my friend, William Jennings Bryan, very often, in political matters, I do believe, as he does, that there is no more of a real difference than now exists in congress, we are entitled to an agreement. If this is not possible, then to the submission of the minority."

"Where the difference between the parties is so small, so unsubstantial," said Taft, "there is no real reason for further disagreement."

Speaking of President Wilson's attitude of non-compromise, Taft said that the president is, in his opinion, seriously jeopardizing the ultimate success of the treaty of peace. By his failure to reservation on Article X, he endangers greatly its passage, he declared.

"If the president does not change his mind, we can only wait till March 4 and pray that his successor will have a better idea of the league's fundamental purposes than has he himself."

"In the event that Wilson does not yield there will still be a constitutional door open to a legal state of peace. There is the possibility that the congress of the country and the German parliament will pass concurrent resolutions of peace. This would be sufficient to establish the two countries on a relationship of peace."

In concluding Taft made an appeal for the adoption of the treaty of peace, including the League of Nations.

"Do not," said the ex-president, "let our supreme efforts in France go uncrowned." Do not leave our argument for the world's betterment unheeded. Without the United States the League of Nations will be nothing more than an offensive and defensive alliance. With her, it will be a power for righteousness. We owe it to Europe, but even more, we owe it to ourselves, and to the coming generations in the United States."

YALE ALUMNI GUEST

Taft was a guest of Yale alumni and college men generally at a dinner at the University club Thursday evening. He touched but little on the international question, reserving it for his formal speech at the Auditorium. He explained sympathetically and in some detail, however, the educational problems that have grown out of the war and urged the necessity of stronger support for the institutions of learning, elementary as well as higher.
