40 Stolen Autos Recovered—The auto theft department of the bureau of police recovered 40 of 44 automobiles reported stolen during May, according to a report filed with Chief of Police Jenkins by Lieutenant Hanson, T. Thayer. Nine machines stolen outside of Portland have been recovered by the department, says the report. During May, 1919, the report shows that 97 automobiles were stolen. The department made 81 arrests during the past month for various offenses which totaled \$333 in fines and jail sentences of 421 days.

Dry Law Violators Fined—Two violators of the federal prohibition law, William Gorman of Portland and Ray Jones of Wacunda, pleaded guilty before Federal Judge Sloan Saturday and were fined \$150 and \$100, respectively. Federal agents found six pints of moonshine in Gorman's pocket. They report that he was about to make a sale at the time of arrest. About 16 gallons of grape mash and a small quantity of wine were found at Jones' home in Marion county. Both men had previously been held to the federal grand jury.

Park Service Ready To Distribute 1920 Auto Guide Maps

The national park service of the department of interior has ready for free distribution the 1920 automobile guide maps, according to information received by the general land office here. Maps are available of Yellowstone, Glacier, Mount Rainier, Crater Lake, Yosemite, Sequoia and General Grant and Rocky mountain national parks. The maps are printed in colors and show all the roads and trails within the parks, hotels and camps, free public camp grounds and other information. Small road maps of the states in which the park is located is included.

The park service has also issued an automobile map of western United States, showing the location of the national parks. The national park-to-park highways are shown in red. Requests for maps should be made to the director of the national park service, Washington, D. C.
