

GOVERNOR OLCOTT AND KOZER CLASH; SECRETARY WINS

Salem, June 3.—Completely upsetting all "rubber stamp" predictions and providing the first real clash of opinions at a meeting of the state board of control since the death of Governor Withycombe more than a year ago made that body a two-man organization. Secretary of State Kozer at his first session of the board this morning took issue with Governor Olcott on the price of state prison-made brick, and won.

The brick plant, which began operations about a week ago, is about ready to put its product on the market. Several state institutions are clamoring for brick, the Oregon Agricultural college desiring practically the entire season's supply.

Warden Compton this morning appeared before the board with a request that a selling price to state institutions be established. Other state institutions in the sale of any surplus products to state institutions receive the market price.

Compton insisted that the state prison should be accorded the same privilege, especially since the revenue sale of the brick goes into the institution's repair fund, which is now very much in demand.

Olcott was inclined to agree with Compton, but both Kozer and State Treasurer Hoff objected on the ground that a state institution should have the advantage of a lower price. Putting his contention into expression Kozer moved that the price of the prison-made brick be set at actual cost of manufacturing, plus one third. The motion was seconded by Hoff and carried.

This price, it is explained, will make the prison product cost the state institutions approximately only one half of the market price of brick.

Oregon Medicos Are Assembled for 46th Annual Convention

The Oregon State Medical association opened its forty-sixth annual convention in the Masonic temple this morning. The program began with an invocation by Bishop W. T. Sumner, an address of welcome by Mayor Baker and talks by President Burpee, L. Stevon and President-elect Joseph A. Pettit. Other speakers of the morning were Dr. J. Earl Elise, T. M. Joyce, C. E. Sears and A. C. Smith, all of Portland.

A. H. Ross of Eugene, R. H. Wellington of Portland, S. L. Orr, Dunbar of the Anti-Tuberculosis association and D. N. Roberg, state health officer, spoke this afternoon. Other speakers were Dr. Jay L. Durand of Seattle, Dr. R. C. Hall, Dr. C. U. Moore and Dr. James W. Rosenfeld.

A banquet is being given to the visiting physicians tonight at the Chamber of Commerce, Dr. Calvin S. White presiding.

"Bluebeard" Let Off, Yet Boy May Swing

Resolutions requesting the governor of California to commute the death sentence of 18-year-old Roy Wolff to life imprisonment were passed unanimously Wednesday at the special meeting of the Prisoners' Aid society. The members declared it to be preposterous for the state to let "Bluebeard" walk off with a life sentence and yet hang a 18-year-old boy. A copy of the resolutions will be wired to the California governor.

Manufacturers of Soft Drinks Warned About Sale of Goods

Soft drink manufacturers of Portland agreed to discontinue selling their beverages to retailers found guilty of violating the prohibition law and also to make more frequent deliveries to other stores, in a lengthy conference held this morning with Deputy United States Attorney Fiegel.

Fiegel took the manufacturers through the North End district Wednesday night and showed them establishments where sweet fruit juices were being allowed to "harden" in rear rooms. In some places Fiegel reported finding 250 gallons. Under the federal prohibition law the manufacturer can be prosecuted the same as the retailer if the drink is allowed to harden before reaching the consumer.

SHOOT THE CHUTES IS BURNED AT OAKS

Fire of undetermined origin badly damaged the shoot the chutes amusement feature at the Oaks early this morning. Damage was variously estimated at from \$2000 to \$5000. Fire Marshal Grenfell, after an investigation, giving the minimum figure named as his estimate.

The fire was discovered by Clyde Wilson, caretaker. It was burning in the house sheltering the turntable at the top of the incline. The blaze was spectacular, burning high in the air until the supports under the house weakened and the structure collapsed to the ground.

It fell full the mass demolished the greenhouse underneath. Sparks set small fires on the roof of the East Side Lumber company, a few hundred feet south, but these were quickly extinguished without damage.

Firemen from Engine House 20 were first on the scene. Engine 23 and truck 4 also answered the alarm, together with Battalion Chief Laidenkos and the fireboat David Campbell. The firemen were delayed because the private water supply of the Oaks had apparently been shut off, and new lines had to be laid to the city mains at the mill.

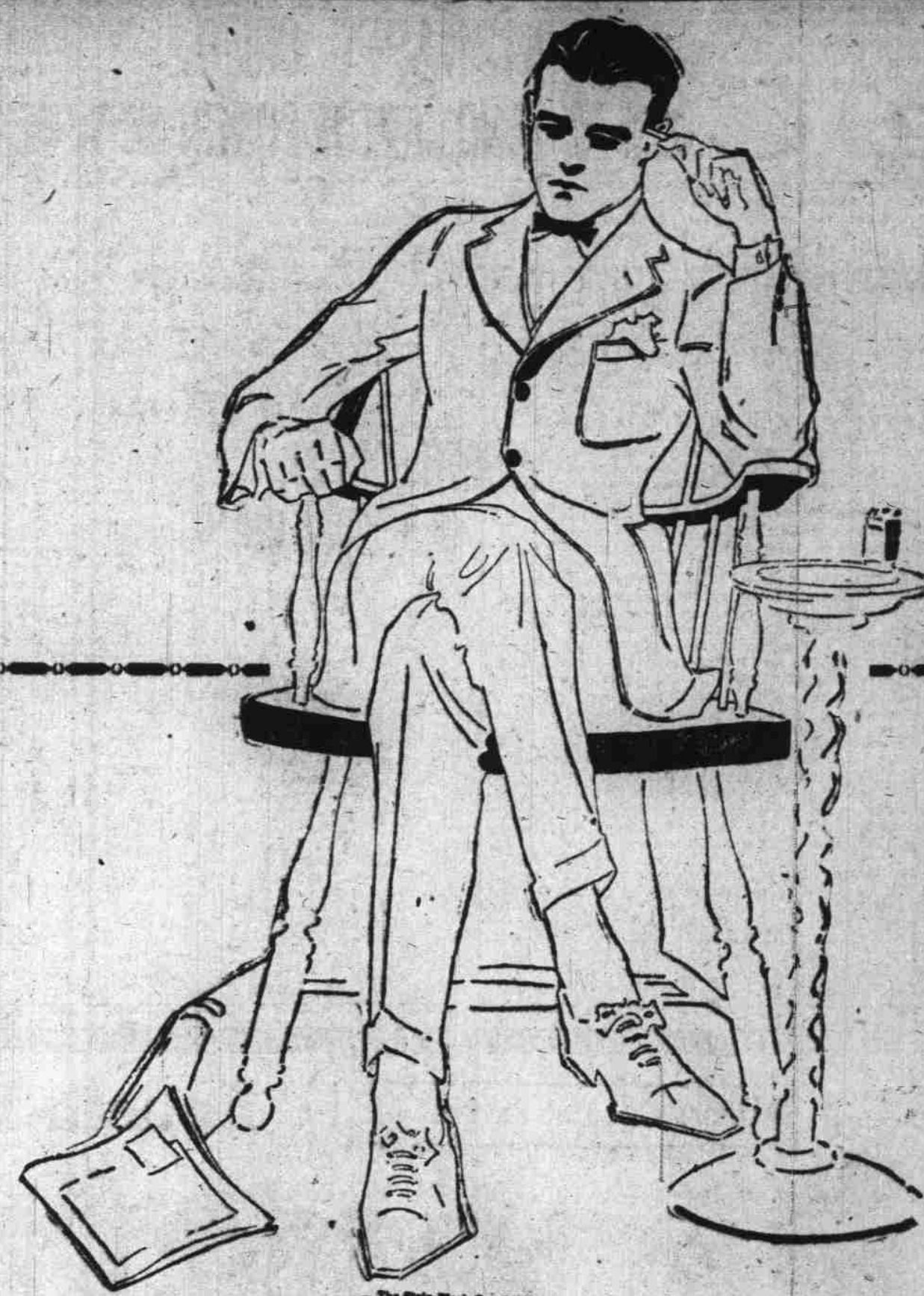
