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NOT TRUE IS G. O. P. PEOPLE TO SENATOR

Republican National Committee
Feels Amazed and Outraged by
Moses' Declaration That Same
Old Juggernaut Is on the Job.

Chicago, June 5.—(U. P.)—The Republican national committee arose in its wrath today and roundly condemned Senator George H. Moses, one of the Wood managers, for making a statement last night asserting that the committee was "steam rolling" the Wood delegates from Southern states.

All factions of the committee joined today in a field day of denunciation of the New Hampshire senator for his startling assertions.

General Wood's managers and sympathizers who are members of the committee were equally vigorous with the proponents of Governor Lowden and Senator Johnson in terms of the statement an outrageous assertion.

Nearly every member of the committee was in his seat this morning in anticipation of the Moses statement. "Gentlemen," he said, "I want to say that for more than a year I have been a Wood man. General Wood has had no more ardent supporter than I, and I will be for him in victory or defeat. But I recent most strongly the assertion of Senator Moses of New Hampshire that this committee has shown partiality in deciding these contests."

There was a wave of applause from the crowded committee chamber. Chairman Hays himself was in the chair. Hamilton F. Keene of New Jersey.

RESERVATION CARDS SATISFACTORY TO JOHNSON

California Senator Declares He
Would Accept Republican Nomination on Platform Affirming
Treaty Changes Made by Lodge

Chicago, June 5.—(U. P.)—Senator Hiram Johnson declared today that he would accept the Republican nomination for president if the platform should declare for treaty ratification with the Lodge reservations.

Asked if he would accept under those conditions, Johnson replied: "I most certainly would." Johnson's statement was the outstanding feature of the day so far as the coming platform was concerned.

WOOD IS AWARDED TWO DELEGATES FROM GEORGIA

Chicago, June 5.—(U. P.)—General Wood failed another delegate from the Eighth district of Georgia when the committee voted to seat W. H. Harris of Atlanta and J. H. L. Hamon of Athens.

Wood had gained another Georgia delegate earlier in the day.

Chicago, June 5.—(U. P.)—The Republican national committee determined to clean up the contests for seats in the national convention before night, when it resumed its hearings today.

In the five days the session had been under way 34 of the 137 cases had been disposed of. There remained 23 contests in Texas, 15 in Virginia and five district contests in Georgia. The first evening session last night resulted in settlement of only five Georgia district cases.

The committee began by seating C. C. Cole of Marietta, Ga., contesting delegate from the Seventh Georgia district. The case was decided by a vote of 10 to 9.

The decision of the committee apparently was influenced by an alleged forged call for the district convention. The score of delegates was 10 to 9 in favor of Cole.

LOWDEN SCORES IN CONTESTS
Governor Frank O. Lowden, 43, Major General Leonard Wood 36, Judge J. C. Pritchard 32, Senator Howard Sutherland 16, Senator Miles Polinder 14.

The number of votes lost in the same way to candidates was:

Wood 49, Lowden 189, Johnson 163, Nicholas 10, Spruiell 76, Senator Warren G. Harding 48, Governor Calvin Coolidge 23, Pritchard 22, Senator Howard Sutherland 16, Senator Miles Polinder 14.

By successful presentation of the case of the "regular" delegation from Georgia, Henry Johnson, Atlanta, negro, may win for himself the position of national committeeman from that state, it developed today.

From official sources it was learned that a certificate of Johnson's election to that position already is in the hands of the national committee.

INDIAN FREED WHO AVENGED DEATH OF SON

YAKIMA, Wash., June 5.—George Jim, Yakima Indian, was acquitted by a jury after 10 minutes' deliberation of a charge of murdering James Shoute, another Indian, who, according to Jim's story, had cast a spell over Jim's young son, which led to the death of the lad.

Testimony of the theory of Indian "medicine-man" healing was given by Indian doctors, who asserted that Shoute "held the power of the wolf" over the boy and also ascribed to him the power of the panther and the rattlesnake.

Shoute, the Indians said, was angered because Jim refused to lend a horse to him and threatened Jim's son. Jim went to Shoute when the boy became ill and a quarrel followed. Shoute, according to the testimony, was the aggressor, using a hatchet.

M'NARY CRITICISES WORK OF CONGRESS

Washington, June 5.—(WASHINGTON BUREAU OF THE JOURNAL)—Senator McNary believes congress made a serious mistake in voting to adjourn. He was one of 15 Republican senators who voted against it, along with other progressive Republicans like Kenyon, Capper, Lenroot and Borah.

"Congress should take a short recess for the convention and come back to its work," he said. "We are adjourning without action on packer control. No relief is given in the new situation. The sugar embargo bill is stranded. Nothing has been done for irrigation. The river and harbor bill is deadlocked. The day-afternoon session is a waste of time."

McNary's criticism was directed at the work of the House of Representatives. He said that the House had done nothing for the people and that the Senate should take action on the pending bills.

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RATION CARDS MAY BE USED ON GASOLINE

Unless Car Owners Cooperate to
Improve Situation Within 48
Hours, Special Committee Is
to Prepare System of Rations.

Ration cards will be issued to automobile owners patronizing gasoline filling stations unless a marked improvement in the situation is evident during the next forty-eight hours. At a meeting in the mayor's office at the city hall this morning a committee was appointed to prepare a rationing system and arrange for printing the cards.

There is considerable improvement in the local situation compared with Friday, according to heads of the big oil companies. The supply of gasoline at filling stations in the city, however, is practically exhausted and as fast as tank cars can be secured, the needs of the agricultural districts are being relieved.

COMPANIES DENY BLAME
Members of the conservation committee were emphatic in denying that the oil companies were responsible for the present situation. Officials of the four companies represented here are making every effort to replenish their stocks and with cooperation of the public, expect to build up a surplus for use during the Shriners' convention.

Scores of complaints were received at the mayor's office from agents and solicitors who use passenger cars for commercial purposes and the committee decided to ask heads of concerns operating such cars to supply drivers with proper credentials which will be honored at filling stations. The supply of gas allotted to passenger and pleasure cars is 20 per cent of normal and 75 per cent of the normal supply is apportioned to commercial cars and trucks.

PUBLICITY TO HELP
A sub-committee headed by Howard M. Covey was appointed to handle publicity for the conservation campaign and advertisements are being prepared for newspapers and other publications. Movie theatres have also taken up the campaign.

PIRATES NEARLY
DROWN YARDEN

Narrowly escaping being drowned by a pair of illegal fishermen on the Clackamas river, early this morning, H. E. Meads, newly appointed deputy game warden for Clackamas county, was saved only by the approach of two other deputy game wardens, who had been covering other sections of the Clackamas looking for illegal night fishermen.

The Clackamas is closed to fishing and Meads had been appointed this week to fill the vacancy created by the dismissal of Bert Jewell, deputy game warden, last week.

From the bank of the stream Meads had watched two fishermen netting salmon and when they came to shore he attempted to place them under arrest. One of the fishermen said: "Let's drown him" and Meads was promptly carried into the water and held under for several minutes when the poachers heard other wardens approaching.

Meads was released and the two men made their escape. Warrants were issued this afternoon for the arrest of "Big Foot" Smith and his older son of Park Place.

This is only one of a number of similar skirmishes the game authorities have had with "river pirates" at Oregon City this year.

City to Shriners

HOOVER'S LARGEST DONATION \$3000

Washington, June 5.—Total expenditures on behalf of Herbert Hoover's candidacy for the Republican nomination in California and other far Western primaries came to \$33,210.72, Warren D. Gregory, president of the Hoover Republican club of California, told the senate subcommittee investigating campaign expenditures, at a session held last night.

Gregory showed the senators a report of certified accounts showing the receipts and disbursements, first of the Hoover Republican club of California, Northwest division, and for the same club of the Southern division, saying that the expenses enumerated included those for the entire state and for Hoover's Western headquarters.

PAPERS HELD UNFAIR
Referring to the belief expressed by Alexander McCabe, one of Senator Johnson's managers, that the Hoover fund would run over \$300,000, Gregory said:

"Expense incurred in California, including the San Francisco and Los Angeles offices, as well as the headquarters of the whole Western division of the campaign, and all local offices, was \$10,000."

"A great majority of the newspapers in California," he went on, "were active in behalf of Johnson, while many editors have been appointed to office by him and a further number were on his delegation and would not publish the facts for the Hoover people. Consequently, we were obliged to resort to paid advertisements and circulars to attempt to meet the great Johnson publicity and huge billboard campaign, which exceeded all over the state."

STUDENTS GOT CARFARE
The largest subscription received for Hoover was one of \$3000, according to Gregory, and the bulk of the money raised was made up of subscriptions of less than \$100. Almost all the workers were volunteers, he added, saying that the highest salary paid was \$100 a week for one publicity man.

Total expenditures in all Southern California, which has a register of more than 500,000 voters, amounted to only \$35,000, he said, and students from the universities, who were employed as poll watchers, received only their carfare.

Adjourning May Be
Republican Mistake

Washington, June 5.—Whether or not the Republican party, in control of both houses of congress, has made a mistake in deciding to adjourn for the remainder of the summer and autumn, leaving untouched plenty of measures which were recommended for passage by the executive, is something that will be threshed out in the political campaign, but certainly the Republicans have played into the hands of the White House in betaking themselves from the national capitol and leaving the president free from embarrassing resolutions and so-called "poppin' bills," as proposals are

REPUBLICANS ARE ROASTED FOR FAILURES

Ignoring of Peace, Living, Tax
Measures Blamed by Wilson
for the Unrest and High
Costs; Accused Seek Cover.

Washington, June 5.—(U. P.)—President Wilson today exploded the "bombshell" long expected by congressional leaders.

In a letter to railroad brotherhood heads he denounced the charged Republican congress and pressed to it these failures:

Failure to act on or even seriously considering the problems of the high cost of living or industrial unrest.

Failure to revise tax laws.

Failure to make peace with Europe or present any constructive plan for dealing with the "unbearable conditions" here.

Passing legislation so unsatisfactory "that I could accept it, if at all, only because I despised it of anything better."

BROTHERHOODS ARE ANSWERED
The president's letter was in answer to a telegram of railroad brotherhood heads protesting the adjournment of congress today without action on cost of living measures. Wilson replied his answer, hoping that congress would act if it continued in session, and declared it was dominated by motives of political expediency.

CONGRESSMEN GET RUBY
When news of Wilson's letter reached the capitol, congressmen and senators at once began seeking an opportunity to reply in speeches. Leaders indicated they feared that Wilson may veto legislation rushed through in the last few days.

Wilson has 10 important bills now before him, including several appropriation bills. If he should veto them, it would be almost impossible to repeat them at the last minute, and the president indicated he will call an extra session unless all appropriation bills are passed.

IN ACTION IS SCORED
The president's letter follows:

"I received your telegram of June 3. You called my attention to matters that I presented to the present congress in a special message delivered at a joint session of the two houses on August 5, 1919. In nine months this congress has, however, taken no important remedial action with respect to the problems of the cost of living, the industrial situation in that address or on any other line."

"Not only has the present congress failed to deal directly with the cost of living, but it has failed even to give serious consideration to the urgent appeal, often repeated by me and by the secretary of the treasury, for action in legislation so unsatisfactory that I could accept it, if at all, only because I despised it of anything better."

PEACE AIR FAILS
The present congress has not only prevented the conclusion of peace in Europe, but has failed to present any constructive plan for dealing with the deplorable conditions of the world, the conditions of which can only reflect upon us.

"In the light of the record of the present congress, the problem of government-owned merchant marine and other similar urgent matters has resulted in unnecessary burdens on the public purse and ultimately in legislation so unsatisfactory that I could accept it, if at all, only because I despised it of anything better."

Slush Fund Inquiry
Will Be Continued

Washington, June 5.—(U. P.)—The senate investigation of congressional campaign expenditures and contributions will be continued after the San Francisco and Chicago conventions, Senator Kenyon, Republican, Iowa, announced today. The investigating committee adjourned today until July 5.

Wilson is never happy with congress in session, and the departure of the two houses even when the Democrats were in control, marked signs of relief at the White House.

But this time the Republicans have kept up a constant bombardment either by investigations through scores of committees or by passing resolutions of inquiry about matters of foreign policy. Wilson will certainly not call congress into special session unless some "emergency" arises, as Washington will be free of congressional activity until next December.

Washington, June 5.—(U. P.)—Japanese naval forces have occupied Nikolaevsk, Siberia, according to an announcement by the Japanese navy department at Tokyo on June 3 and transmitted to the state department today. Nikolaevsk is in the Sakhalin region of Eastern Siberia.

Safe Crackers Fail In Attempt to Blow Open Garage Vault

Too much brute strength and not enough of the sensitive touch of a Jimmy Valentine prevented an attempt at rifling the safe in the Vancouver Avenue garage at 711 Vancouver avenue, early Saturday morning through the skylight and, with the aid of a sledge hammer, all but demolished the combination and hinges of the safe door. They were unable to force the safe open. The building is used as a garage and blacksmith shop and is operated by Bell & McDonald. Detectives Hill and Cahill have been assigned to the case.

Daly Estate Subject To Inheritance Tax

Salem, June 5.—Under an opinion rendered by Attorney General Brown this morning declaring the estate of Bernard Daly of Lakeview, left in trust for the education of boys and girls of Lake county, subject to the state inheritance tax, more than one fourth of the estate, or between \$150,000 and \$175,000, must be paid into the coffers of the state.

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FOSTER ACCEPTS POSITION IN N. Y.

Dr. William Trufant Foster, former president of Reed college, has accepted appointment as director of the new bureau of economic research to be established at New York this fall and will leave Portland late in July, it was announced today.

At a salary said to be approximately \$18,000 a year, Dr. Foster will be concerned with the examination of economic theories in industrial plants, especially as related to financial affairs, interest and profits, with the idea of establishing generally a just principle for the distribution of the products of labor.

With Dr. Foster will go Miss Edith McDonald, who was assistant to the president during Foster's regime at Reed. She will be his secretary at New York. It is said.

Dr. Foster revealed his plans upon his return from New York, where he accepted the appointment, and expects, he says, to leave Portland with his family late in July. They will establish residence near Boston September 1, although the doctor's headquarters will be at New York.

The bureau of economic research is a private organization backed by some of the nation's industrial leaders and designed to solve as a whole the problems that now confront individual industry and labor as well as an economic way.

Returning to Boston to live, the Fosters will be in familiar scenes, for they resided in that city for years while Dr. Foster was a member of the faculty of Harvard university.

Washington, June 5.—(U. P.)—The second session of the sixty-sixth congress adjourned finally today.

Two minutes before adjournment the senate passed the Pomerene resolution continuing and extending the senate campaign expenditures investigation.

The bill to amend the main Republican measures, failed.

The house session closed amid particular interest when action was taken on minor measures which were successfully blocked.
