Change in Plan of State Government Favored by Labor

The Central Labor council Thursday evening endorsed the measure to establish a new state government, which was presented by W. S. U'Ren on behalf of the People's Power league. Over 4000 were present and subscribed to put the measure on the ballot for November. It will be presented for final adoption next Thursday evening, and U'Ren will deliver the signature by Saturday, June 5. The measure provides for occupational instead of district representation in the state legislature of 80 members. It also provides for the British system of "responsible" government, and for the effective ballot. It also provides for the proportional representation of groups and parties.
