

FATHER O'HARA TRANSFERRED BY ARCHBISHOP

Pastor of St. Marys Cathedral Here and Leader in Many Public Activities Will Become Pastor at Eugene Next Week.

Archbishop Christie has transferred the Rev. Father Edwin V. O'Hara to the pastorate at Eugene from St. Marys (Cathedral) parish in this city. The archbishop said that he had not yet named Father O'Hara's successor here. Father O'Hara is to take up his new duties next week.

Rev. John A. Moran, the pastor of the Eugene church, has been transferred to St. Charles church in this city. The news of the transfer comes as a complete surprise to Portland Catholics. Members of the parish who were asked if the change had been anticipated were so thunderstruck at the news that there was no need for further answer.

Those who did vouchsafe an answer said that while it was news to them, it was known that Father O'Hara had been seeking a change from the arduous pastoral duties of a large church such as St. Marys to some point where he could continue his studies and work upon sociological questions in which he is much interested.

Whether Father O'Hara had requested the change himself could not be learned. Archbishop Christie declined to say whether the transfer was at Father O'Hara's request, though some close friends of the latter were certain it could not be. Archbishop Christie will leave for the East Sunday night.

That the transfer was determined upon suddenly is evidenced by the fact that members of the Cathedral congregation who attended the cathedral last Sunday remember that Father O'Hara outlined plans of the parish for the immediate future in which he had apportioned an important part of the work for himself.

The removal of Father O'Hara from Portland will be a matter of deep and sincere regret not only among the Catholic people of the city, by all of whom he is loved but among hundreds of people outside of the church, whose admiration he has won by his broad cultural attainments, his high-minded ideas and his intelligent interest and active participation in educational, social welfare and state matters.

Father O'Hara was graduated from St. Thomas College in St. Paul and from St. Paul Seminary and did graduate work at the Catholic University in Washington.

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DAIRYMEN IN FORM \$502,500 CONCERN

The Oregon Dairymen's By-Products corporation, capitalized at \$502,500, and with Portland as its principal place of business, filed its articles of incorporation today with the county clerk of Multnomah county.

The incorporators are Alma D. Katz, F. W. Boesel and J. W. Pomeroy. The purpose of the corporation is given to be the buying and selling, packing, canning, etc., of non acid dairy products.

At the same time the articles of incorporation were filed by the Oregon Dairymen's Cooperative league, with no capital stock, but with the intent for membership fees. The incorporators are Katz, Pomeroy, I. R. Steigewald, J. T. Whitten, Jacob Luscher and R. B. Pomeroy.

Mother of Missing Girl Is Lured Away; Home Then Robbed

Lured away by the subterfuge that she was about to see her daughter, who had been missing four days, Mrs. Victor Katz returned to her home at 1280 Simpson street early this morning to find the house had been entered during her absence and the girl's clothing, \$2 in money, some blank checks and a quantity of food from the pantry stolen.

Mrs. Katz immediately notified the police, and on information supplied by her, Otto Johnson, 17 years old, of 1196 East Thirty-fifth street North, was arrested and is now held in the juvenile ward of the county jail.

Mrs. Katz reported early in the week that her daughter, Gladys Christie, 13 years old, was missing. Friday night Johnson called at her home and said that Gladys and a boy named Eldon O'Leary, 17 years old, were in a house at Twenty-ninth and Emerson streets. The girl was afraid to return home, Johnson is said to have informed the mother.

Mrs. Katz immediately went to the place, but did not find the pair. She returned home to find that the robbery had taken place. Johnson was arrested soon afterward, and the police now say that he has partially confessed to the plan to get the mother away from the home that the daughter might secure her clothing, money and food.

Woman Convicted of Espionage Pardoned

BREAK EXPECTED OF WATERED BUTTER HELD OFF MARKET

Chicago, May 29.—(I. N. S.)—Governor Henry J. Allen of Kansas who himself is expected to be a candidate, will make the nominating speech for General Wood at the Republican national convention, it was announced here today. The general's nomination will be seconded from Colorado by C. J. Moynihan of Montana.

Governor Allen will pay tribute to General Wood as a "native son" of Kansas despite the fact that the general is a New Englander, born and bred. General Wood is a citizen of the state of Kansas by a special act of legislation. He commanded the Eighty-ninth division of the national army (Kansas troops) until receipt of orders. He was removed from command on the eve of sailing.

There has been a general marshalling of the Wood forces in Chicago for the last 24 hours. Whether by accident or in response to definite orders, most of the leaders in the Wood movement have begun to drift in and it is expected that there will be a conference here tomorrow or Monday.

There is a distinct feeling and many rumors along "presidential row" that something is going to happen in the Wood camp. The "patched up" peace between Frank Hitchcock, the "political adviser," and Colonel William C. Procter, the generalissimo of the campaign, which was effected only some weeks ago, is reported to have about played itself out.

Hitchcock arrived in Chicago yesterday. He did not, however, visit Wood's general headquarters, although quartered in the same hotel. He even asked reporters where the headquarters were located. Hitchcock would not comment directly on the reported break, saying with his usual suavity that he "never talked for publication." The story was denied, however, at the Wood camp.

The Hoover movement in Chicago is to be enlisted considerably, it was announced today, with the arrival of a New York contingent of Hoover supporters. These will be headed by George Barr Baker, one of Hoover's lieutenants in the relief work.

Plans are being pushed rapidly for the publication in Chicago during the convention of a "Hoover Herald." It is to be an eight page newspaper, devoted exclusively to the interests of the former food administrator. It will be edited by James Keeley, former editor of a number of big Chicago dailies.

Apple Crop Failure Doesn't Materialize

Wenatchee, Wash., May 29.—(U. P.)—You remember how the apple crop had its yearly "failure" about a month ago? Well, it's all right now, most of the crop having been contracted for. The crop will be up to last year's tonnage, orchardists admit.

Senate Agrees to Army Bill Report

Washington, May 29.—(U. P.)—The senate today agreed to the conference report on the army reorganization and sent it to the president. The measure, previously passed by the house, provides for a total strength of 297,000 officers and enlisted men.

Turks and British Reported as Allies

London, May 29.—(I. N. S.)—Unconfirmed reports are in circulation in Rome that Great Britain and Turkey have effected an alliance, said an Exchange Telegraph dispatch from Rome today.

HOUSE PASSES SOLDIER BONUS BY 289 TO 92

Under Suspension of Rules Bill Wins With More Than Necessary Two-Thirds; Oregon Members Vote to Suspend Rules.

Washington, May 29.—(U. P.)—The soldier bonus bill passed the house late today under suspension of the rules.

To pass under suspension of the rules, the measure required a majority of two thirds of those voting. The vote was 289 to 92. This was 35 more than necessary.

Washington, May 29.—(U. P.)—The house today voted 220 to 165 to suspend the rules for six legislative days in order that the soldier bonus bill may be considered without amendments.

Immediately after the vote Chairman Fordney of the ways and means committee called up the bill, declaring he would ask for a vote today.

Two thirds majority is required for passage of the bonus measure under suspension of the rules. Bonus advocates so far today failed to muster this majority.

Opposition to a cash bonus for discharged soldiers was voiced by Senator Myers, Montana, Democrat, in a speech today. Myers favored the Lane bill to reclaim arid and swamp lands for the ex-soldiers and liberal compensation for incapacitated veterans.

Oregon Supplies Three Votes

Washington, May 29.—(WASHINGTON BUREAU OF THE JOURNAL.)—Representatives Hawley, McArthur and Sinnot voted today to sustain the speaker's ruling on the suspension of the rule making the soldier bonus bill in order and thereby supplied the necessary votes, an appeal from the decision being tabled by just three majority.

War of Europe and Asia Against U. S., Warning of Lewis

Chicago, May 29.—(I. N. S.)—Warning that in the not far distant future there will be another world war, with the principal countries of Europe and Asia combined against the United States, was sounded before the Illinois Bar association by former United States Senator James Hamilton Lewis.

"Even before the second election following the forthcoming presidential choice, England and Germany will be in a commercial league," he declared.

"Both will join with Russia and Japan to prevent the United States from extending its commerce and to protect British interests in Asia and India. Then the United States will find itself completely isolated. After this some grievance will be found whereby these nations will unite either to humiliate or to attempt to destroy the United States."

Woman Appointed As First Assistant Attorney General

Washington, May 29.—(I. N. S.)—President Wilson established a precedent today when he nominated Mrs. Annette Abbott Adams of San Francisco to be assistant attorney general.

This is the first appointment of a woman to this office and is the highest federal office yet to be given to a woman.

Mrs. Adams is now United States attorney for the northern district of California.

The president also nominated W. L. Frierson, now assistant attorney general, to be solicitor general of the United States. Frierson is of Chattanooga, Tenn.

Babe Ruth Knocks Out Eleventh Homer

Boston, May 29.—(I. N. S.)—Babe Ruth lined out his eleventh homer of the season in the fourth inning of the first game here this afternoon. Meusel was on base.



France Will Pay Homage to Hero Dead at Many Historic Spots

Paris, May 29.—(I. N. S.)—Impressive memorial services for the American soldier dead will be held throughout France tomorrow, especially in the "battle towns" where the United States troops distinguished themselves in action against the Germans.

The weather forecast is for rain, but the elaborate programs will be carried out despite bad weather.

President Wilson will participate in spirit in the Memorial day observance in France. Hugh C. Wallace, the American ambassador, acting as the personal envoy of the president, will lay a wreath upon the statue of "The American Doughboy" in the Surames cemetery.

Colonel Francis Drake, of the Paris post of the American Legion, will head a delegation that will place a wreath upon the statue of La Fayette in the Picpus cemetery.

In addition to the official ceremonies, thousands of French peasant families, acting independently of the organized program, will put their tribute of flowers upon graves of fallen Americans in the rural districts. Children will largely predominate here.

Major General John F. O'Ryan has arrived from London and will be the chief speaker at the ceremony at Bony where the American Twenty-seventh division was in action, losing many brave men.

FIVE IN RACE FOR SCHOOL DIRECTOR

Two more aspirants to the position of school director to fill the vacancies caused by the termination of the terms of Dr. E. A. Sommer and O. M. Plummer June 19, were this morning filed with Clerk R. H. Thomas, making five candidates in all, with the probability of a sixth.

J. N. Pearcey of the firm of Pearcey & Mendenhall, attorneys, with offices in the Chamber of Commerce building, announced his candidacy today. Pearcey has never held any public office in Portland. He is a graduate of the elementary and high schools of Portland and of the University of Oregon. All his children have been graduated through public and high schools and he is a believer in Americanizing public schools and having for directors and teachers those who are in favor of public schools, he announced.

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HI JOHNSON'S OREGON FUND WAS \$5500

Largest Single Item of Campaign Pot of \$125,000 Went to New York, Where \$25,000 Was Expended, Senate Committee Told

Washington, May 29.—(U. P.)—A total campaign fund for General Leonard Wood of \$1,150,043 was disclosed late today to the senate campaign fund investigating committee by A. A. Sprague, national chairman of the Wood campaign fund.

Washington, May 29.—(U. P.)—Between \$100,000 and \$125,000 was raised for Hiram Johnson's primary campaign in California, Alexander McCabe, San Francisco, one of Johnson's managers, told the senate campaign expenditures investigating committee today.

The contributions totaled this amount two days before the close of the campaign, McCabe said. He told the committee he had wired to California for all books and records connected with the campaign expenditures.

CANVASS IS STATE WIDE
"The largest individual contribution was \$5000 by Henry Fleischacker," McCabe said. "William H. Crocker gave \$4000 and De Young nothing. The funds were the result of a statewide canvass for contributions."

"Do you know what has been collected since May 4, the date of the primary?" Kenyon asked.

"Probably \$25,000," McCabe replied. He said J. H. Roemer, shipping man, gave \$2500.

McCabe denied rumors that Vice President Herron of the Southern Pacific has contributed to the Johnson campaign.

ONLY NINE MILLIONAIRES
McCabe said he couldn't discover the "nine millionaires" which Hoover men said were on the Johnson primary ticket. He named five as the only millionaires among the 25 California delegates.

"Any millionaires on the Hoover delegation?" asked Kenyon.

"Off-hand, I never counted them, but there were a considerable number," McCabe said.

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Population of Vancouver Shown To Be 12,637; Increase, 3337

Washington, May 29.—The census bureau announced an increase in population of 35.9 per cent for Vancouver, Wash., in the 1920 population results made public today.

Vancouver now has 12,637; increase since 1910, 3337, or 35.9 per cent. Other figures are as follows:

Chester, Pa., 158,030; increase since 1910, 18,493, or 10.6 per cent. Bethlehem, Pa., 50,358; increase since 1910, 37,521, or 74.5 per cent.

Atchison, Kan., 1920 population 12,630; decrease since 1910, 3799, or 23.1 per cent.

Sharon, Pa., 1920 population 21,747; increase since 1910, 6477, or 42.2 per cent.

Hanover, Pa., 1920 population 8664; increase since 1910, 1607, or 22.8 per cent.

Sunbury, Pa., 1920 population 15,721; increase since 1910, 1951, or 14.3 per cent.

Bay City, Mich., 1920 population 47,554; increase since 1910, 2338, or 5.3 per cent.

Ashland, Wis., 1920 population 11,339; decrease since 1910, 260, or 2.2 per cent.

RESIDENTS OF VANCOUVER ANTICIPATED LARGER GAIN
Vancouver, Wash., May 29.—Indicative of the general impression that Vancouver had a larger population than official figures give, were guesses submitted at a contest held by a local store. Approximately 1000 took part and the greater number placed estimates around 15,000. S. L. Adams won the hat offered with a guess of 12,648.

At the time of the 1910 census about 1400 soldiers were stationed at Vancouver barracks while at the time the present figures were secured the number had dwindled to less than 300. This, J. C. pointed out, makes the gain in civilian population much greater than the 35.9 per cent shown by the government figures.

Vancouver is 96 years old and plans to celebrate its centennial anniversary in 1924.

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
