EIGHT PRINCIPALS OF PORTLAND SCHOOLS ARE TRANSFERRED

Eight more Portland school principals have been transferred, in accordance with the new policy of exchanging principals, adopted by the school board upon recommendation of Superintendent D. A. Grout.
C. N. Kiggins, after 14 years at Ladd, will go to Bellwood; E. J. Hadley has been transferred from Hawthorne to Clinton Kelly; L. A. Reed from Clinton Kelly to Hawthorne; W. A. Dickson from Oakley Green to Ladd; B. E. Hugheson from Lents to Oakley Green; L. H. Morf from Sellwood to Lents; C. M. Stanford from Woodlawn to Vernon; and William Parker from Vernon to Albina Homestead.

Residents of Sellwood held a protest meeting Thursday night over the transfer of Morgan from their district, maintaining that Morgan is an absolute, vital need to the community, alleging that a petition circulated by more than 700 residents asking for the retention of Morgan was ignored by Superintendent Grout, which they considered unjust, and finally drawing up a set of resolutions which they intend to present to the school board after the election next Saturday.

"The people of Sellwood," said they, "are unanimously for Morgan and they want to know why, when the parents, the pupils, the teachers ask for the retention of their principal, their wishes are disregarded and thrown aside as of no value for the good of the school."

STEAMER REACHES PORTLAND FROM LONDON, ENGLAND

In the service of the Columbia Pacific Shipping company, and William Diamond, the steamship Bakersfield from London via New York arrived in the local harbor today. In the coast to coast service she left the Atlantic side with a full cargo but for Portland has a little better than 200 tons. Since the days of the American-Hawaiian line coast to coast shipments have been neglected. The greater part of the cargo of the Bakersfield has been left at ports all along the coast from San Diego to Seattle.

Outbound the Bakersfield will take full cargo at Portland. This will probably be divided between wheat and flour. She will clear for London via New York and maintain original schedule.
No new charters have been announced for grain or lumber within the last few days. Practically enough tonnage has been engaged for the winding up of the 1919 crop and the glut of the lumber market in the Orient has put a stop to other charters for timber in that direction. Lumber for Australia is picking up all the sail tonnage available. Coal and copra from island-constant are an inducement for sailers but not for the large steamers.

CAPTAIN HAMPTON NAMED MASTER OF STEAMER COXACK
Captain George N. Hampton, formerly chief officer of the steamship Wawona, has been named as master of the steamship Coxack, arriving yesterday from the Orient. He succeeds Captain Howard L. Lyons, who left the ship at Yokohama to assume the duties of surveyor for the American bureau. He will also look after the interests of the Admiral line steamships in the Japanese port.

UP RIVER BUSINESS SAID TO BE SHOWING ADVANCE
For Lewiston, Idaho, Pasco and Kennewick and way points, with a cargo of general freight, the steamer Northwestern of the Portland-Transportation company left last night. The boat is on her fourth trip to the upper Snake river. Captain Raabe reports that business is improving. Upstream freight is heavy, but the downstream stuff is light. W. C. Tipton, Pioneer Of Roseburg, Drops Dead on His Lawn

Roseburg, June 12.—W. C. Tipton, one of the best-known pioneer citizens of this city, dropped dead Thursday evening while at work on his lawn. He was past 60 years of age and had been in the employ of the city street department for 40 years.

Prior to coming to Roseburg he was the owner of one of the largest ranches on the North Umpqua, near Glendale, where he spent most of his life. He
