

SCHOOL DIRECTORS. HALT GRANDSTAND WORK OF SHRINERS

Work on the Shrine grandstand to be erected on the grounds of the Girls' Polytechnic school at Morrison and Fourteenth streets, must be postponed until the close of school, June 11, or else be done only on Saturdays and Sundays, it was decided at the meeting of the school board, Thursday night. Workmen a few days ago began work, interfering with the school program and upsetting laboratory work in general by removing some of the electric wires.

Attention was called to the National Education association convention to be held in Salt Lake City, July 4, and it was the opinion of the directors that as many as could get away from their work should attend, with all their expenses paid from school money. Assistant Superintendent C. A. Rice will attend from the superintendent's office; Director A. C. Newell has signified his intention of going, and Director O. M. Plummer declared he would go if re-elected. A resolution adopted by

the board last year authorizes any member of the board to attend any school convention at any time at public expense.

Taxpayers, patrons and residents of Laurelhurst district protested against the change of the name "Laurelhurst" to "Harvey W. Scott" school, since the old name identifies so excellently the location of the school and the surroundings. The board declared the protest came too late.

The salary of W. L. Palmer, purchasing agent, was increased from \$125 to \$150, in recognition of numerous savings he has made to the district on purchases.

It was decided to devote a special number of the school bulletin to the \$3 mill tax proposition that is coming up at the school election June 9. The \$3 mill tax, if passed, will provide nearly a million dollars for building construction.

Condemnation proceedings on the Beach and Sabin properties will come up June 5 and Clerk R. H. Thomas was instructed to take steps necessary to permit immediate erection on the acquired property.
