"Instead of attempting to prove that Christ was not divine, I sought to show that he was very much so but that man also has elements of divinity as well," said Ineson.

"I endeavored to explain Jesus Christ in terms of life and not in mechanical terms. I disturbed none of the fundamental doctrines of the church but merely expressed old truths in new language. I also attempted to show the divine origin of man and did not refer to him as a worm in the dust."
