

Double Defeat Puts Portland Beavers Back in Pacific Coast League Pennant Race

TWO ex-Portland hurlers gave the Beavers a double beating in the Decoration day contests, Walter Malls trimming them 6 to 1 in the morning contest, and Ken Fenner, the reformed "fence ball artist," putting across a 5 to 2 victory in the afternoon game before a banner crowd. Fenner cinched his own game with a two-bagger in the fifth inning that scored three runs. The double victory gave the Yippers the odd game of the eight-game series, and put the Beavers back one notch in the league standings.
