

SCHULDERMAN'S STATE CAMPAIGN COST \$1856.28

Salem, June 2.—L. G. Wagoner, treasurer of the Schulerdeman campaign committee, spent a total of \$1856.28 in behalf of Henry J. Schulerdeman's candidacy for the Republican nomination as secretary of state, according to his expense statement filed with the secretary of state's office here Tuesday. This is in addition to \$370 spent by Schulerdeman himself, in the campaign.

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HEAD OF MEDFORD POSTOFFICE DIES

Medford, June 2.—George P. Mims, postmaster of Medford, died at his room at the hotel Holland early today, from an attack of acute indigestion, which seized him at 2 a. m. He was in unusually good spirits and health Tuesday.

Mr. Mims was familiarly known here and throughout the state by the honorary title of colonel, having come here from Tennessee about 12 years ago. He was born and raised near Newport, Tenn.

He was 53 years old and operated an orchard near Central Point prior to his appointment as postmaster of Medford. He is survived by his wife and several grown sons and daughters. He had been separated from his wife for years. His term as postmaster would have expired next October.

Rumor Is Again Rife That Spruce Division Railroad to Be Sold

Albany, Or., June 2.—The presence of Major Fred W. Leadbetter of Portland in Newport has given rise to a rumor that the Alaska & Southern railway, constructed by the spruce division, is to be sold, probably to the Crown-Willamette Paper company, according to information received here.

The road runs from the Toledo sawmill, which cost more than \$1,000,000, to the Blodgett timber tract, where 800,000,000 feet of timber suitable for pulp making purposes is standing.

Charles K. Spaulding Logging company of this city Tuesday. This is the first instance of a slip on the part of H. C. L. recorded in this city since the general rise in price began five years ago.

Mackenzie Highway Open to Dead Horse Hill, Forester Finds

The Mackenzie river highway is at its best, with the rhododendrons coming out in full blossom, says H. L. Plumb of the forest service, who has just returned from a road and rail inspection trip in the Cascade national forest. The road is open as far as Dead Horse hill, about 25 miles above Mackenzie bridge.

On the middle fork of the Willamette the fish hatchery is being built on Salmon creek at Oakridge. The road is in good shape and one can go as far as Higdon's ranch, 25 miles above Oakridge, in an automobile. The road to McCredie springs is being repaired and will be in good shape within two weeks, says Plumb. The new work on the Mackenzie is coming on well. The road is closed during weekdays, but automobiles can get through at night and on Sundays.

Sheep Killing Dogs Raise Havoc in Lane

Eugene, June 2.—A Coburg farmer, who appeared at the courthouse to claim damages from the dog license fund for a number of sheep killed and mangled by dogs, asserts that not less than a thousand dogs are running loose in Lane county without tags. Farmers, it is said, are shooting at sight any dog suspected of sheep killing.

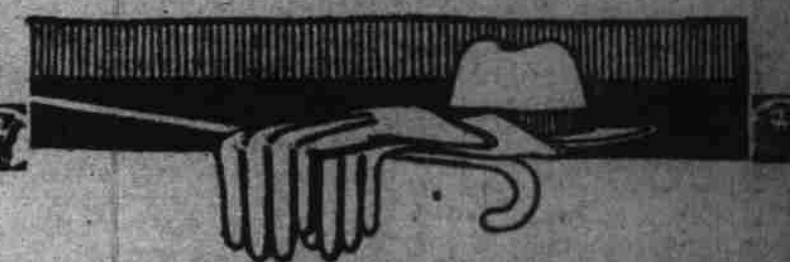
