

Three High Class Boxing Contests in Store

Star Fights To Be Held Shrine Week

Sheppard Meets Leonard, O'Dowd Fights Ortega and Gorman and Young Brown Are Matched.

NATIVES and Portland visitors before and during Shrine week will be given a plenitude of boxing.

Benny Leonard, lightweight champion of the world, and Johnny Sheppard of England, lightweight champion of Europe, will meet in a 10-round contest before the Portland boxing commission at the Vaughn street baseball grounds Tuesday afternoon, June 22. Proceeds of this will be devoted to the benefits of the Shriners.

Two days later, June 24, Mike O'Dowd, world-war hero and former middleweight champion of the world, will be seen in a 10-round decision battle before the Milwaukee Boxing commission at Milwaukee.

BROWN AND GORMAN
Friday of next week will open the pre-convention boxing circuit with a five bout, with Joe Gorman and Young Brown in the 10-round main event. Andre Anderson, the Chicago heavyweight, and by many considered the fastest big man in the ring, will meet Clem Johnson, giant California negro, in a semi-windup of eight rounds. The third event of this program will feature Dick Brenton, the boy who beat Sammy Gordon Friday night, against Frankie Garcia, California bantam and former amateur bantam champion of the world. Two other bouts of four rounds are yet to be arranged.

Matchmaker Bobby Evans announced Saturday morning that he had closed with Sheppard as Leonard's opponent. Sheppard has posted a forfeit of \$1000 to guarantee his appearance five days before the contest, so local sports may give him the once over.

SHEPPARD BEAT PAPI

Sheppard's clash with Leonard will add an international flavor to the match. Leonard has shown himself head and shoulders above any other American lightweight. Just as Sheppard's last fight before leaving Europe was his defeat of George Papi, lightweight champion of France and stablemate of Georges Carpentier, Sheppard has boxed several no decision bouts since his arrival in the States. He has met Ritchie Mitchell, Willie Jackson and Eddie Fitzsimmons, who are credited in newspapers with having shaded him. His manager will say he will be able to reverse these popular verdicts after he has become acclimated. Sheppard, he declares, has now become used to these ways and means and hopes to hold Leonard even, if not get the best of him.

MILWAUKIE TO REOPEN

Right on top of Evans' announcement came the one from Moore and Kendall that they had decided to reopen the Milwaukee arena, which has been closed between O'Dowd and Ortega, supported by an all-star card. Ortega is considered one of the most aggressive fighters ever stepped into a ring. He is a perpetual motion personified. A match between him and O'Dowd has long been an object sought by promoters, but nothing has been accomplished, their being brought together. Ortega has appeared in Portland, his most notable fights being against Al Sommers, when Sommers was at his best, and against Jimmy Darcy not many months ago.

O'DOWD GOING WELL

O'Dowd, awakened by the fact that he lost his crown through over confidence and lack of condition, has been fighting lately better than he ever fought before. Recently he defeated welterweight champion Jack Britton and a few days previously knocked out Knockout Brown, a feat held well-nigh impossible. He is doing his best to get a return match with Johnny Wilson, the boy who was awarded a decision over him.

Because of their previous 10-round bout, which has been declared the most gruelling and fastest fight ever staged in a ring, Gorman and Brown are expected to draw the most capacity house. No one who saw them fight before will miss the return match and hundreds of others will be drawn there because of the persistent gossip regarding their first Portland bout. Gorman and Brown are boys who are always in shape to battle 20 rounds at top speed.

Besides the semi-windup between Andre Anderson and Clem Johnson, and the other eight-round go between Garcia and Brenton, there will be two preliminaries of four rounds that will bring together four classy boys.

ENTRY WAS QUEER

Lightweight Champion Benny Leonard probably had a more peculiar entry into the fight game than any other man who ever donned the gloves. Leonard when he was a mere boy, so the story goes, used to be a peeping Tom at many of the boxing shows which were held in and around New York. Keyholes, wall holes and roof holes all looked alike to Benny when he wanted to see a fight and didn't have the price. In those days Leonard was a newsboy and the price of fights went to help fill the family larder.

LEONARD JUST DROPPED IN

One night he and a bunch of his pals squatted themselves on the roof of a building where a fight was being held. Or may be it was the rafters or the inside to which they had stolen their way. At any rate they were on the inside and high up, looking down on the proceedings below. Leonard was perched right above the ring. The fight became decidedly interesting and Leonard leaned over too

Campaign For Funds Is Started

Local Olympic Games Committee Starts Drive to Send Athletes to Antwerp Next Month.

"HELP America Win the Olympic Games."

With this slogan, adopted by the American Olympic committee of the Amateur Athletic union, the local committee, headed by Judge Martin W. Hawkins, a point winner in the 1912 contests at Stockholm, Sweden, will inaugurate this week a campaign for funds to send Northwest athletes to the 1920 Olympic games at Antwerp, Belgium.

In the past Portland has been ably represented at the Olympic games, and this year should not be an exception. There are several brilliant performers in the Northwest who have places on the team in their grasp, so it is up to the local sportsmen to assist in sending them across to assist others in trying to make America supreme in the athletic world.

COMMITTEE NAMED
Sportsmen are asked to contribute as much as possible. A five-dollar subscription or more will entitle the donor to a contributing member emblem, a 14-carat gold button. Boys under 18 years old who contribute \$1 or more will receive the card of a junior member. Checks or money orders should be mailed to T. Morris Dunne, treasurer of the local committee, at the Multnomah Amateur Athletic club.

Assisting Judge Hawkins and Dunne in the campaign to raise the funds are Mayor Baker, George F. Berg, George W. Holbrook, John O. Baker, Sam H. Bellah and George Bertz.

THREE FROM PORTLAND

Some of the former Northwest athletes who have represented America in the Olympic games are: Forrest Smithson, who won the 110-meter hurdles at London in 15 seconds flat; Fred Gilbert, who tied Cook at 12 feet 6 inches in the pole-vault in the same year; George Philbrook, Sam Bellah, F. McClure, the late Dan Kelly and Bert Kerrigan.

Local athletes who have a chance to make the team this season are: Willard Wells, captain of the Leland Stanford university team, who came within a fifth of a second of equalling the national record for the 220-yard low hurdles at Philadelphia last Saturday; Ralph Spearow, pole-vaulter, of the Multnomah club; Johnny Murphy, high jumper, now attending the University of Notre Dame; and Mose Payne, Multnomah distance runner.

Other Northwest athletes who will participate in the coast tryouts are: Grant Swan, O. A. C. miler; Hank Foster, Oregon broad jumper; Eldon Jenner, W. S. C. pole-vaulter; Henry Phillips, Spokane A. C. sprinter; Gus Pope, Washington discus thrower; Ken Bartlett, Oregon discus thrower; Merchant, Marshfield, Or., hammer thrower who represented the University of California in the national meet at Philadelphia.

In the intercollegiate meeting Wells was the only athlete who qualified in three events, winning the 100-yard dash and 220 hurdles and placing second in the 120 hurdles. In the finals he won the 220 hurdles and finished third in the 100-yard dash.

LETTERS ARE GIVEN ELEVEN ATHLETES AT REED COLLEGE

Past School Season, Best in History of Sports; Football Was Big Success.

ATHLETES AT REED COLLEGE, cited in the college yearbook for distinguished service on the gridiron for 1919-20, are as follows: Seniors, Carl Wilson, Bruce Shumway, Martin Peterson, Robert Osborn, Hans Hoerlein, Read Ellsworth, Herbert Sweet and George Henry; Juniors, Paul Workman and Tom Brockway; Sophomores, Cecil Kelly. The men have won all-star ratings in two major sports during the past year, or have been all-stars for three consecutive years in their favorite sports.

This year's list is the largest in the history of the college owing to the inclusion of handball and tennis as major sports by vote of the student body last spring. With 11 all-stars in football, five in basketball, three in handball and tennis, and half a dozen in track and field athletics, the lettermen number 11, the awards being given as follows: Wilson, football, basketball, handball; Shumway, football, tennis, handball; Osborn, football, track; Hoerlein, football, track; Ellsworth, three years' football; Henry, three years' basketball; Kelly, track, basketball; Brockway, football, basketball; Sweet, tennis, basketball; Workman, three years' football; Peterson, football, handball and track.

Of this number, Wilson, Ellsworth, Henry, Brockway and Workman have been assistants in the department of physical education for the year, and Shumway acted as director of men's sports. All of the men are dormitory members, six being House F men, three House H and two House C.
