HARDING AND COOLIDGE ARE G. O. P. FAVORITES

PROGRESSIVE REPUBLICANS ARE BEATEN

Old Guard Is Declared to Be Well Represented in Man Nominated for Presidency at Chicago

Governor Harding Is Not Looked Upon as Strongest Candidate Party Could Have Nominated.

By David Lawrence. Chicago, Ill., June 12.—The old guard won. The progressive and Roosevelt elements in the Republican national convention were beaten. Warren G. Harding, conservative, old-fashioned Republican, who looks like McKinley, acts like McKinley, was nominated for the presidency by a convention that was worn out by the prolonged balloting in a sweltering temperature. The delegates seemed so delighted to have it all over that as soon as the deadlock between General Wood and Governor Lowden was broken, the delegates didn't much care who they nominated so long as it gave them a chance to go home.

CHICAGO IS NAMED AS WOOD AND LOWDEN GO DOWN IN DEADLOCK

Convention Hall Is Turned Into Bedlam When Ohio Senator Is Led to Victory by Wildly Excited Delegates; Nominee Is On Way to Coliseum When Cheers of Crowd Are Borne to Him.

By Hugh Baillie. Coliseum, Chicago, June 12.—(U. P.)—Harding and Coolidge are the Republican ticket for the November presidential election. Senator Warren G. Harding of Ohio was nominated by the Republicans for the presidency in their national convention here this afternoon on the tenth ballot. Calvin Coolidge, governor of Massachusetts, was given second place on the ticket on one ballot, a tremendous majority of the delegates coming joyously to his support.

HERE IS LAST BALLOT. Following is the official announcement of the vote on the tenth ballot, which brought Harding's nomination and set the delegates jubiling, war-dancing about the packed coliseum, filling the great shell of the building with a deafening din.

LANDSLIDE FOR COOLIDGE. There was a landslide to Coolidge. He went over on the first ballot with 675 votes and all his opponents, including Senator Lenroot and Governor Allen of Kansas, were hopelessly beaten.
